

- Roddy White caught 8 passes for 74 yards and 1 TD.
- Steve Smith caught 3 passes for 65 yards, including a 36-yarder that set up the winning field goal.
- Aaron Rodgers went 19 of 36 for 228 yards and 1 TD.
- Greg Little caught 5 passes for 84 yards seeing his first regular action of the season.

EAME SUMMARY: Facing their toughest defensive opponent of the season, the Knights got a big 4th-guarter play from a familiar source when Steve Smith snatched a short pass from Josh Freeman across the middle and darted 36 yards to the Scarborough 18 yard line. That set up Dan Carpenter for what would turn out to be the winning field goal from 28 yards away to give the Knights a 16-13 lead. The Blue Eagles dominated the 1st quarter, converting a 3rd down and 20 from deep in their own end on a 22-yard pass from Aaron Rodgers to Greg Little, then drawing a 15-yard facemask penalty against Antoine Bethea to spearhead a 77-yard field goal drive that gave them the early 3-0 then lead. *Ndamukong Suh* intercepted Freeman on the Knights' first possession, giving Scarborough a good opportunity to add more points. On their second play from scrimmage, Rodgers scrambled for a big gain, but Chris Kelsay punched the ball out of his hands, forcing a fumble that turned back the Scarborough surge and led to a Knights' field goal drive to tie the game, 3-3. The defences took over for the remainder of the first half, allowing no more points. The Knights broke the tie on their opening possession of the 2nd half, thanks to a 19-yard scramble by Freeman and an 18-yard run by Jamaal Charles that set up a 44-yard Carpenter field goal. Scarborough answered with a 54-yard Sebastien Janikowski field goal, only to fall behind on LA's next series when Roddy White made his third catch of the drive count for six points. The Blue Eagles got that back with the help of a 41-yard screen pass to Ray Rice that led to an eventual 1-yard TD pass to Heath Miller. Back-to-back holding penalties squelched Scarborough's next drive, allowing the Knights to gain possession and ice the game with a late field goal.

- Rashard Mendenhall led all skill players for the Undertakers with 69 yards from scrimmage, all rushing, on 26 carries.
- **Braylon Edwards** was the top receiver with 6 receptions for just 43 yards.
- ➤ **DeMarcus Ware** recorded 2 sacks, 2 QB pressures, 1 pass deflection and 1 forced fumble.
- **Jordan Shipley** made 2 catches for 73 yards, including a 61-yarder for a TD.
- Brian Cushing made 12 tackles and blocked a punt for a TD.

EAME SUMMARY: Bookend first half touchdowns by the Mustangs – a blocked punt and recovery for a TD by linebacker **Brian** Cushing, and a 20-yard TD pass from Matt Ryan to Dustin Keller - gave Garland a 14-10 lead over Death Valley at half time. The home team struggled to get their offence rolling early and had to rely on an interception by safety, *Rahim Moore*, returned to the Garland 37 yard line, to set up their lone first half major, a 7-yard pass from *Drew Brees* to *Aaron Hernandez*. The second half began well for the Undertakers as *Brandon* Tate returned the opening kickoff 70 yards to the Garland 24 yard line. Tate then dashed 10 yards on the end-around to spark a short and quick drive to pay dirt on Mario Manningham's 2-yard TD reception, making the score 17-14 for Death Valley. They added to that lead less than six minutes later when Clay Matthews, who had already bagged two out of a four-sack day, picked off a bad pass caused by a Gerald McCoy hit on Ryan as he released the ball. With no Mustang between him and the goal line, Matthews took it 45 yards to the house to increase his team's lead to 24-14. Garland struck back shortly when Ryan found Jordan Shipley open over the middle and the speedy Mustang sprinted 61 yards through the Undertaker secondary for a TD to make it 24-21. The Undertakers responded with their longest drive of the day to put the game away as Rashard Mendenhall carried 10 times for 34 yards as part of an 18-play, 71-yard drive for a TD on a 4-yard pass to Devin Hester.

- Running back Maurice Jones-Drew fought for 74 yards and his first TD of the season on 24 carries.
- **Todd Heap** caught 6 passes for 53 yards and 1 TD subbing for injured Zach Miller.
- Violators QB Eli Manning completed 16 of 24 for 220 yards, but also threw 3 interceptions to 0 touchdowns.
- Julio Jones was a bright spot for Virden, catching 5 passes for 113 yards, including a 78-yarder.
- Paul Posluszny had a busy day for Virden's defence, making 14 tackles.

EAME SUMMARY: Sean Jones intercepted Eli Manning on Virden's opening possession, returning it 49 yards to the Violators' 24 yard line. Six plays later, Joe Flacco found Todd Heap on a fly route for a 7-yard TD pass to give Cowtown an early 7-0 lead, quieting the screaming crowd at *TERRORDOME*. The Violators responded with their longest possession of the afternoon, holding the ball for 7:35 minutes and moving it 64 yards before **Stephen Tulloch** shut the door in the red zone with a tackle and forced fumble of Manning on a scramble. The ball was recovered by Virden and Lawrence Tynes kicked a 34-yard field goal that would make the score 7-3, the closest it would be for the remainder of the game. The Corn Kings came right back, bolstered by a 46-yard kick-off return by Bernard Scott and a 15-yard run by Brandon Jackson, to score on a rare carry by fullback, Earnest Graham, good for a 13-yard TD run to make it 14-3 for Cowtown. After a Charles Godfrey pick of Manning thwarted another Virden opportunity, Flacco directed an 83-yard drive in which he completed 7 of 8 for 76 yards, finishing with a 10-yard TD pass to **Devery Henderson** for a 21-3 lead. Just before half time, Virden threatened when a 78-yard pass to Julio Jones moved the ball to the Cowtown 7 with 49 seconds remaining. But Virden could not cross the goal line and had to settle for another field goal before half time. The Corn Kings dominated 2nd half play with **Santana Moss** catching his league-leading 8th TD to complete the rout.

EAME SUMMARY: Despite missing **Adrian Peterson** due to injury, the Pats moved the ball with ease on their opening possession. With back-up *Mike Goodson* contributing in both the running and passing games, the Pats moved the ball 73 yards into position for a Goodson TD run from the one-foot line, making it 7-0, Charleswood. After getting nowhere on their first drive, the Thunder Lizards caught a break near the end of the 1st quarter when **Dominique Rodgers-Cromartie** picked off **Peyton Manning** and returned it to the Pats' 28 yard line. A daring 4th down gamble just inside the Pats' red zone kept the ensuing drive alive and, on the next play, Philip Rivers found Calvin Johnson open for a 17-yard TD pass to even the score at 7-7. After the Pats were forced to punt on 4th & 29, the Lizards used three different running backs and two QBs to move the ball 83 yards and finally cap the drive with a 5-yard TD pass to Dwayne Bowe for a 14-7 lead. Charleswood scored a guick field goal after an out-of-bounds kick to trail 14-10 at the half. To open the 3rd guarter, Rivers completed three consecutive passes for a total of 50 yards to penetrate inside the Charleswood 10 yard line. On 3rd and goal at the 6, Rivers found Bowe in the end zone for their second TD hook-up and a 21-10 Durham lead. The Lizards added a field goal to make it 24-10 then the Pats used short passes to march back up the field and score on Goodson's second TD run to pull within one score, 24-17, with 8 minutes remaining. After South Carolina turned the ball over on downs at the Chino 32 yard line, the Convicts responded with a 4th down gamble of their own at the South Carolina 41 yard line. Facing 4th and 1, *Cam Newton* delivered a strike to *Hines Ward* in stride for a 19-yard gain. With the Regulators on their heels, the Convicts used a mix of run and pass to reach the 2 yard line where Newton connected with Ward at the pylon for a 2-yard TD pass to open the scoring. South Carolina overcame poor field position at their 6 yard line to drive into position for a 44-yard *Nate Kaeding* field goal to make up 3 points of the 7-point deficit. However, that would be all the offence South Carolina would be able to generate against Chino's oppressive defence. The situation fell apart quickly for the visitors when *Javier Arenas* muffed a punt at his own 19 yard line that was recovered by Chino's *Marcus Gilchrist*. On the next play, *Derrick Mason* got behind the Regulator's safeties for an easy 19-yard TD pass and a 14-3 Chino lead that held up until half time. The second half started slowly for both teams, but the Convicts finally broke through late in the 3rd quarter when Newton scrambled 13 yards for another TD to make it 21-3. Unable to gain even a first down, South Carolina gradually gave away field position, leading to a couple of Chino field goals to round out the scoring in a certain and dreary game.

Leading 28-3 at the 8:50 mark of the 4th quarter on the strength of an EFL record seven field goals by *Josh Brown*, the Glads looked to have things well in hand when *Arian Foster* broke across the goal line from one foot out at the 5:31 mark to make the score 28-10. The Glads' offence, with *Tyler Thigpen* under centre for an injured *Vince Young*, went three-and-out, setting up an electrifying 72-yard punt return by *Dexter McCluster* to close the gap to 28-17 with just under 4 minutes remaining in the game. When Gwinnett got the ball back, Thigpen found *Reggie Wayne* for a 15-yard completion to gain an important first down, but followed that up with two ineffective runs by *Ahmad Bradshaw* and an incomplete pass to force another punt. Backed up at their 15 yard line, *Sam Bradford* converted a 3rd and 1 with a 5-yard pass to *Kellen Winslow* then connected with *Mike Wallace* for 25 yards to cross mid-field into Gwinnett territory. With the remaining fans starting to cheer, Bradford hooked-up deep with a streaking Wallace for a 46-yard TD pass. In between, the Hellfire kept it on the ground with runs of 33, 10 and 25 yards by *Chris Ivory* and a 17-yard rumble by Mike Tolbert to set up a 4-yard TD pass from Matt Schaub to Benjamin Watson to tie it at 7-7. After a 26-yard TD pass from Matt Cassel to Harvin to give Pickering a 14-7 advantage, Mohave tied it with the help of a 50-yard reception by Watson that set up a 3-yard TD pass from Schaub to Watson again as the Spartans came after Tolbert on the play. In the second half, Pickering broke the scoring pattern with a 25-yard field goal from Josh Scobee after Percy Harvin returned a punt 31 yards to the Mohave 24 yard line. The Hellfire got those three points back thanks to passes of 33 yards to Donald Driver and 22 yards to Hakeem Nicks that set up Rob Bironas for a 27-yard field goal. Pickering moved the ball into Mohave territory on the strength of 29 yards rushing by Johnson and *Taiwan Jones* and a 13-yard pass to *Anguan Boldin*, then converted 3rd and 10at the 26 with a 17-yard pass to Darren Sproles. On the next play, Johnson found room off right tackle to jog into the end zone from 9 yard out for 31-17 Pickering lead. GAME SUMMARY: The North Stars shut down York on their first two possessions and scored on both of theirs to grab a 10-0 lead mid-way through the first quarter. The Excaliburs would break the chains of the Markham defence in explosive fashion on their next possession when Michael Crabtree snared a short pass across the middle from Tom Brady and ran 88 yards for a scintillating touchdown to narrow the Markham advantage to 10-7. But the North Stars would immediately snatch back the 10-point advantage following an 89-yard kick-off return by Stefan Logan to the Excaliburs' 9 yard line. After narrowly averting disaster when Mark Sanchez recovered his own fumble after a hit by Brian Urlacher at the 10 yard line, the struggling Markham quarterback recovered with a perfectly thrown strike to Kenny Britt over the middle for a 10-yard TD pass. Markham made the score 24-7 in their favour early in the 2nd quarter when rookie cornerback, **Prince Amukamara** picked off Brady at the York 20 yard line and returned it to the house. The Excaliburs fought back with the help of a pass interference call on Markham's Scott Fujita that allowed them to convert a key third down. Then, Brady hooked up with Michael Jenkins for 21 yards and Deon Butler for 30 yards to set up a 5-yard TD run by Brandon Jacobs to pull back within 10 points, trailing 24-14. Markham added a 39-yard David Akers field goal and led at half time 27-14. The North Stars got the ball first in the second half and, on the strength of a 15-yard run by **DeAngelo Williams** and a 19-yard slant to Jared Cook, added another field goal to make the score 30-14. The York offence abandoned the running game and deployed five-wide receiver sets to catch-up but despite 357 yards passing by Brady, only managed one more major in a 38-22 loss.



A two-sack, two-knockdown performance by **DeMarcus Ware** was over-shadowed completely by Matthews, who looks right now like the most dangerous defensive player in the league. He may also be the most psychotic.

Following his interception and touchdown, Matthews delivered a chest-pounding howl of primal jubilation hardly distinguishable from rage. He then sprinted to the Death Valley bench, knocking over coolers, equipment, and violently shoving aside photographers and assistant coaches in order to pick up a lone pigeon that had been snacking on bits of popcorn from a container tossed onto the field. In a scene reminiscent of Ozzy Osbourne's bat-biting incident, Matthews placed the struggling pigeon in his mouth and gnawed its head off, spitting it out at a television camera operator who managed to catch the worst parts of the act on video before he was also thrown aside by the over-excited Matthews.

Ray Lewis raced over and attempted to contain his teammate but Matthews picked him up and tossed him like a child into **John Kasay's** practice net. He then jumped into the stands and started picking fans up and shaking them, pausing briefly to chug down a beer snatched from the chubby hands of a large petrified man wearing a **Drew Brees** jersey. Stadium

security personnel stood motionless while this transpired, clearly intimidated beyond response. The rampage ended suddenly when defensive coordinator, **Darth Vader**, alertly hissed, "Clay! Death Grip on the field!" 'Death Grip' is the Undertakers' name for their favoured 3-4 defensive formation. Matthews suddenly stopped, dropped a terrified young boy into the lap of his dad, and leaped out of the stands onto the field for another chance to sack **Matt Ryan**.

That he did - two more times - thanks in part to the panic of right tackle *Jason Smith*, who received no help against the rampaging Matthews and ended up clutching, grabbing and tripping him repeatedly just to slow him down. The referees, in a rare and humane gesture rooted in pity, turned a blind eye to the most blatant string of offensive lineman penalties this writer has personally ever seen.

Incredibly, this clearly excessive celebration by Matthews did not receive an unsportsmanlike penalty from the zebras. Perhaps they were understandably afraid for their personal safety, but the non-call makes the 15-yards assessed last year against the Hellfire's *Terrell Owens*, for using the football as a pillow after scoring a touchdown, look absurd in retrospect.

I'M A BELIEVER

I have been quietly waiting for the collapse of the Knights and their young quarterback, *Josh Freeman* since...well, since Week Two, to be honest. After watching the Knights perform this week in a 19-13 hard fought win over the Blue Eagles, I will no longer wait for it because I do not believe it is coming. The Knights are for real, for once. Their fans believe it, too. The hottest-selling item at Round Table Stadium was the "Property of the LA Knights – NO PASSING ZONE" T-shirts on sale exclusively for the Blue Eagles' game. They also wear their white jerseys at home now to promote an upbeat and positive "White Knight" image – part of the team's overall "re-focusing," as **Gabrielle Laurent-Vainluven** likes to put it.

That does not mean I expect Los Angeles to go undefeated. I expect they will lose a couple of games, starting perhaps as early as next week when they host Charleswood, or in three weeks when they visit Pickering. But the reality is that they appear to be the class of the Pacific-Atlantic Conference as we near the mid-point of the season and there is no compelling reason to believe they will not continue to get the job done on both offence and defence.

Freeman did not have his best day statistically against a persistent Blue Eagles' pass rush, but he kept his head, and found a way to get the job done in the second half when it mattered most. This is a sign that he can handle the pressure perhaps the biggest determining factor in being a winner.

On the other side of the contest, despite a 4-3 record, Scarborough poses a big challenge for their opponents, even when missing key players like *Brandon Marshall*, *DeSean Jackson*, *Antonio Cromartie* and, after the second quarter, shutdown cornerback *Darrelle Revis*. The Blue Eagles are better than their record and are likely the best team in the EFL. They are just going through a difficult stretch to start the season as "Jonesy" and his buddies translate then try to grasp the old Dragons' Mandarin playbook.

In the final analysis, being the "best" this year carries a different meaning from 2010. Unlike last year, when two Super-powers took aim at each over a battlefield littered with cannon-fodder, competition at the upper echelons of the league this year is much closer and less predictable. **LA** is right up there with the likes of **Scarborough**, **Gwinnett**, **Charleswood**, and **Pickering**; and any of *those* teams could fall on a given day to the likes of **Death Valley**, **Durham**, **Cowtown** and recharged **Chino** led by rookie **Cam Newton**. It is already shaping up to be a great playoff race and an even better post-season.

THE LOST LEGEND

It would have been the stuff of legend if they had managed to pull it off, but the Cubs fell short of a near-miraculous 4th quarter comeback against the Gladiators this week. In the end they lost 28-25, running out of time against a Gwinnett squad close to panic and visibly falling apart.

The drama started with **Dave Birdsall's** crew comfortably ahead by 25 points, 28-3, with just under 9 minutes remaining. The Glads had the game well in hand and they knew it. They sat in a three-man front with five defensive backs and watched impassively as *Arian Foster* appeared to be running out the clock for them. *How convenient and sporting of the Cubs to roll over and move on to Week Eight*, the Glads must have thought as Foster pounded away with runs of 9, 5, 7, 9, 7, 5 yards into Gwinnett territory as time ticked away. Suddenly, the possum came alive. Sam Bradford started passing and, before you knew it, the Cubs were at the Gwinnett one-foot line. It was an easy TD for Foster at the 5:31 mark to make the score 28-10. Oh well, no big deal: 18-point lead, 5 minutes; *do the math.* A sleepy Gwinnett offence, with *Tyler Thigpen* behind centre,

lazily handed the ball off to **Ahmad Bradshaw** twice and threw safe, and incomplete, on third down to force a punt. A bleary-eyed *Andy Lee* woke up from his nap and absent-mindedly punted low and straight to *Dexter McCluster* who fired up the afterburners and ran straight through the sleep-walking Gladiator coverage for a 72-yard punt return TD.

Score: Gwinnett 28, Iowa City 17, with 3:46 remaining.

A few eyebrows furrowed on the Gwinnett sideline as it dawned on the astute among them that Thigpen was in the game for an injured *Vince Young* and the deactivated *Ben Roethlisberger* was in the locker room cleaning jock-straps as a punishment for being himself. Still, all they really needed was a first down, which would surely put the game out of reach for the rookie Bradford against the Glads' defence. They got that first down on a pass to *Reggie Wayne*, but the Cubs used the two-minute warning and burned a timeout to save precious seconds. Thigpen threw incomplete on 3rd down to stop the clock.

A suddenly alert *Andy Lee* punted out of bounds, away from McCluster this time, giving the ball over to the Cubs at their 15 yard line with just 1:40 remaining. Bradford went to the air deep and connected with *Mike Wallace* for 25 yards to break into Gwinnett territory. That was what is called a WARNING, but the Glads did not really heed it. They moved from their 3-4 into a 3-3 and sat in mid-zone coverage. Wallace burned past safety, *Troy Polamalu* and Bradford laid a beautiful spiral into his waiting hands for a 46-yard TD pass. After a successful two-point conversion the Cubs were suddenly within a field goal with 26 seconds and one timeout remaining.

It really felt at that moment that the Cubs were going to recover the onside kick that everyone knew was coming. So, with hearts thumping in Gwinnett, *LeSean McCoy* became an instant hero when he recovered the bouncing dribbler delivered by *Neil Rackers*. The mad scramble at the end of this contest contains lessons for both teams and for those who choose to take note from afar. Football is a game of emotion and momentum and it can swing as quickly against you as it can for you. So when you have a team on the ropes, put them away without mercy. Conversely, when all appears lost, it is not necessarily so, but it certainly will be if you give up. Sadly, this entire late drama over-shadowed a record performance by Gwinnett kicker, *Josh Brown*, who kicked seven field goals in seven tries and accounted for 22 of the Gladiators' 28 points.

MOJOE

The Corn Kings have "Mo-Joe." That's what they're calling it in Cowtown, where *Joe Flacco* is suddenly the talk of the town in a good way after being a dirty word in 2010. When townsfolk were angry last year (as they often were) it became customary to say, "Flac this!" or "Flac that!" when confronted with a bad situation. When you did something wrong, you "Flacked up," and when you wanted to let someone know they had offended you, a strongly-delivered, "Flac Off, Motherflacker," would get the point across. The customary homemade pies delivered by famers' wives or daughters to local heroes' homes were a rare sight at the Flacco residence last season. This year, there are too many pies for his family to eat, not to mention the jars of preserves, wheels of cheese, sides of bacon, sausages, and cartons of eggs that appear daily on the Corn Kings' quarterback's doorstep. He also has more cars than his driveway can accommodate as dealerships across Cow County compete through giveaways to entice Joe to drive a vehicle from their lot. Absurdly, six streets in downtown Cowtown have been recently renamed in honour of the EFL's leading quarterback, causing confusion at the local post office, and the portion of Highway 1 that bi-sects the municipality has been renamed the 'Flacco Freeway.'

This is all well and good for Joe, but when a community goes this crazy over a 6-1 record, he should be very afraid of how they will react "when the corn pops," as they say. Much as I have enjoyed watching the Corn Kings come out of nowhere to ambush teams on the way to a share of first place in the North Division, I can see the whole barn of cards collapsing as soon as next week when they face the Gladiators.

This week they looked impressive again, handing Virden the worst of their five losses, 38-6. But the Violators were missing so much of their starting defence that Even *Lance Barrate's* 'Handbook of Dirty Tricks' (the Violator playbook) had no answer for the Cowtown offence. When the Violators had the ball themselves, *Eli Manning* was only too happy to give it back, throwing his 16, 17th and 18th interceptions of the year.

AROUND THE EFL


4th DOWN GAMBLE WORKS! - After being generally critical of making "un-conventional" 4th down conversion attempts a conventional practice, especially when the teams engaging in the practice suck; I can say that there is a time and place for everything. It happened in Durham this week when the Thunder Lizards, looking for any kind of spark to get their offence on track, down 7-0 early in the 2nd quarter and positioned just inside the Charleswood red zone at the 19, turned up their nose at the field goal try and went for it on 4th down and 1. With entire Pats' defence focused on inside running specialist *Michael Turner*, fullback *Tony Richardson* got the surprise call and caught the Pats off-balance just long enough to gain 2 yards and a first down. On the next play, *Philip Rivers* won the lottery and connected with a wide open *Calvin Johnson* for a 17-yard TD pass that got the Thunder Lizards' offence on a roll and started what would turn out to be Rivers' best outing of the 2011 season in a big 34-17 win over Charleswood.

There is a NEW kid in TOWN: his first name's Cam and the town is Chino. The rookie has transformed a Convicts squad that was 0-4 and appeared to be going nowhere into a 3-4 playoff contender. Yes, you read that right: 'playoff contender.'

After the big three in the PAC: Los Angeles, Charleswood and Death Valley; Chino currently holds the final playoff spot. While more a testament to the shortcomings of the competition than to the strength of the Convicts, it is nevertheless a position that Rob Nazar will take if he can keep it. Chino is 3-0 since turning in desperation to Newton as their starter in place of the ineffective Jay Cutler. While his latest victory came easily, 27-3, at the expense of a South Carolina squad incapacitated by injuries, Newton must still be given credit for doing what he had to do: lead the offence with a pair of TD passes and another TD on a 13-yard scramble. It was a game the Convicts were expected to win and there is nothing worse than losing a game in those circumstances - just ask Jay Hammond.

STARS GO SUPER-NOVA – I should have known what would happen when I completely disrespected **Darrin Jones'** team last week and called for a winless remainder of the season. His band of Mirthless Men responded as part of me knew they would, but the rational part of me thought was impossible. They beat York at Camelot. Not only beat, beat *up*. At 38-22, it was a complete trouncing in which the North Stars looked like almost any team in the league *other* than the North Stars.

Jones not only called a great game, his players *responded*. On the other sideline, response is the missing ingredient in *Tom Brady's* sleep-walk of a season. No matter what the discouraged **Jay Hammond** does with the offence, Brady looks exactly the same from week-to-week: confused and

Defenders of the Swords' team leader suggest that is part of the problem: Brady and his wide receivers are not on the same page, and even if they were, the receivers are not gaining separation from defenders. Brady is getting time to throw; there is just nobody open to throw to. The York approach to this problem is to try even harder to pass the ball. Five-wide receiver sets were the order of the day late in the Markham game. Perhaps it's time to take some heat off the big guy and give under-used *Darren McFadden* the ball.

THERMOPYLAE REVISITED – It was a good game at Thermopylae Stadium with the Spartans holding off a late rally by the Hellfire to prevail 31-24. With 13 yards to go and 6 seconds left on the clock, *Kerry Rhodes* tipped a pass in the end zone with no time remaining to save the game. As suddenly as he flips the switch into this temporary trance, he is capable of flipping it back and talking lucidly about the football aspects of the game. Oh well! His team won a championship and is 6-1 to start the 2011 season, so fans of the Spartans can indulge a bit of harmless delusion by their owner, GM and coach.

JiMMy'S Week EIGHT picks

CHARLESWOOD @ LOS ANGELES (line - KNIGHTS by 5)

After a 4-0 start beating up on their Division rivals and a Jay Cutler-led Chino, the Pats ran into a string of good teams and went 1-2 in those contests. Most concerning to Pats fans is the score differential in the two losses: -31 points versus Pickering and -17 points against Durham. Charleswood is falling down the rankings in both offence and defence due to a combination of injuries and lack of depth. Fortunately, Adrian Peterson returns at running back. Unfortunately, Ed Reed is still out at safety. The Knights are riding a wave of euphoria after their big win last week against Scarborough and have to guard against a hangover. One of the several keys to their perfect record after seven games is ball control; the Knights have turned the ball just 6 times to rank second in the league. Meanwhile, the Pats have turned it over a total of 12 times – 7 of those came during in their two losses. Holding onto the ball will be the key to a Charleswood upset, but don't count on it. **PICK: LOS ANGELES**

MOHAVE @ CHINO (line – CONVICTS by 7)

Since the arrival of their Messiah, Cam Newton, the Convicts are 3-0 and back in the race for a playoff spot. Newton has been fantastic, both passing the ball and running it; he has gained 200 yards with his feet for a 7.2 yard-per-carry average. As much as this has been a boon to the Convicts, the strength of the team remains the defence, which ranks No. 1 in efficiency, surrendering a stingy 4.7 yards per play. The Hellfire are finally starting to move the ball in both phases of the attack but may be without Terrell Owens in addition to both of their starting offensive tackles. Both teams tend to start slow, but of the two it is Mohave that must hope to break that trend this week, or face an uphill battle trying to come from behind on the road against Ngata and Partners, Ltd. **PICK: MOHAVE**

VIRDEN @ IOWA CITY (line - CUBS by 6)

If the Violators manage to grab a lead, you can bet they will do everything in their power to put the Cubs down as long as the clock is ticking. The 8-minute, 22-point, explosion by the Cubs in the fourth quarter that nearly made history against Gwinnett last week shows what their offence *can* do when it is clicking on all cylinders. The Cubs have no injuries to report on offence while Virden's defence remains shredded by injuries to several starters – most notably LaRon Landry, DeMeco Ryans and Carlos Dunlap. Somehow, I don't think Virden will have to worry about stopping a fourth quarter comeback by the Cubs this week. **PICK: IOWA CITY**

YORK @ DEATH VALLEY (line - UNDERTAKERS by 6)

If they can weather the Death Valley blitz (and it is a gigantic "IF") Tom Brady will have opportunities to pick apart a vulnerable Undertakers' secondary. It is not a *bad* secondary in Death Valley, just a malingering one that has failed to perform up to its average potential. In order to slow down Clay the Barbarian and his more civilized, but equally violent, brethren in the 'Fearsome Foursome,' York is going to have to find a way to plug Darren McFadden into the game plan. York's thought-to-be star running back has carried the ball a mere 17 times

over the past four games after getting his number called 37 times in the first three games. Is he secretly injured, or is Jay Hammond so obsessed with fixing the sputtering passing game that he has forgotten one of the gems of his offence? For Death Valley, Andre Johnson is still out, which is significant in itself but less so when you look at the Excaliburs' corner tandem. PICKERING @ GARLAND (line – SPARTANS by 6)

The Garland offence is struggling, their defence less so. It takes a lot to go wrong when you are 1-6 and the Mustangs are succeeding at finding ways to keep all aspects of their game faltering at the same time. Looking at their personnel, it is a little baffling that they have won just one game and lie near the bottom of the league in yards gained and are last in points scored. Criticism has been levied at the Offensive Coordinator for nonsensical play-calling and rash fourth down gambles. That could be it. If it is, something better change this week or the Mustangs will find themselves on the back end of another blowout in front of their home fans as Chris Johnson runs the exhausted 'Thoroughdeads' into the ground. **Pick: PICKERING**

DURHAM @ SOUTH CAROLINA (line – THUNDER LIZARDS by 3)

As bad as things are in Garland they are much worse at the moment in South Carolina. This is more due to a severe string of injuries than it is a problem with the game plan or personnel. The Regulators were not going to win any playoff berth, but 1-6 is a little harsh even for this mediocre team. Help is on the way as Frank Gore, Tony Romo and Austin Collie continue to mend, but the cavalry will not arrive this week. Every safety on the roster is either out, doubtful or questionable, while linebacker Brandon Spikes joins the list of casualties. Against Charleswood last week, the Thunder Lizards looked in command for the first time all year and many believe they have turned a corner. Even if they haven't, there is nothing standing in their way this week in the Deep South. Mark this down as Jimmy's Week Eight "lock-pick." **Pick: DURHAM**

SCARBOROUGH @ MARKHAM (line – BLUE EAGLES by 1)

Markham is coming off a huge win over York on the road while Scarborough is licking its wounds after losing a brutal "Melee in LA" last week. It was nice while it lasted, but Joe Flacco and Santana Moss have peaked, while their defence is poised to fall from its third-place perch in the rankings against a Gwinnett team that has all the firepower it needs to find a way into the Tillman Field end zones. Asante Samuel is questionable after missing 5 games and Lance Briggs is out, but that should not matter very much. If the Corn Kings manage to score more than twenty points, the Glads will find a way to score thirty. The faint hope for Cowtown is that Big Ben bumbles and stumbles again and gives the game away. But the 'Law of Averages' says this will not happen to Gwinnett's pivot for a 4th straight game. **Pick: GWINNETT**

MARKHAM DETHRONES KING BRADY IN CAMELOT

YORK COUNTY – After being humiliated and shutout in Chino, Markham rebounded with a sense of urgency with convincing 36-22 victory over York in majestic Camelot.
