RINGGOLD – The decision will be debated for a long time to come and if the Crimson Hawks fail to make the playoffs for the fourth straight season, it could well be the tipping point in a change of direction at the Head Coach position. A back and forth struggle with unexpected twists and turnovers reached a crescendo of excitement when, clinging to a 30-27 lead, *Ronnie Brown* of the Cubs fumbled at his team's 44 yard line with 8:10 left in the game. The Hawks took control and moved the ball steadily toward the Iowa City goal line riding the legs of *Maurice Jones-Drew*. The Ringgold running back accounted for 41 yards on the drive, overcoming a holding penalty to *Chris Snee* with a 10-yard reception and converting on a key 4th down 1 at the Cubs' 35 yard line. When *Santonio Holmes* reeled in a 12-yard pass for a first down at the Iowa City 2 yard line, it looked like the Hawks were poised to swoop in for the kill. With the Cubs in a nickel package, *Vince Wilfork* made a great individual play by holding Jones-Drew to a 1-yard gain on a dive into the center of the thin Cubs line. With one yard to go for the TD, the Cubs switched into a goal line formation and stopped Jones-Drew cold on a carry off left tackle. A third down toss to Jones-Drew in the flat sailed high and it appeared that the Cubs had held Ringgold to a field goal try. But to the amazement of all, **Tim Molinaro** motioned for his offence to stay on the field. With 2:02 remaining in the game, it looked like an all-or-nothing gamble, or an attempt to draw the Cubs offside. But before the play-clock ticked away, the ball was snapped and the play set in motion. *Ben Roethlisberger* turned sharply around and handed to off to Jones-Drew as the Cubs defence converged. Ringgold's offensive line collapsed and no less than 3 Cubs defenders broke through to form an impenetrable wall against which the churning legs of Jones-Drew could make no headway. The Cubs had held the Hawks on 4th down and, against expectations, had held on to the lead as well. Three

The last minute drama would not have been necessary if Ringgold had not dug themselves into an early hole with loose defensive play on the Cubs opening drive for a touchdown and two costly interceptions thrown by Big Ben. Both *Patrick Willis* and *Jairus Byrd* returned picks to the Ringgold 9 yard line, leading to 14 points for the underdogs from Iowa City. Rookie, *Sam Bradford* managed the game by not turning the ball over and completing key throws, including the pass of the game – a 35-yard TD pass to *Lee Evans* to open the scoring.

MANNING MAULS MARKHAM

GAME POINTS: It took one play for **Adrian Peterson** to surpass his total yards rushing from last week. Peterson started the game's opening drive with a 13-yard run and ended the drive a with a 12-yard TD run to open the scoring. **Peyton Manning** took over after that, hitting **Marques Colston** for 23 yards to start their next drive and finishing it with an 11-yard TD pass to Colston to give the Pats a 14-0 lead. Markham scraped out a FG then Manning went back to work building the Pats' lead, connecting with **Jason Witten** near the sideline for an 8yard TD pass to make it 21-3 at half time. **Jason Campbell** found seldom-used Jared Cook for a TD to make it a two-score game in the 3rd quarter. With Markham driving in Charleswood territory and trailing 24-10, **Quentin Jammer** ended the rally with a pick to set up Manning's 3rd TD pass, an 11-yarder to **Bernard Berrian**.

BREES FIRES FOUR TDs IN VIRDEN VICTORY

GAME POINTS: Devin Hester fumbled on the game's first possession to set up a 17-yard TD pass from Cowtown's **Joe Flacco** to **Santana Moss**. The teams traded field goals before the end of the 1st quarter to make the score 10-3 for the Corn Kings. Then the Virden offence took control. **Drew Brees** passed at will against 5 and 6 defensive back sets, stringing together 4 consecutive unanswered TD passes to 4 different wide receivers to make the score 31-10 for Virden early in the 4th quarter. Hester, who started the game with a gaffe, led all receivers with 106 receiving yards. Flacco added a pair of late TD passes, one to **Donnie Avery** and one to **Zach Miller** in a futile comeback attempt.

KEY PERFORMANCES: Drew Brees completed 25 of 33 attempts for 314 yards, 4 TDs and 1 INT, **Ricky Williams** carried 18 times for 111 yards, **Devin Hester** caught 7 passes for 106 yards and 1 TD, **Brandon Flowers** had a 27-yard INT return; **Joe Flacco** went 25 of 38 for 255 yards, 3 TDs and 2 INTs, **Marion Barber** gained 79 yards on 15 carries, **Santana Moss** caught 6 balls for 79 yards and 1 TD.

SPARTANS BLOW OUT BEARS

GAME POINTS: Chris Johnson broke through numerous keys and run defences to rush for 137 yards and 3 TDs in leading the Spartans to a 45-3 rout of the Golden Bears. The Pickering star got things started with an 8-yard TD run at the end of an 88-yard opening drive to give his team a lead they would not give back. On Kutztown's first possession, Jonathan Joseph picked off Tony Romo on his first pass attempt, running it back 52 yards for a TD and a 14-0 lead. Brett Favre joined the action with a 36-yard pass to Vincent Jackson followed by a 10-yard TD pass to Percy Harvin 3 plays later to take a 21-0 lead at the start of the 2nd quarter. The Spartans went into half time up 28-0 after Johnson's 2nd TD, a 1-yard trap as he avoided a keying linebacker. There was no change in momentum in the 2nd half as Pickering piled on 17 more points to win easily.

"ELECTRIC ELI" SHOCKS YORK

GAME POINTS: Eli Manning threw 4 TD passes, 3 of those to Reggie Wayne, to outshoot Tom Brady at Camelot and give the Gladiators an important road victory, 35-21. Thomas Jones broke the center of the Excaliburs' line for a 3-yard TD run after Thomas DeCoud snatched up a Michael Crabtree fumble and returned it 48 yards to the York 3-yard line with 1:25 left in the first half. That broke a 14-14 tie and turned out to be a momentum-changer. Thomas Jones broke free for an 83-yard run on the first play of the second half to set up Manning's 3rd TD pass of the game, a quick 1-yard out pattern to Wayne as the York defence gunned for Jones. The Glads turned to veteran Willie Parker to control the ball on the way to their final TD, a 4-yard pass to Dallas Clark. Brady added a late TD pass for York, his 3rd of the game and 2nd to Darren McFadden.

KNIGHTS DO JUST ENOUGH TO WIN

GAME POINTS: The LA Knights outlasted Garland in a defensive struggle at The Corral. Despite optimal weather conditions, both offences struggled to execute consistently. Garland failed to fully exploit their opportunities, managing just 2 FGs on 3 trips inside the LA 10 yard line. With Garland clinging to a 9-7 lead near the end of the 3rd quarter, Kurt Warner kept the longest drive of the day alive with 3 completions to convert third downs on a 73-yard march to the Garland end zone, finishing with 4-yard TD pass to Roddy White on 3rd down and goal. On Garland's first play from scrimmage after the kickoff, Andre Carter sacked Matt Ryan and forced a fumble that the Knights recovered at the Garland 19 yard line. Chris Carpenter nailed a 3-pointer from 32 yards away to put LA ahead by 8 points. LA sealed the win on Brian Orapko's 4th down sack of Ryan at the LA 9 yard line with 3 minutes remaining in the game.

DRAGONS WIN IN THE BAG

GAME POINTS: The Florida defence sacked Chino quarterbacks 6 times and forced 3 turnovers leading to 13 points to beat the Convicts at The Big House and keep their perfect string of victories alive. The Chino defence came to play, holding the Florida attack to a season-low 13 first downs and 237 yards of offence, but 11 penalties, all but 1 of them to the offence, and offensive miscues held the Chino attack to just one meaningless touchdown in the last minute of the game. After a 1st quarter stalemate, Joshua Cribbs fumbled the kick return early in the 2nd quarter giving Florida the ball at the Chino 37. DINO DEFENCE DOMINATES

GAME POINTS: The Thunder Lizard's defence turned the heat up on the Hellfire, holding them to 10 first downs and just 122 yards of net offence. Michael Turner recorded his first 100-yard game in limited action this season, scoring Durham's first two TDs on runs of 1 and 10 yards to give his team a 14-0 lead by half time. The Mohave offence gained over half its total yards for the game on its second possession of the 3rd quarter, moving 90 yards on 15 plays by mixing timely passes with 6 carries by Rashard Mendenhall and hitting pay dirt on a QB sneak by Matt Schaub inches from the goal line. The Hellfire were back in the game, but promptly lost two timeouts on failed challenges trying to stop the slow but relentless Durham offence on their ensuing possession. The Lizards came close to turning the ball over on the Mohave 37 when Philip Rivers fumbled at the end of a 7-yard scramble, but Leonard Davis pounced on the loose ball to preserve the drive. Five plays later, Mason Crosby made good on a 43-yard field goal to give Durham a two-score lead with 10 minutes remaining. Mohave's last gasp came after Rivers fumbled and lost it at the Durham 45. But 3 consecutive penalties, 2 holds and a false start, created a 1st and 35 that Mohave could not recover from.

<u>KEY PERFORMANCES:</u> Philip Rivers completed 17 of 22 for 165 yards, Michael Turner gained 116 yards and scored 2 TDs on 26 carries, **Jonathan Vilma** made 10 tackles, 1 deflection and 1 forced fumble; **Matt Schaub** went 10 of 21 for 86 yards, **Rashard Mendenhall**, 15 carries for 52 yards, **London Fletcher** had 11 tackles and 1 FF.



NEW YORK – The EFL announced its expansion plans for 2011 at a Press Conference in Canton, Ohio on Saturday. The League had originally planned to make the announcement last week at the Radio City Music Hall here in New York City, but cancelled those plans and postponed the date without explanation.

I am no rocket scientist but I am fairly astute when it comes to matters of politics and sports protocol and I knew as soon as I was told by my employer that the Hall date was cancelled and that I had to book a train ticket to Canton (flights there are too expensive in these tough economic times I am told) or else cover the conference at home by watching the EFL network feed, that my hopes for a New York franchise were about to be cruelly dashed.

As expected, the League formally announced the awarding of an expansion franchise to the **South Carolina Regulators**, a Charleston-based outfit owned by **Hal "The Colonel" Corson**, President and CEO of Corson Cotton, a dye and textile firm with a branch of subsidiaries dealing in a variety of local agricultural commodities. Corson's company is the exclusive textile supplier to 'Jubber' and 'Plode' sports gear manufacturers and the main supplier of soy beans for the 'Super Soy Boy' line of genetically modified meat substitutes and 'Hinterland Harry's Edible Hiking Gear.' Corson was also rumoured to have covered the costs of hundreds of green fees and hotel and restaurant bills for strategic planning meetings of the EFL Board of Governors held the past two springs at Myrtle Beach.


Coming as a surprise was the announcement that the second expansion franchise would be awarded to a Chicago consortium headed by **Chris Wadley**, President of *Wadley Western Alliance Confederated Co-operative Optimum Insurance Company* (WWACCO Insurance for short). A descendant on his mother's side of Patrick and Catherine O'Leary, whose infamous cow kicked over the lantern in the barn they owned (and apparently on which they held a full insurance policy), starting the Great Chicago fire of 1871; Wadley parlayed a 129-year delayed settlement on the original claim (the first cheque had been sent to the O'Leary's *old* address – the one destroyed in the fire) into an extremely successful insurance business of his own. His team, aptly named the **Chicago Blaze**, will play in a new stadium built on the site of the old Soldier Field, which was tragically and unexpectedly destroyed by fire late last year. The unnamed park is under construction and is expected to be finished in time for the pre-season.

The award of the Chicago franchise was considered a long shot by most observers. New York investor, **Franklin P. Wellesley-Woodinghampton IV** of 'Wellesley-Woodinghampton, Wadsworth, Wingham and Wilson Ltd.,' was considered the front-runner after spending a small fortune entertaining EFL Board Members at a promotional event for his team, the **New York Mega-Giant Juggernauts** at New York's Waldorf-Astoria Hotel. I was at that party and I can't believe that the New York bid did not win on the strength of the 'Veal Oscar' and the open martini bar alone! I hear most of the members of the EFL Board are scotch drinkers prefer their beef mature.

COUNTDOWN TO PERFECTION

The Dragons took another big stomp toward that elusive Perfect Season with a big win over Chino on the road at 'The Big House.' Normally I would characterize the win as just another "step," but in this case it was a "stomp." With it, Florida may have stomped out the last real opposition to their quest for perfection. The Dragons had failed to solve the Chino puzzle in two previous seasons and they looked more vulnerable this season than they had previously, coming off a late and improbable challenge to their pristine record by the exasperatingly stubborn Markham North Stars immediately before this week's showdown with their arch foe. In this year's re-match they took care of business by being more like Chino than Chino – using defence, turnovers and an opportunistic offence to earn their 11th win.

The Florida "Firewall" burned *Donovan McNabb* and his offensive line, ringing up 6 sacks to bring their league-leading total to 35. They also induced 10 line penalties, 3 of those on *Phil Loadholt* and 3 on *Marcus McNeill*, who had the unenviable task of blocking *Ndamukong Suh* and *Justin Tuck* respectively. Completely missing from the Chino offence was any of the imagination or improvisation that characterizes McNabb's better outings – he looked dull and slow in the pocket as he tried to process the swirling coverage in the secondary while pass rushers bore down up on

him. Instead of moving in the pocket or scrambling, McNabb often hung on to the ball too long trying to find the open man. To be fair, a defence as good as Florida's will do that to a quarterback, even a good one. But McNabb's been around the block a few times and should have a few tricks of his own to throw back at young whippersnappers like *Michael Griffin* and *Darrelle Revis*. The truth is that age is starting to get to McNabb. The mind is willing but the flesh is weak. He probably saw opportunity and wondered if he had it in him to take advantage of it; and while he wondered, *LaMarr Woodley* ear-holed him down to the hard, track beaten turf of The Big House.

THE DECISION

One thing that Ringgold head coach, **Tim Molinaro** cannot be accused of is meekness. He is an aggressive coach, the architect of the experimental 7 and 8-man blitzes and a run-and-gun style offence he calls "Shoot 'n Pray" that leaves his quarterback taking hit after jarring hit until his name gradually transforms into a 14-letter tongue-twister that nobody can easily spell or pronounce. [Big Ben started his career named **Ben Ross**, but the record shows that through successive trips to the hospital for concussion treatments it gradually transformed from **Ross**, to **Rosszz**, to **Rossis**, to **Rothlis**, to **Rothliswannaburgerpleeze** (he thought he was at Burger King), to **Rosslthzburger**, and finally to **Roethlisberger**]. When Molinaro's system works, it is impressive to watch. When it doesn't, it's a horror show.

The Hawks threw caution to the wind this Sunday and the crafty Iowa City Cubs made them pay for it. A lot of fuss will be made about Molinaro's decision to go for it on fourth down and goal at the one yard line while trailing by 3 points late in the game. Rightly so; but before I get to that, it is worth including in the discussion how the Hawks, a better team in most respects than Iowa City, got to the point where they were trailing by 3 with just over two minutes remaining in the game.

Let's just say that Ringgold's predicament was a team effort. The defence let a rookie stretch the field against them on the game's opening drive. While *DeMarcus Ware* and *Clay Matthews* shuffled aimlessly behind the front 3, not blitzing and unsure who they were supposed to be covering, Sam Bradford gave fans a taste of why the Cubs placed their future in his hands, throwing darts to *Larry Fitzgerald* and firing laser beams to *Lee Evans*. After exactly four minutes had passed, Iowa City was leading 7-0 on a 35-yard long slant to Evans delivered by the fearless rookie. Three plays into Ringgold's first possession, Roethlisberger had a "Bubbles" moment (his teammate's term for those times when Ben's mind suddenly goes blank and he is operating on brain stem). He saw *Patrick Willis* looming like a predator and, imagining he has holding a javelin instead of a football, launched it like a missile directly at the star linebacker's chest, where it remained embedded between his arms as he ran the interception back 31 yards to the Ringgold 9 yard line to set up the Cubs' second touchdown. Roethlisberger did the same thing to Cubs' safety, *Jairus Byrd*, who also returned his pick to the Ringgold 9 yard line to set up the third Iowa City major score. Once more, the Hawks fell victim to their lack of focus, patience and discipline.

Despite the rocky start, the Crimson Hawks fought back and trailed by only 3 points when *Kerry Rhodes* knocked the ball from *Ronnie Brown's* arms at the Iowa City 44 yard line with 8:10 remaining. The Hawks took control and drove the ball steadily on the ground toward the Cubs' goal line, eventually facing a 1st down and goal at the Iowa City 2. After three straight plays to *Maurice Jones–Drew* had gained only 1 yard, it looked like the Hawks would have to settle for a field goal to tie the game. But Molinaro had another plan – the kind that makes history of the famous or the infamous kind. He decided to go for it – *really* go for it. Everyone, even diehard Ringgold fans, thought it was a lame ruse to get the Cubs to jump offside. There was a collective gasp and a pregnant pause in the crowd noise as Big Ben took the snap and actually handed the ball off. Jones-Drew was stopped cold by three Cubs defenders, his offensive line prone to a man around him. From that instant, hindsight kicked in and locked its unfailing sights on **Tim Molinaro**.

For critics of the emotionally volatile and eccentric coach this was just another irrational decision at the wrong time for his team. "Molinaro's Circus is losing its novelty. These aren't growing pains we're seeing each week, just bad coaching. It's time to fire the bum!" wrote **Jebediah Cleburne** of the **Ringgold Ring & Chronicle**.

For his supporters, including most of his players, the 'avant-garde' coaching genius had once again challenged the boundaries of the game, and found the game wanting. "Tim Molinaro is an artist. Players are his medium and the field his canvass," wrote **Ortin Scampo** of **The Tennesseean**, "He challenges us all to look at football from a new perspective.

Many will criticize this decision but they do not understand the passion of the game that is unlocked by such a move. Win or lose, it's about the passion, the fury and the rage. Convention will call it a loss for Ringgold. I daresay it is a victory for Football."

Others, in the middle, claimed to admire the "gutsiness" of the decision to go for it, while disputing the choice of call. "I like the message it sends to his team," said **Tim Zantz** of CBS, "but I question calling Jones-Drew's number in that situation. They rode him like a pack mule to get there and he had to be tired."

Ironically, it looked as if the Cubs defence was keying on *Tim Hightower* on the play. It was just bad luck that in an effort to get to him, the Cubs defenders would cross the path of Jones-Drew as he launched himself directly into *Philip Merling* and *Vince Wilfork*.

FOOTBALL'S GRINCHES DAMPEN JOY OF FOOTBALL

It was a perfect day for football in the Mohave Desert...until the game started. Although the sky was clear, the wind calm, the air warm and dry, the road-runners relaxed at the side of the road enjoying a cola; the pace of play of the Durham Thunder Lizards nevertheless managed to negate all that, bringing an atmosphere of mist and muck to the driest place in the United States. *Michael Turner* finally made his mark on a game and, while effective, it was tedious to watch. The longest play from scrimmage for both teams was 18 yards – one for each side. The Durham offence treaded warily through the invisible mud, like street mimes creating the illusion of a trek through wild bush country, only there was nothing actually standing in their way. The Mohave defence was hypnotized. They bought into the illusion on both sides of the ball, slipping and sliding for good measure despite the Velcro stickiness of the Mohave brand desert "turf." All that was needed was a computer-animated snowstorm or monsoon superimposed on the screen to create the illusion of an authentic "Weather Bowl." I watched with wonderment at the Dinosaur's ability to import their wet weather brand of football to the desert and, in effect, impose their own home field advantage on the road. If they can pull off this trick at Thermopylae Stadium or Dragonmount later this year, they could end up emerging as the surprise survivor of the EFL toughest Conference. The question is: will anyone other than Durham fans have the patience to watch it?

'TWAS THE NIGHT BEFORE CHRISTMAS......

'Twas the night before Christmas, and all through the league,
Not a good game was stirring, and it caused much fatigue,
The fans they were sleeping, but not in their beds,
They dropped where they stood, from sheer boredom and dread.

Week Eleven was not a good week for the EFL's Competition Committee. They are probably trying to answer a few tough questions this morning about league parity, starting with the big one: "Where is it?" I will remind the reader that it was this column (and therefore, me) who first dared to speak what many had been thinking, but not saying, about the disparity between the top five teams in the EFL and everyone else. There have been weeks when the gap was obvious, even to an ostrich, but none more so than this past week. Worse than that, there appear s to be a pecking order among the bad teams in the league that make a competitive game between the so-called 'Have-Nots' almost as rare as an upset of one of the so-called 'Haves.'

The newly bad Gwinnett Gladiators got a much needed jolt from "Electric Eli" as he outpitched York's *Tom Brady* in a 35-21 win at Camelot. *Eli Manning* has experienced some critical lapses this year, but he is ranked 6th in the league in passing because when he is good, he is shockingly good. Eli zapped the York defence for 4 TD passes, including 3 more to wide receiver *Reggie Wayne*, giving him 14 TD catches on the season and making the pair the most lethal TD pass combo in the league.

In the *TERRORDOME*, Cowtown's *Joe Flacco* posted the first three-TD pass game of his career to lead his team to 24 points, the most since they racked up 37 in Week Two against Markham. Unfortunately, Flacco also threw 2 interceptions while his opponent, *Drew Brees*, passed at will against the sieve-like Cowtown pass defence for over 300 yards and 4 touchdowns in a 34-24 Violator win. Virden, at 4-7, is ranked 3rd in the league in offence which should give you a good idea, without looking, how bad their defence is performing. The Corn Kings offence continues to be as explosive as Play Doh.

Pickering is starting to scare people. They annihilated *Tony Romo's* Golden Bears 45-3 and looked machine-like in the process. *Chris Johnson* is a one-man assembly line, producing 23 of the finest top grade touchdowns at the rate of just over 2 per game. Brett Favre attempted to get noticed with a pair of TD passes to *Percy Harvin*, but it was not enough to distract fans and the media from Johnson's fleet-footedness. So Brett tearfully announced after the game that he would be retiring from Football before practice on Monday, citing not enough playing time and a not-sore-enough throwing shoulder. "My shoulder isn't getting enough work and I'm not in the kind of pain I'm used to," explained Favre, "I feel I can't be as effective this way and I am sorry to say that it is time for me to go. I want to thank Gus Konstantakos for giving me this opportunity and showing faith in my abilities." The announcement caught everyone by surprise and prompted a flurry of incredulous questions by the media. But by the end of the session Favre had announced his return to Football citing that his "shoulder" was responding well to all the "attention" it had been received during his time away from the game.

To round off this deplorable week we learned that the LA Knights are just slightly better than Garland and the 'Amazing Absorbing Man' took the wrong dose of secret formula before Markham's 31-10 loss to Charleswood.


