

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



Jalen Mills returned an INT 42-yards for a TD and recovered a fumble that led to a 26-yard Blake Bortles TD run to give the Pats a quick 14-0 lead. But the Cubs scraped back, aided by AJ Bouye and Casey Heyward picks deep in Pats territory, that set up 2 TDs.



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With time running down, a 28-yard Russell Wilson run and 30-yard pass to Mike Wallace set up Justin Tucker's game-winning FG.

A 48-yard check down to Melvin Gordon and a 20-yard INT return by Sean Davis set up two 2nd quarter Triumph TDs to give them a 14-10 half time lead. The Pilots came within 2 in the 3rd on a 27-yard bomb TD to Anthony Miller from Eli Manning. But Mitch Trubisky's 2nd TD run and 3rd TD pass of the game allowed the Triumph to pull away in the 4th, despite a late Pilot TD by Allen Hurns.

The Cadillac got a 90-yard kick-off return for a TD from Pharoh Cooper, a pair of long TD passes from Matt Stafford to Jordy Nelson and a 47-yard FG by Stephen Gostkowski to beat the Knights. The Cadillac 'D' forced 5 turnovers and sacked LA QBs 8 times. Josh McCown relieved Andy Dalton in the 3rd and tied the game on a 13-yard TD pass to Le'Veon Bell, but turned it over 3 times in the 4th.

Cam Newton scrambled for a 26-yard TD and Oren Burks returned a pick 59 yard for 6, while the Eagles missed a 4th &3 in the red zone and a 36-yard FG to stay off the scoreboard as the Lizards built a 12-0 halftime lead. Brock Osweiler was hurt in the 3rd, bringing in 3rd string back-up Sean Mannion for Scarborough. He could not get it done and Durham coasted to an easy win and the shutout.

The Corn Kings drove 94-yards for a TD on their first series and took advantage of a Ronald Darby INT to score on their second to take a 14-0 lead. The Fish drove to the Cowtown red zone, but a failure to convert on 4th&2 kept them scoreless. A 32-yd PI penalty on Jahleel Addae set up a Sebastian TD in the 3^{rd,} but a Matt Bryant FG and good Cowtown D enabled the home team to hang on.

Ben Roethlisberger threw 4 TD passes, including 3 to Jarvis Landry, to spearhead a big road win for Georgia. The slow-starting Stars trailed 14-0 before a Brooks Reed forced fumble set up an 11-yard TD pass to Chris Hogan to make it 14-7 Georgia at the half. A sluggish 3rd gave way to fireworks in the 4th, as the teams traded 2 TDs each, the last one a game-winning 11-yard slant to Landry.

The Wolverine defence sacked Alex Smith 5 times and hurried him all day to spur Toronto to an upset road win over Brooklin. This game was tight in the 1st half, with Brooklin's Matt Breida tying it at 10 on a 12-yard TD catch. Toronto took the lead in the 3rd, after a 33-yard run by Saquon Barkley set up a 31-yard TD pass to Tyreek Hill. A red zone INT by Trevor Williams helped Toronto hang on.

Three 1st half INTs of Matt Ryan held off the Mustangs' offence while the Spartans built a 10-0 lead on a 67-yard TD pass to Golden Tate. Aurora scored with 0:04 left in the 1st half then tied it on a FG early in the 3rd. Tate's 2nd TD catch gave Pickering back the lead. But INTs by Patrick Peterson and Jason McCourty turned the game around and led to Ryan's tying and game-winning TD passes.

Tom Brady threw 4 TD passes, 3 of those in a 21-point 2nd quarter, to lead York to a lop-sided victory over the Crusaders. The floodgates opened after a Micah Hyde INT of Kirk Cousins in the red zone led to a 63-yard scoring drive. After that, the York offence rolled, converting two more drives into TDs. The 2nd half was steady until Michael Johnson's strip sack set up one final York TD.

NEW YORK – While we wrestle with a politically-divided society and hold our collective breath in anticipation of the coming midterm elections – the so-called "referendum" on Donald Trump's Presidency – our neighbours to the North are fussily wringing their holier-than-thou hands over the impending legalization in their country of *cannabis sativa*, better known as marihuana.

The Canucks are going the Colorado route and making it legal for citizens 19 years of age or older to purchase and consume marihuana for recreational purposes. It should tell you a lot of what you need to know about Canadian politics that one of the principal election promises of Prime Minister Justin Trudeau was the "legalization of pot." And why not? It was an easy sell. Canadians, even respectable ones, have acquired a taste for the herb. Canadians also typically want to do the lawful thing and it was getting very uncomfortable for respectable users to spark up a doobie knowing that it was against the law – even though no cop in the country was charging anybody for possessing personal quantities and no court would take the time to hear a simple possession charge.

In many ways, marihuana had become like alcohol in the minds of most citizens and, more importantly, the judiciary. No doubt that many of be-robed men and women sitting on the bench had had their own histories with the substance and, judging from some Canadian Case Law, are experiencing current histories with it. Why not make it legal and be done with it?

Well, as the day of legalization approaches, we are learning a bit more about why not, as Provinces, Municipalities, community groups and even Canadian EFL franchises, come to grips with the reality of legalization. The lack of communication and public debate has been stark, according to my Canadian sources and a quick study of news stories. Suddenly, at the 11th hour however, more people are becoming aware that marihuana is not like alcohol and that perhaps it is worse than smoking. It is one thing to be exposed to cigarette smoke – it is another to be exposed to something that can alter your perception of reality and stay in your system for up to 28 days. Suddenly, concerns about driving while impaired, the welfare of children, and the rights of non-users are at the forefront of discussion. Where were those protests when it mattered?

But it is too late for this debate. The legalization train is hurtling full speed toward the dark tunnel of the unknown. Canadians are locked in. There will be a long period of uncertainty and attempts by the marihuana community to assert their "rights" – both real and imagined – to the fullest. Conflicting studies will be released and trumpeted by both sides in an attempt to curtail the other. The ill-effects of legalization will be publicly suppressed as long as the government remains in power while any fringe benefits accrued will be celebrated as stupendous successes.



SACRED HORSES

The torrent of invective that I received from Mustangs fans after shutting Aurora out of the post-season in my 'Bold Predictions' column last week was shocking. It was shocking not because the language used was unusually crass, vile or personally offensive (although some of it was), but because the volume of reaction was, in a single week, more than I had received from Aurora fans in the four previous Liotta seasons *combined*. Obviously, I hit a nerve and probably should explain myself.

The Mustangs have been a special team over the past four seasons under **Rich Liotta**. Of that, there is no question. They have established the greatest dynasty in EFL history over that period. Of that, there is also no question (although Dragon holdouts will disagree). Aurora Fan should know, from reading my Championship column following the Mustangs' historic win over Bruxelles in the 11th Gale Sayers Game and from other writings over the years, that I have always held the coach, the franchise and even its fans in high esteem commensurate with their achievements over four years of domination. Long time readers know how critical I can be. It cannot be said that I have been overly critical of the Mustangs since they moved from Garland to Aurora. Criticism requires flaws, misjudgements and bone-headedness to thrive. Liotta and his troops have given me very little of that to work with over the years.

But the recent shining history of the Mustangs does not blind me to changing times. This is a new season with a new dynamic under the surface. Cumulative seasons of salary cap mismanagement by some, and self-limiting parsimony by others, has altered the competitive landscape so that there are no great teams in the field in 2018. Some are indeed stronger, and others

weaker, relative to the field, but no team has the personnel to be dominant over all others. And that includes, like it or not, the Mustangs. Their opening week loss to Georgia did not surprise me, although it shook the pro-Aurora mainstream to its core. The team's 24-17 comeback win over Pickering this week was a game they could have easily lost had *Philip Rivers* been more careful with the football late in the game.

The journey to this year's Gale Sayers Game will a week-to-week affair for everybody, Aurora included. That does not mean that *Matt Ryan* and **Rich Liotta** will not find their way back to the big game – it just means that anything can happen. There are no Sacred Horses.

This year, in keeping with the "Bold" part of my preseason predictions, I picked an up-and-coming Toronto team to knock off the Mustangs in a weak South Division. Yes, it was bold to do so, especially considering the implications such a prediction means for *Jay Cutler*, a quarterback who has, historically, ruined the playoff hopes of every team he has played for. But I like Toronto's strengths over Aurora's strengths. There is not much more I can say about it than that. We will see how things transpire on the football field – the final court of arbitration in these matters.

BOMBS AWAY

Sebastian coach, **Russ Lemmon** has a reputation for daring gambles in unconventional circumstances. What that means is that he gambles a lot on 4th down when the distance to be gained, the field position, the score and the time of the game,

taken all together, would tell a more conservative coach to punt. He also likes to throw in the occasional surprise onside kick. But when one looks at the offensive style of the Swordfish over the years, the play-calling has been fairly conventional and consistent. Anywhere from a 60-40 to 55-45 pass-to-run ratio out of a standard two-back set, with most passes of short or medium length and most runs to the strong side of the line. His receivers run primarily safe hitch routes with his running backs running mostly off, or between, the tackles. If there is a quirk at all, it is that when the Fish decide to run outside the tackles it is invariably a pitch. The idea that **Russ Lemmon**, the Intrepid, is more than simply a guy who doesn't like to give back the football would appear to be a myth.

Following Sebastian's step backwards in 2017, Swordfish GM, **Eron 'Ozdoltorps' Osman** decided to fix the offence with one bold move: The acquisition of *Drew Brees* from Durham. But Brees was unlike any quarterback Sebastian had had before. Brees was a record-setter and destined for the Hall-of-Fame. Claims that he was over-the-hill dogged him, however. And the fact that the incumbent QB, *Jameis Winston*, had thrown more TD passes than Brees in 2017 (30 to 25) fueled criticism in local media that Jameis was not getting a fair shake and that trading for Brees would turn out to be a mistake.

Osman was not about to let his singularly most important move of the off-season fail. So, he went out and hired the top candidate from the inaugural Class of 2018 from EFL Football University in Canton, OH, to be 'Advisor to the Offensive Coordinator.' **Stedman Techner**, an offensive-minded whizz kid who had scored 99% in Aerial Dynamics and 96% in Route Displacement Theory at Football University, presented like a switched-on, modern aged football tactician – the first pick of a new crop of cutting-edge football strategists the league was hoping to introduce in increasing numbers into the coaching ranks of the EFL.

"The enabler and driver of the offence is the quarterback," Techner pronounced when asked what knowledge and advice he would bring to the Swordfish offence in 2018. "We need to leverage this asset and align its capacity with those attributes and skills of our receivers best suited to meeting our goals and objectives. We plan to leverage both assets simultaneously with a view to exploiting the defensive weaknesses of our opponent while allowing for flexibility and seamless rescaling in the face of any adjustments. It is by no means a linear process, rather think of it as a continuous cycle involving stringent gap analysis. The offence will be treated as a whole, not as separate parts, but the quarterback will play a central role in this all-inclusive process."

Not surprisingly, this rapid-fire, modern language to describe old concepts acted like a code and a marker to separate the "new way" from the "old and out-dated way." Incumbent Offensive Coordinator, **Dan Henning**, a personal friend of **Russ Lemmon** who was close to retirement but had stuck around for Russ' sake, was very quickly marginalized at team meetings. The words he used were understood by all and, therefore, old and part of the problem. On the other hand, Techner spoke animatedly and confidently about things like "synergy," "execution metrics" "target state" and "risk management" – all new and strange terms and that undoubtedly signified positive change. In short order, the 'Advisor to the Offensive Coordinator' had become the *de facto*

Offensive Coordinator, while the latter had become a sort of figurehead, appearing to call the plays, but with Techner nattering non-stop in his ear.

That, at least, had been the arrangement in Week One during a landslide rout of Durham. In Week Two, at Tillman Field in Cowtown, the process changed slightly. After the Corn Kings had driven 94 yards in 10 plays for a touchdown on their first series of the game, **Dan Henning** was recorded on the Sebastian sideline saying to the offence: "Okay, boys, we have to string together some first downs and give the defence a rest. They're darn tuckered out."

Stedman Techner, who took his role as an "actualizer of success" seriously, did not think first downs a worthy enough goal now that the Swordfish had fallen behind an opponent for the first time under his watch.

"Ah, check that, offence!" he snapped peevishly as he motioned for *Drew Brees* to come over to him. "Drew, we're going to run Accelertor-2, okay? Accelerator-2, got it?" Accelerator-2 was one of a "full suite" of bomb plays that Techner had created – all of them were called 'Accelerator.'

"You want that now?" Brees replied, not challenging, rather confirming. He had once played for **Chris Worthley** and, as a result, had plenty of experience throwing deep and often at unexpected times in the game.

"Yes, first thing! Go get 'em Champ!" Techner replied as he clenched his fist in the air.

Brees stood under center, barking the signals. The Corn King defence was set up in a standard 4-3 with the safeties and corners at mid-depth. It was almost impossible to tell what they were playing, therefore no need to audible out of the play call. If Cowtown was playing the run, a deep pass could turn well turn into a huge gainer, maybe even a touchdown.

With the snap, Brees dropped back. Right defensive end *Chris Long* swooped around *Anthony Castonzo*, forcing Brees out of the pocket. The Corn Kings were definitely playing the pass. Brees rolled out and heaved the ball deep downfield while on the run. It was not a bad throw under the circumstances, but intended target *Jermaine Kearse* had been unable to break away from *Ronald Darby* and the ball arrived between them. Darby snatched it out of Kearse's hands and returned it 29 yards to the Sebastian 44. The crowd roared, Brees shook his head, Henning rolled his eyes. **Russ Lemmon** could be seen glancing over briefly at Henning, but quickly shifted his attention to his defence as they grudgingly put their helmets back on their heads.

"We got to stop 'em here!" Lemmon shouted out as they trudged onto the field.

Techner raced over to Brees as he walked to the bench. "Drew! We have to embrace that experience and learn from it," he said consolingly. "The other guy made a good play. Now let's visualize it happening differently."

The Corn Kings marched down the field without much effort against the tired Sebastian defence. *Todd Gurley II* scored on 5-yard draw on the first play of the 2nd half to give the home team a 14-0 lead. While that was going on, Henning gathered the offence around and preached patience; there was still "plenty of football left to play. We don't have to get it back all at once."

But apparently such a patient approach was not what EEL Football University valued in its prized graduates. While Henning drawled on, Techner stood behind him smirking and shaking his head. When Henning was done, he jumped in.

"I don't think so, guys. We're not in the Doctor's waiting room here, we're on a football field," Techner chided. "We need to expedite our offence in this situation. Drew, let's start with Accelerator-2 again and take it from there! Got it?"

"Accelerator-2 coming right up," Brees replied, ever the professional.

Henning looked down at Techner, who was a short man with a sharp nose but acted as if he was the tallest guy on the Sebastian side of the field. "Look, who's running the show, Sted?" he asked quietly, adhering to the unwritten rule that you don't show up a fellow coach in front of the players, even if the courtesy was not being reciprocated.

"Well, you are of course, Dan." He replied guilelessly. "And this series is going to make you look really good. Trust me!"

The first play of the drive was a nearly an exact replay of the last, except that this time Brees did not try to force the ball downfield. Instead he tried to throw underneath but was jolted by Long as he threw incomplete toward *CJ Anderson*.

"Ahhh, shit!" Henning exclaimed as Brees limped off the field, hunched over in pain after taking a hard hit from Long. "Jameis, get in there!"

As *Jameis Winston* threw his helmet on and began to trot out onto the field, Techner sidled up to him. "Okay Jameis, like we practiced. Accelerator-6, okay?"

Winston stopped. He had rarely ever been asked to throw a bomb and certainly never in the middle of the game. "Are you shittin' me?" he asked. "That's like, the one to the tight end, right?"

"Exactly, Jameis! Good work – you remembered! Don't worry about it – they will not be expecting it, trust me."

This time the Corn Kings were not expecting it. The corners and linebackers drew tight to the line, while middle linebacker, *Roquan Smith* remained a half step back from the rest – his eyes focused on Winston, who was always a threat to run. Jameis dropped back and threw the ball high and far, but not too far that 35-year old *Jason Witten* could not reach it at full trot. The safety, *Jahleel Addae*, had kept one eye on the backfield, which had allowed Witten to get behind him. The ball sailed over his head and into the arms of Witten, who stumbled as he extended to make the catch and fell to the ground for a 39-yard gain.

The Sebastian bench raised their heads. Something good had happened. Not wanting to lose the momentum, Techner shrieked into the radio mic of Henning's headset, which was still on the Offensive Coordinator's head, "Okay, *Accelerator-1! Acceerator-1!* Let's do this!"

Emboldened by his success, Winston grinned when he heard the call. He dropped back with a spring in his step and looked for *Doug Baldwin*. Where was he? Is that him over

"He was supposed to see the blitz and audible out of it!" Techner whined loudly as he slammed his clipboard against his thigh. "That is pilot error right there! Pilot error!"

Henning struggled to maintain his patience and decorum. "Okay Sted, that's enough," he said quietly. "We dodged a bullet there. Let me handle things for a bit." As he said that last bit he turned away and, shielding his microphone with his hand, called in the next play, a pitch to *CJ Anderson*.

It was a play designed to gain back some of the yards lost on the sack in order to set up a "third-and-manageable" situation. But *TJ Watt* was on fire and blew the play up for another 4-yard loss. It was now 3rd & 18 and there weren't too many plays for that situation.

"What are you going to do now?" Techner asked snidely – a tight smirk across his lips.

"Get the first down," Henning replied calmly. Again, cupping his microphone with his right hand and turning away from Techner, he called in a medium cross to Baldwin. The play worked like a charm. The Corn Kings were deployed in loose man coverage and the extra space made for an easy completion, in stride, to the team's best receiver. Baldwin made *Mike Hilton* miss then raced the extra 12 yards for a first down and more.

"Okay, good call! I'll give you that one," Techner stuttered, creeping up close to Henning as he spoke. "Now let's go for the jugular here. Let's re-engage the deep threat... Accelerator-2, Accelerator-2!" he shrieked, no more than a few inches from Henning's face. The play call was picked up on Winston's headset. Meanwhile, Henning was signalling the play to the field, a back-up procedure when radios mal-functioned. He thought he had turned his radio off but had not.

Winston snapped the ball and took a deep drop while Kearse sidestepped his cover then broke straight downfield. He turned to look back at about the 9-yard mark to see his quarterback still dropping back. Realizing, too late, that he had the wrong play, Kearse made a late break to go deep downfield but it was not enough. Winston's pass sailed far over the head of the deep safety and incomplete.

It was at that point that Coach Lemmon, an intense but studiously disciplined game day competitor, removed his headset, turned down the volume on his microphone and walked over the offence's side of the bench. "What the f\%\^k is going on here, guys?" he asked, his eyes wide with wonder.

"Trying some things out, boss," Henning replied matter-of-factly.

Techner looked momentarily chastened, like a child who had been caught with his hand in the cookie jar. And he did what children often do in such situations – he blamed it on somebody else. "It was his idea!" he said, pointing at Henning.

"I expect it was," Lemmon replied. "It is his offence. Let's save the experimenting for practice, okay Dan? We have to get back in this game now."

The Swordfish managed to move the ball into the red zone but came up empty-handed after a failure to convert on 4th & 2 at the Cowtown 17. The decision to go for the fourth down instead of taking a shot at a short field goal falls on the Sebastian head coach. But the offence's lack of rhythm and composure had been almost entirely the fault of his dueling offensive coordinators, with some credit going to the Cowtown defence for staying disciplined and making plays.

The Swordfish offence did not really improve after that. Despite Coach Lemmon's warnings, Henning and Techner continued their quiet battle for control of the offence, although the younger was much more circumspect in how he went about changing the plays. Five more 'Accelerator' plays were called, the most effective of them resulting in a 32-yard Pass Interference penalty that led to Sebastian's only touchdown of the day. The team suffered a delay-of-game penalty when a tussle for Henning's headset resulted in the play not being called in to an incredulous *Drew Brees*, who had returned to the game after Winston's one and only series.

The Sebastian defence made some astute and effective adjustments to deal with the Cowtown game plan and held *Joe Flacco* and his troupe to just 3 points the rest of the way. Had the Swordfish offence been able to get its act together, the outcome of this game might have been more favourable to Sebastian than the 17-7 loss it turned out to be. Nevertheless, the whole debacle would have been written off as "one of those days" by Coach Lemmon until he viewed the game film.

It turns out that the Sebastian-Cowtown game was one of the test games for a new EFL Network live game feature called 'From the Field.' Scheduled to go live in 2019, the pay-for-play feature will allow you to watch the EFL game of your choice from field level with just the natural noises of the game. Hundreds of parabolic microphones, arranged to maintain balanced acoustics, will enable

the viewer, through a controller issued with the service, to "zoom-in" on any area of the field. As the video view narrows, the sounds emitted from that part of the field increase in volume. In effect, the entire stadium is "mic'd up." It was through the viewing of the raw footage of the Sebastian sideline, as part of the "coach consultation process," that Coach Lemmon became aware of the embarrassing tug-of-war between his co-offensive coordinators.

The same source who provided me with a copy of the 'From the Field' Sebastian sideline video also informs me that **Stedman Techner** will be released by the Swordfish later this week; but not because he tried to wrestle the play-calling duties from **Dan Henning**. It will be because the 'Accelerator' plays he designed had been exposed as frauds. Coach Lemmon now knew exactly what those plays were and who had called them. Rather than a "compellingly agile suite of field elongation techniques," as Techner had characterized them, the 'Accelerators' were in fact basic deep fly patterns to different receivers out of the same alignment. It was one of the oldest plays in the passing playbook, but without any deceptions built into the design to buy a quarterback time or get a safety to bite.

This incident will not reflect well on EFL Football University. Nor will it prop up the 'new generation' of play designers – the best-in-class geniuses flooding a once brutal but simple game with 1000-page playbooks in the hope of creating the next winning system. Most of them will not be successful. But, in Sebastian's case, at least a season will not be wasted figuring that out.

MANNION-HANDLED

When will enough be enough for the Curse of the Blue Eagles? Has not **Chris Dickinson** suffered plenty? Apparently not. *The Curse'* is alive and well and messing not only with the Blue Eagles, but with the balance of power in the North Division. In Week One, *Aaron Rodgers* went down with broken collarbone in the 4th quarter of a game the Eagles were trailing in. It effectively ensured that there would be no last-minute comeback as his replacement, *Brock Osweiler*, was not up to the job of engineering two scoring drives in less than five minutes against the Corn Kings.

Heading into Week Two against Durham at Jurassic Park, the hope that a week of first-team reps would make a difference in Osweiler's play faded with each non-productive drive. The Thunder Lizards were not pulling away, but the lack of production from the Scarborough quarterback, and a questionable gamble on 4th down at the Durham 23, handed the home team more than enough opportunities to secure a comfortable lead before Osweiler also went down to injury.

Third-stringer *Sean Mannion*, whose last live action came with Carthage in 2015 and who could not secure playing time on a 1-15 New Jersey team last year, entered the game in the third quarter, his team trailing 18-0. He managed to look even *worse* than Osweiler. There are bad interceptions then there are *really* bad interceptions; Mannion's first of two picks, coming in the Durham red zone, is one of the latter. A play that looked set-up for success turned ugly when an unpressured Mannion threw the ball directly to Durham safety, *Devin McCourty* at the 10-yard line. The play was designed as a slant to *DeSean Jackson*. The speedy wide-out had a step on *Tyrann Mathieu* and might have scored. But the ball was so far off target that it went straight into the arms of the safety playing containment.

Mannion strode back to the bench, a look of bewilderment on his face. He was not greeted kindly by Head Coach, **Chris Dickinson**, whose usual amiable manner had been subject to undue strain in two weeks of inadequate football. "That safety wasn't even in the play!" he barked. "You put him in the play with that shitty throw!"

The Blue Eagles' defence did not give up. *Derrick Morgan* blew up a slow-developing screen and strip-sacked *Cam Newton*, handing the ball back to the offence in Durham territory. But a three-and-out as the 3rd quarter neared a close put the turnover to waste.

Early in the 4th quarter, a series of short passes – not all of them designed to be short – with some running plays sprinkled in created the veneer of a drive from the Blue Eagles' 33 to the Durham 26. Progress was being made, but it was not comfortable or confident progress. The feeling that it was not going to last proved to be when Mannion failed to step up in the pocket under pressure and tossed a check down off his back foot in the direction of *TJ Yeldon*. The Durham secondary, sensing a collapse, converged. Mannion's pass fluttered like a butterfly, hanging up long enough for McCourty to get a hand on it. The deflection went into the arms of corner *Terence Newman* for another interception.

The game was essentially over at that point, but the pain of watching the Blue Eagles try to mount a comeback with their third string quarterback continued. The torture ended at the 2:08 mark of the 4th quarter, when Mannion missed *Brandon LaFell* from 4 yards away on 4th and 2 at the Scarborough 26. Yes, 4 yards...maybe 4 and-a-half. Unsympathetic to his opponent's pitiful plight, Durham coach **George Kaldis** ran the ball down the throat of the defence to pass the time remaining in the game. He called pitches and an off tackle before concluding the punishment with 2-yard dive for a touchdown by *Carlos Hyde* to make the final, 25-0.

I only relate this game to you in some detail because I wish to emphasize a point that, in the abstract, cannot be emphasized enough. The Blue Eagles are F&*KED! *Brock Osweiler* has a bad shoulder injury that will keep him out for at least 6 weeks. *Aaron Rodgers* is looking at a Week Eight return, if recovery goes perfectly. More likely he will be cleared to play by Week Nine.

As uninspiring as it was to watch Osweiler in action, the "eye test" in limited action indicates at least faint hope that he could engineer a victory against the right opponent with the Scarborough defence playing well. On the other hand, the "eye test" for Mannion required protective goggles to endure. There is no way the Blue Eagles will win a game against a competent opponent with him under center. It certainly would be unusual, but not the first time, a team was forced to trade for a quarterback by the Week 4 deadline. The Blue Eagles would be wise to do so or they will be staring at an 0-8 start.

AROUND THE EFL

The trials and tribulations of the Blue Eagles notwithstanding, it was another competitive and fun week of football in the EFL. I cannot get to all of the games, but here are a few that stood out to me:

In high winds at New Era Field in Buffalo both the Bombers and the Derailers turned to the ground game to move the ball. The Derailers won that battle, compiling 194 rushing yards to set up 2 rushing TDs and a 55-yard *Jake Elliott* field goal in the 4th quarter that would turn out to be the game-winner. Trailing by 3, Bruxelles had a chance to tie the game late, regaining possession at their own 46 with 1:09 left, but no timeouts remaining. But a disastrous series of plays, starting with a dive into the line for 0 yards by running back *Chris Thompson*, followed by an *Al Woods* sack of *Marcus Mariota* then an interception by *Jaquiski Tartt* on a desperation bomb, sealed a 20-17 home-opening win for Derailers, their first victory under new management.

At Stone Pony Shore in New Jersey, Chargers kicker *Steven Hasuchka* drilled a kick from 43 yards as time expired to spoil the Wrecking Balls' home opener, 16-13. In a game where a field goal was the difference, coach **Bill Parcells** found himself on the hotseat after the game for the controversial decision to go for it on 4th & goal at the Charger 6-yard line with 10 seconds remaining in the first half and his team leading 7-3. Corner, *TJ Carrie* tipped away a pass to *Ted Ginn* and New Jersey came away with 0 points. When questioned, Parcells, wearing his Wrecking Balls ball cap backwards, a thick wrecking ball chain around his neck and a blue seamless wind shirt with a red left sleeve, postured aggressively and fired back in clipped tones: "We're going to try that most of the time - we're not going to let a chance to score 6 points pass us by. I have confidence in Jared - they, that Charger corner, made a good play there!" It was a curious retort from an "old school" coach who, at 77 years, is the oldest coach in the EFL. Trying such a gambit was never on the menu when he coached the NY Giants. But, like a man going through a midlife crisis, Parcells appears to be trying to keep up with a new, more aggressive coaching style fueled by analytics and the modern desire for instant gratification. Playing the field position "long game" is not sexy or admired. Not surprisingly, many people agree that Parcells was "right" to "take a shot" in that situation. But, as I see it, the final result of the game speaks more eloquently. "Taking a shot" means taking a chance and suffering the consequences of missing. In this case, the consequences were no shot at the 3 points that would have come in handy as Hauschka's kick sailed through the uprights for the game-winning field goal as time expired.

At Kelly-Burke Field in Erieau, the clickety-clunkety Cadillac passed the Knights on the shoulder and finished in front by a field goal, winning 23-20. The Cadillac managed just 9 first downs and *Matt Stafford* completed just 4 passes in the win. But two of those passes went to *Jordy Nelson* for TDs of 57 and 26 yards; while a 90-yard kickoff return for a touchdown by *Pharoh Cooper* eliminated the need for a sustained offensive attack. Oh, and the 8 sacks and 5 turnovers forced by the Caddies helped as well. The Knights started *Andy Dalton*, but yanked him for *Josh McCown* in the 3rd with the game tied at 13. The move backfired. McCown was strip-sacked twice and picked twice, causing irreversible damage to LA's chances. It was another LA QB-shuffle that didn't work out. Meanwhile, Erieau cannot win like this every week. They need to find a solution to their puttering offence.

At Patriot Place in Charleswood, the Pats got off to a fast start but in the end could not withstand the comeback magic of **Russell Wilson** in falling to the Cubs, 31-28. A **Jalen Mills** pick-six to open the scoring followed by two **Blake Bortles** TDs – a 26-yard run and a 5-yard pass to **Duke Johnson Jr** – staked Charleswood to a 21-7 half time lead. But both sides of the Cubs' squad came to play in the 2nd half. Interceptions by **AJ Bouye** and **Casey Hayward** set up two Iowa TDs in the 3rd while a 27-yard designed run by Wilson tied the game at 28 with 5:28 left in the 4th. After a stop by the Cubs' defence near mid-field, Wilson sparked the game-winning drive with another sweep, gaining 28 yards, then connected with **Mike Wallace** for 30 yards on 3rd and 1 to set up **Justin Tucker** for the 30-yard game-winner as time expired. Cubs fans are relieved to see "their Russell" back in form.

At Ferenc-Liszt International Airport Stadium in Budapest, a resurgent *Ben Roethlisberger* continued his hot pace early in the season with a four-TD performance against the North Stars to lead the Gladiators to a 28-21 victory. Big Ben usually takes a few weeks to get going, but not this year. The quarterback that Georgian fans love to hate but couldn't do without got solid support in the run game from *Alex Collins* and rookie, *Sony Michel* and a good route-running performance out of *Jarvis Landry* to help him along. But the win would not have been possible without the "Big Guy" making precision throws when it mattered most. His hitch pass to Landry into double-coverage with 0:54 left was laser-guided and took out both defenders as they went for the pick, only to find the ball behind them. Landry turned up field for a 43-yard gain that set-up his own game-winning TD catch on the next play. The Glads are now 2-0 and tied for first place in the South with, of all teams, Toronto! The defence is still a soft spot, but if Big Ben continues to be "Good Ben," that may not matter too much.

Week Two is too early to panic but the Brooklin Hawks might want to consider in advance their plan when they do panic, since panicked decisions are always counter-productive. Just ask *Alex Smith*, who sensed pressure when there was none and failed to see *Trevor Williams* creeping up to jump a route to *Alex Cobb*. Williams' pick and 56-yard return turned a Brooklin red zone threat into a Toronto opportunity to put the game away, which they did five plays later on *DeMarco Murray*'s 1-yard dive for a TD to make the score 24-10, Wolverines. The score would stay that way and boost Toronto' record to 2-0 while dropping the Hawks to 0-2. Smith's imaginary pressure on that pivotal play was born of very real pressure all day. Toronto's defence, not known for its pass rush, harassed and harried Smith all game, sacking him 5 times and pressuring him 8 others. The Toronto secondary did the rest in holding the high-flying Hawks to just 10 points on their home field.

And finally, the Crusaders were victimized in their home opener by a fiery mad *Tom Brady* determined to bounce back after a dismal Week One showing in Budapest. Brady threw 4 TD passes in a 34-31 York victory over slow-starting Cincinnati.

ERIEAU @ BUFFALO (line - CADILLAC by 1)

INJURIES: Erieau – None; Buffalo – Sean McGrath (DOUBTFUL), Josh Rosen (OUT).

The Cadillac defence is leading the league in sacks and turnovers, covering up a pretty bendy backside-11 in terms of yards allowed. Still, this is a defence that cannot be trifled with. Its worst enemy is its own offence, which pushes it back onto the field before the oxygen has taken full effect. But this week they may want to be out on the field longer. It will mean more sacks and picks against a Buffalo offence that will offer up career back-up David Fales as a sacrifice. The Derailers lost starter Josh Rosen last week and with it any reasonable chance of competing against a defence like Erieau's. The only hope for the home team will lie in Aaron Donald and Bradley Chubb wreaking havoc in the Erieau backfield and causing an easily panicked Matt Stafford to panic. **PICK: ERIEAU**

ST. CHARLES @ VIRDEN (line – VIOLATORS by 6)

INJURIES: St. Charles – Zach Line (OUT); **Virden** – Leonard Floyd (OUT), Shane Ray (OUT), John Kuhn (OUT), Eric Berry (OUT), Marshall Yanda (OUT).

It did not take much for Virden's stock to rise. David Carr lit it up in the 2nd half while last year's sack leader Melvin Ingram got to the quarterback twice in a full-blown rout of Chino last week. The Violators are again Vegas darlings while the 2-0 Chargers, who won ugly last week after winning ugly the week before, seemingly get no respect. While it is unlikely the Chargers will rise to 3-0 on the road, the match-up is closer than people think. For one, the Violators are missing key defenders as well as their best O-lineman. Second, Carson Wentz is better than people give him credit for and he has targets to choose from and a solid running game behind him. This could mean trading blows with the balanced but explosive Virden attack anchored by Ezekiel Elliott. Expect to see a back-and-forth contest between two measured offences, with the odd quick strike thrown in for the highlight reel. **PICK: ST. CHARLES**

NEW JERSEY @ TWIN CITIES (line – WRECKING BALLS by 2)

INJURIES: New Jersey – Willie Henry (OUT); Twin Cities – Carson Palmer (OUT).

Even with the undefeated Mitchell Trubisky at the Triumph helm it seems that the Vegas favours Jared Goff and the Wrecking Balls to go into Wilhalla Stadium and steal one from under the noses of fanatical Triumph fans and their hot-tempered coach. While so far Trubisky has been more of threat to run than to pass – not a good sign for long-term success – Goff's credentials as the latest New Jersey saviour have yet to be established. New Jersey has more than one path to victory – the biggest one being a Trubisky meltdown – but they are matched, and more, by paths to defeat. The Triumph starting corners outclass Goff's wide receivers while Bobby Wagner and Jurrell Casey will ably lead the charge in the containment of LeSean McCoy. Two workhorse running backs are available to pound and weaken the soft middle of the Jersey D-line. Then there is always Antonio Brown. **PICK: TWIN CITIES**

CHINO @ SEATTLE (line – PILOTS by 7)

INJURIES: Chino – Austin Seferian-Jenkins (OUT); Josh Jackson (OUT), Ryan Kalil (OUT); **Seattle** – Brian O'Neill (QUESTIONABLE), Marshon Lattimore, Kam Chancellor (OUT).

Here is another puzzling line that seems to put a lot of weight in the Convicts 2nd half collapse last week against Virden and an apparent resurgence of the younger Manning into the top echelon of quarterbacks. The early weeks of any season are packed with anomalies as well as signs of emerging trends. Although clearly Eli Manning is throwing with a lot more confidence now that he has Michael Crabtree, it is fair to doubt that the Seattle airshow will continue here. The Convicts have some gamblers in the secondary

whose odds just increased with Eli in the pocket. In addition, one of the two pillars of the Seattle defence, Marshon Lattimore, is out. That will create opportunities for Dak Prescott to regain prior form. Chino needs this win desperately. **PICK: CHINO**

DURHAM @ PICKERING (line – THUNDER LIZARDS by 3)

INJURIES: Durham – Oren Burks (OUT); Pickering – Telvin Smith (OUT), Devonta Freeman (OUT), Tyvon Branch (OUT).

Neither team has shown its true colours yet after two weeks of play. A freakishly bad start followed by a freakishly bad opponent the next week does not permit a proper evaluation of the Lizards' team chemistry. The Spartans eked out an OT win in which Philip Rivers looked good then stumbled against Aurora when Rivers looked putrid in the 2nd half. So which Rivers will it be? One thing is certain, the "patient" defensive style currently in place in Sparta is leaving the unit on the field for long stretches and resulting in lots of yards surrendered and fatigue-induced penalties. Until they figure out how to force a three-and-out, the offence will have fewer chances to showcase its many strengths. One of those, Devonta Freeman is out this week. **PICK: DURHAM**

YORK @ SCARBOROUGH (line – EXCALIBURS by 9)

INJURIES: York – Brandon Scherff (OUT), Mike McGlinchey (OUT); **Scarborough** – Brock Osweiler (OUT), Aaron Rodgers (OUT), Cordy Glenn (OUT).

The Blue Eagles are in serious trouble at quarterback. Third stringer, Sean Mannion is the last man standing at the position after a bizarre twist of fate resulted in the starter and the back-up going down for long term injuries in successive weeks. Mannion did not look like a competent pro level replacement in 1½ quarters of action last week. Even an improved version here will leave Scarborough wanting much more. The Swords won't have to do much to walk away with a victory on the road. Basically, if they avoid a repeat of their Week One no-show against Budapest and Tom Brady doesn't die, they will be fine. **PICK: YORK**

COWTOWN @ BUDAPEST (line – CORN KINGS by 2)

INJURIES: Cowtown – Rodney McLeod (QUESTIONABLE), Ronald Darby (OUT); **Budapest** – Stefon Diggs (OUT), Orlando Scandrick (OUT), Jason Peters (OUT).

After two weeks of healthy home-cooking, the undefeated Corn Kings will be tested with a long trip to Budapest to face the sphinxlike North Stars. The Stars' offence looked much better in its loss than it did in its victory, suggesting that the defence will continue to be the primary factor in their success or lack thereof. The Cowtown defence has played a decisive role in both of their wins, shutting down opponents after the offence grabbed early leads. Joe Flacco has been steadier than expected, but his offence has consistently stalled in the second half. Tyrod Taylor continues to be an X-factor for Budapest. His personal numbers suggest a better QB than he actually is, but he is fully capable of making the pivotal play in a tight game. Losing Stefon Diggs hurts, but so does the loss of Ronald Darby on Cowtown's side. In the end, expect nothing less than an ugly game. **PICK: COWTOWN**

BROOKLIN @ SEBASTIAN (line – Pick'Em)

INJURIES: Brooklin – Brandon Williams (OUT); Sebastian – William Jackson (QUESTIONABLE);

Neither team can afford to lose but it is the Hawks who are up against the wall in a tougher division and see an 0-3 start as a death sentence. The Swordfish have to be concerned that maybe they have a serious rival in Cowtown, so the need to keep pace will keep them focused here. Drew Brees has so far failed to deliver on Hall-of-Fame expectations but it is not too late to start. The Hawks might be the kind of defence – a little older and a little slower than most – against which to get the job done. Alex Smith was relentlessly harried by the Toronto pass rush last week – a very bad sign for an offensive line that is reputed to be among the league's best. They must play better here against the ferocious Chandler Jones and Jadevoen Clowney. **PICK: SEBASTIAN**

TORONTO @ AURORA (line – MUSTANGS by 5)

INJURIES: Toronto - Tom Compton (OUT), Shawn Williams (OUT), John Simon (OUT); Aurora - Trent Williams (OUT).

The Mustangs are in the unprecedented situation of playing catch-up against Toronto! It's early, but when a team that has lost just 3 regular season games in four full seasons finds itself behind a team that has won only 6 games in its existence, the fact is worth mentioning. Despite Toronto's hot start, the Mustangs are rightly favoured here at home against a quarterback who is always ripe for the "picking" – if you know what I mean. But is 5 points the right number when you have a shutdown secondary facing off against a pass-happy home town QB who will be operating without blindside protector, Trent Williams? There are plenty of risks in the air for both teams. That does not mean that either coach won't be willing to take shots down field, but in the end the running games could prove to be the drivers of both offences in this contest. The Mustangs have been galloping at a good clip, averaging 5.4 yards a carry while burning up Kenyan Drake. Toronto has Saquon Barkley. Should be interesting. **PICK: TORONTO**

GEORGIA @ CINCINNATI (line – GLADIATORS by 2)

INJURIES: Georgia – Dominique Rodgers-Cromartie (PROBABLE), Reuben Foster (OUT); Cincinnati – None.

I expected this line to be more heavily in favour of Georgia, having come off two big wins to start the season. But Vegas is declaring that the Glads aren't as good as they look, while the Crusaders are not as bad as they look. I cannot disagree with either premise. The Cincinnati offence should be able to move and score against a Georgia defence full of holes that has been magically keeping opponents off the scoreboard while allowing the yards to pile up. The key for Cincy will be to get off to a fast start. They have had to play from behind in the second half of games so far due to being slow off the mark. The Glads will be relying on Big Ben to continue his hot hand against one of the shallower and more vulnerable secondaries around. If the "Good" Ben shows up, there won't be much the Crusaders can do to stop him. If, on the other hand, "Bad" Ben.... **PICK: CINCINNATI**

CHARLESWOOD @ BRUXELLES (line – PATRIOTS by 2)

INJURIES: Charleswood – Deshaun Watson (OUT), Marcus Gilbert (OUT), Jamie Collins (OUT); **Bruxelles** – Terrelle Pryor Sr (OUT), Anthony Walker Jr (OUT), Dede Westbrook (OUT), Mitch Morse (OUT).

According to *Odds-Dolphin* the chance of an 0-3 team making the playoffs falls to around 3%. The last EFL team to do so was York in 2013. Only two other EFL teams have accomplished it: The Knights of 2010 and the Gladiators of 2008. While greater league parity may allow for a sudden sharp shift in trends, leading to unexpected outcomes, the weight of probability remains against one of these teams after Week Three is over. The Bombers have not looked good in falling to last year's laughing stock, New Jersey, and to an anticipated finalist for this year's laughing stock, Buffalo. But the Pats have Blake Bortles at quarterback and, so far, he is proving to be a liability. The Pats have a pretty good defence to fall back on while the Bombers have not shown much offensively to this point. Expect Marcus Mariota to finally put something together in a close contest. **PICK: BRUXELLES**

IOWA CITY @ LOS ANGELES (line – KNIGHTS by 6)

INJURIES: Iowa City - None; Los Angeles - None.

I think this line is far off reality and it causes me to wonder what the bookies and bettors are seeing that I don't see. Certainly, Russell Wilson has been alarmingly shaky, along with kicker Justin Tucker, but it is still very early. Wilson overcame a slow start last week and finished by leading the team in rushing and making key plays on the game-winning field goal drive in their win over Charleswood. It was vintage Wilson at the end. The Knights, on the other hand, played quarterback roulette and ended up shooting themselves as Josh McCown melted down with 3 turnovers in the fourth quarter in their loss to Erieau. McCown will likely get the start against the Cubs this week, although he has done nothing to deserve it after last week's fiasco. Regardless of who gets the nod, it will difficult for the Knights to sustain a presence in the air against a Cubs' secondary that woke up last week with a pair of game-changing interceptions. It will be up to Le'Veon Bell again and that will not be enough. **PICK: IOWA CITY**





FROM THE EFL ARCHIVES – Week Two of the 2012 EFL Season was an eventful one. Undertaker QB, *Drew Brees* followed up his 620-yard, 7 TD pass performance of Week One with another 7 TD pass display, leading Death Valley to a 48-17 pummelling of the Mission Viejo Monarchs in the expansion franchise's first ever home game. With 14 TD passes in two weeks, Brees was on pace for 112 TD passes, an impossible pace. Or was it?

The Corn Kings extracted a measure of "revenge" for the naked fan incident that led to their playoff demise the

previous year by knocking off mighty Durham, 30-23. The Lizards looked in control through one half of play, but lost the handle on the victory in the 2nd half due to 4 turnovers that Cowtown turned into 24 2nd half points. The final turnover was the toughest to take. With the score tied and less than 3 minutes left, *Devin Hester* fumbled the kick return. *Kevin Walter* took it in on a pass from *Joe Flacco* from 19 yards out on next play for the game-winning score.

A fan strike in Mohave led by the Fan Liberation Association of Greater Mohave and Everywhere (FLAME) resulted in the first recorded use of replacement fans in pro football history. 30,000 Mexican sports fans from the Baja Peninsula and numerous border towns were bused up for the Hellfire's game against Chino. They created a lot of noise and, not really knowing the sport well, cheered for both teams as the Convicts thumped the "home" team, 41-17.

The two combatants in the 2011 EFL Championship were off to a combined 1-3 start after Week Two. The 1-1 LA Knights had famously lost to the Undertakers in Week One, while the Glads were 0-2 thanks largely to Big Ben's 6 interceptions and 2 fumbles.
