




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ITS GONNA BEA FIGHT!

CANTON (AP) – Is it a face lift or a tummy tuck? Is it the result of a magic pill or protein powder? Could it actually be diet and exercise? Whatever it is, the Markham North Stars suddenly don't look the same and are shining brighter than ever heading into the EFL's 2012 campaign. Shining brighter than *what* – a 12-volt car bulb, you say – perhaps derisively?

The North Stars have been anything but stars in their first four EFL seasons. Not that the adjectives used to describe them over those four years have been all bad. 'Tenacious,' 'determined,' 'bullheaded' even 'courageous' - all come to mind when thinking of Darrin Jones' loveable losers. Unfortunately, it has been the praise of those who get something when they expect nothing. Sporting a 20-42 record over four seasons, without ever achieving a winning record in a single campaign, it goes without saying that there are no post-season statistics to report for the Markham franchise. Their victories have been the little ones – like gaining first downs on 3rd-and-long – not often the big ones that fall under 'W' in the standings.

All of that is about to change in 2012. Not only will the North Stars win more games than they lose this year, they look poised to win more games than any other team – if they can keep it together on game day.

Taking their cue from their division rival Pickering, they vowed to *go-for-it* this off-season. But unlike Pickering of 2010, they had very little to build upon. Darrin Jones' principal assets were cap room –a natural product of a team without many high-paid impact players – and draft picks. Building on a pair of returning stars in the disruptive pass-rusher *Trent Cole*, and offensive line mainstay, *Michael Roos*, Jones declared

"the future is now" and proceeded to revamp his team with an aggression that caught everyone by surprise. Jones launched into his rebuilding project with the zeal of a fat kid who finally tires of being called "Tubby." After six months, the tubby North Stars are svelte and nearly unrecognizable.


It all began quietly with a trade for wide receiver *Steve Breaston*. Not exactly a warning shot, but with *Jordy Nelson* as the only receiving weapon at the disposal of the (at the time), unknown starting quarterback, it was a necessary depth addition. Over the next month a bevy of trades brought key additions, like possession receiver *Wes Welker* from Garland, and bulldozing running back and backfield receiving threat *Jonathan Stewart* from Scarborough. A fire sale in Iowa City in exchange for draft picks contributed safety *Jairus Byrd* to the secondary while a similar rebuilding project in Charleswood allowed Jones to acquire veteran

superstar *Ed Reed* in exchange for the young, hard-hitting safety *Louis Delmas*. With Reed came instant credibility for a secondary that already featured the reliable *Charles Tillman* at corner, but lacked depth. On the heels of the Reed deal, Jones shopped a pair of draft picks to Death Valley for veteran *Nate Clements* to play opposite Tillman and suddenly four key pieces were in place in the defensive secondary. This quartet became much more dangerous the very next day when Jones plucked protected free agent, quarterback terror *John Abraham* from the Pats for a third round pick. The one-two punch of Cole on the left and Abraham on the right of the defensive line would help the corners and allow the solid but unspectacular linebacker corps to stay at home and play their assignments.

With the defense now stable, multiple weapons at wide receiver, a promising tight end in *Jared Cook*, and a pair of complementary running backs in Stewart and *DeAngelo Williams*, within a month the situation in Markham had changed dramatically for the better. But there was one *big* missing piece, without which there would be no serious North Star bid for post-season success – there was no quarterback. With unloved *Mark Sanchez* shipped off to Florida to be booed or ignored at the Fish Tank, the Stars were left with no proven player at the most important position in the game. The Jones Gambit, as it was being called at the time by ESPN's **Kris Hortenson**, was looking a lot like a big bluff at that point

Then it came – *The Deal*. Of all the moves, it was the most important one – a real game-changer. Jones targeted a developing team in Virden, moving some of his better prospects and the #9 overall pick in the draft to the Violators for the signal-caller he was looking for – *Eli Manning*. With *Matt Stafford* poised to take away the starting assignment in Virden from the interception-prone Manning, GM Lance Barrate could afford to let Peyton's younger brother go, and he didn't seem very choked up about it either.

Manning, who had toiled under duress in Virden could not conceal his excitement at the change in scenery. "I can't wait to get out of....I mean I can't wait to meet my new teammates in Markham," Manning said as he doffed a New Epoch® North Stars cap at a press conference. "The North Stars are reaching for the stars and I am looking forward to being a part of that."

The final "all in" bet in the Jones Gambit came over one month later when Markham engineered one of the most stunning trades of all – leveraging Iowa city cap room to acquire veteran SFL Big Pond Pandas' star guard *Evan Mathis* in free agency. In exchange the Cubs snagged rookie *Stephon Gilmore* and promising young tackle *Charles Brown*. The \$30 million bonus awarded to Mathis to lure him away from the SFL was a record signing bonus in the EFL's history – the kind that could have attracted an elite quarterback, let alone a guard untested on the EFL gridiron. It raised the

stakes dramatically and set off an unprecedented four-way arms race in the North Division, with Markham's rivals Durham, Cowtown, and Pickering scrambling to keep pace.

Darrin Jones had improved his hand and upped the ante, but his cards have still yet to be played. Sitting quietly at the table opposite Markham's riverboat gambler, with a strong hand of his own, is Durham's George Kaldis. The always competitive Thunder Lizards, who have never posted a losing record in the EFL's five years, appear to be well-positioned to knock Markham down from the starstudded skies. A top-flight secondary featuring captain Adrian Wilson and second year pro *Cam Chancellor* at safety, and a rejuvenated Carlos Rogers at corner, promises to make the going tough for those opposing quarterbacks who somehow manage to elude the best pass rusher in the game, Jared Allen. The defence will make plays, despite an unimpressive linebacker corps, but the real strength of the Durham squad will come from an offence that has the tools to dismantle all but the most elite

defences. Beginning in the trenches, center *Nick Mangold* and newly acquired guard *Carl Nicks* will pave the way for the two Bushes – the pounding Michael and the explosive Reggie, while blindside protector *Michael Oher* will keep Mohave refugee *Matt Schaub* upright.

Yes, you read that correctly – *Matt Schaub*. It appears that the *Philip Rivers* era is mercifully at an end in Durham and with it comes an opportunity to stretch the field on a regular basis without fear of a game-changing disaster. Schaub could not have asked for more weapons than he inherited from the oft-bumbling Philip. With 'Megatron' *Calvin Johnson* and *Dwayne Bowe* spread out wide, and *Vernon Davis* and *Antonio Gates* jumping off the line, there should always be somebody open down field.

As in Markham, there is a whiff of something very different in the air in Durham. Always good on paper, there is a sense that they will back up the hype this year. An indication of this sentiment is the strong endorsement of the Dinos' post-season odds from **Harry Schultz** of the stats-based rating agency <u>Football Outriders.Org</u>. In the past the agency has always correctly down-played Kaldis' squad, but this year they are singing (in the monotone warble of true stats geeks) a different tune.

"Call it the change in uniform – getting away from that awful candy blue and orange – or call it the change in quarterback if you want," begins Schultz, citing two popular topics in the Durham press, "both are factors. But the main reason Durham will prevail in the North Division is because of what I call 'team build.' This team is built to win the type of game the league is playing this year. The combination of the pass rush and aggressive secondary will force quarterback errors – and we all know Eli throws interceptions – and the offence has the strength to dominate in both quick-strike and ball-control styles. What's their weakness? They've been criticized for the lack of an impact linebacker; that is a drawback, but I don't think it will play a decisive role. Believe it or not, the lack of a fullback will limit their options in short yardage situations, and those come up more frequently than people think. In close games against strong opponents, that could be decisive."

Durham has tossed their chips into the pot, matching the North Stars bet-for-bet; but there are others at the Can-Am card table looking to score big and refusing to fold. Keeping a low profile is Scarborough's **Chris Dickinson**. It's not that he refuses to speak to the Press, but he is definitely avoiding them. Can you blame him?

The second-year owner has taken blistering heat from national media, especially in Florida, for driving former owner Jim Heaton's Cadillac into the ditch last year. The favourite to win it all in 2011 failed to make the playoffs with a team that many in the mainstream media thought could not be beaten.

"That's why they play the games," grated **Cowan Bullherd** on his nationally syndicated radio show, *Morning Bull*. "You don't think coaching makes a difference in this league? I've got news for you, people, it makes *all* the difference! You can't put a High School coach in there and expect results from professionals."

Somebody close to Dickinson must have whispered something similar, but more gently, into his ear because 'Jonesey' is out as head coach of the Blue Eagles and in is none other than former NFL coach, **Bill Belichek**. Paroled after serving a prison term for setting up spy-cams in opponent's locker rooms in the final year of the NFL, Belichek is back on the sidelines and surlier than ever with the Media. With one-syllable sound bites to decipher and with and all but two training camp workouts closed to the public, sports writers, even in Scarborough, are not sure what to expect from the Blue Eagles in 2012. What we *do* know is that most of the same cast of characters who failed to take flight with the blue-and-gold last year are back in 2012. Despite last year's humiliating finish, they are still an impressive bunch and, some think, remain the team to beat in the FFI

Piloting the Blue Eagles is, according to ESPN's **Russ Flont**, "the greatest quarterback in the game today" **Aaron Rodgers**. For once, Flont might not be exaggerating. Rodgers is backed up by the most versatile running back in the league, **Ray Rice**; a potential game-breaker in back-up running back **CJ Spiller**; the most complete tight end in the league in **Heath Miller**; and the ever-dangerous **DeSean Jackson** at slot receiver. **Logan Mankins** and center **Ryan Kalil** anchor an offensive line that can push around any defence on a good day. **Brandon Marshall** must be respected as Number One at wide receiver, but his lapses in concentration are a concern.

From the few training camp reports available, the defence appears to be dominant once again. The game could change for the worse at any moment for Scarborough's opponents with *Darrelle Revis* patrolling the secondary and *Terrell Suggs* doing it all near the line-of-scrimmage. *Calais Campbell* at left defensive end, *LaMarr Woodley* at outside linebacker, and safety *Michael Griffin* round off a dangerous group of defenders that has everything going for it but a decent nickname.

With such high rollers as Jones, Kaldis, and Dickinson at the table, one can be excused for failing to notice the most surreptitious card player of all. His face partially obscured by the shadow of his ten gallon cowboy hat, Garland's **Doug Shirley** has never played the high stakes game before; but with the right play, and a few blunders by his opponents, his Mustangs could find themselves raking in the jackpot at the end of the big game.

Dishing off Wes Welker to the North Stars for a first round pick sent an early signal that the Mustangs were content to spend another year building their powerhouse. But Shirley turned around and parlayed that pick into a mega-deal with rebuilding Iowa City, picking up Arian Foster, D'Brickashaw Ferguson, DeAngelo Hall, and run-stuffer Vince Wilfork. It was the only big off-season move by the Mustangs, but it filled out the roster nicely.

Most of the Garland's talent is of the homegrown variety. The development of *Duane Brown* at tackle and the emergence of *Max Unger* and *Chris Kuper* at guard will open up more room for the terrific tandem of Foster and *Matt Forte* in the backfield, and give *Matt Ryan* more time to find one of several options downfield, that include a more mature *Darrius Heyward-Bey* and red zone specialist *Laurent Robinson*. The defence has matured under ultra-conservative stewardship to the point where a blitz or two might be in order for a change. The middle

of the field is a virtual no-go zone with Wilfork clogging the center of the line and linebackers *Brian Cushing* and *Navorro Bowman* at left and right inside linebacker. Coaches are raving about safeties *Eric Weddle* and *Earl Thomas* and expect them to make a difference in both the running and the passing games. Second year pro *Patrick Peterson* strikes fear into special teams coverage units, but he is still learning the cornerback position. Garland will be a contender this year, but how far they go will depend on their opponents and whether or not they can compensate for relative weakness at cornerback.

While four powerhouse teams play high stakes poker in the Can-Am Conference, a game more resembling BINGO is taking place across the east-west expanse of the Pacific-Atlantic Conference – and not everybody is playing. With extensive home renovations going on in traditional PAC strongholds like Charleswood and Iowa City; Mohave saving money to pay for stadium upgrades and settle lawsuits from heat-stricken fans; *Cam Newton* trying to do it by himself in Chino; and two expansion teams in the mix, the Conference appears to be up for grabs for a lucky contender from among the remaining four.

In the smoky Bingo hall, starting with the most free spaces are the reigning champions in Los Angeles. Determined to make a return trip to the big game, **Jeff Dohrn** spent the off-season doing promotional spots on TV morning shows to brag about his team while patching holes in a squad that is showing the wear-and-tear of age and injury. Gone is *Jamaal Charles* and in his place comes scat-back *Darren Sproles* – a dangerous kick and punt returner and dynamic receiver out of the backfield, but no threat to carry the running game for any sustained period. The job of gaining the tough yards will fall to *Shonn Greene*, who is no Charles, even when he is following the blocking of All Pro tackle *Joe Thomas*. Gone as well, to expansion Commonwealth, is Championship Game MVP *Josh Freeman*. Will Blandford's \$7 million offer sheet for Freeman was too rich for the cash-strapped Knights, especially after they landed free agent quarterback *Alex Smith* from the SFL's Mississispip Rebels for

million per year and a \$5 million signing bonus.

Smith will be expected to perform at a high level with *Roddy White* and *Steve Smith* stretching the field and ageless vet *Tony Gonzalez* picking up close range castoffs; but the burning question is whether or not the vaunted 'Blue Shield' can live up to its reputation in 2012. The core pieces are still in place, but with wads of cash tied up paying ageing veterans *Charles Woodson*, *Osi Umenyiora*, *Nnamdi Asomugha*, and *Kevin Williams*, there was not much left in the kitty to purchase insurance. The chinks in the Knights' armour will not appear at first glance; but as the season wears on, the effect of having to play *Ashton Youboty* and *Quinton Carter* in nickel and dime packages will be felt.

Coughing and waiting nervously for the letter 'B' is Jay Hammond and the Excaliburs. Despite a wretched under-achieving performance in 2011, many people think *Tom Brady* is poised for a comeback in 2012, blaming a woefully understaffed receiving corps for his previous season-long troubles, and citing an arsenal of receiving threats this year in *Victor Cruz*, *Michael Crabtree* and *Anquan Boldin* to support the argument. Brady will have time to find his targets while standing behind an offensive line led by backside protector *Jason Peters*. The disappointing *Darren McFadden* was packaged off to Pickering in the off-season for Thunder Lizard reject, *Michael Turner*; perhaps the change of scenery will improve the fortunes of both.

Assuming the offence performs as hoped for in Camelot, York's final fortunes will depend on the defence. A complete overhaul of the secondary was necessary, but Hammond failed to land a true shutdown corner in the off-season to raise the defence to an elite level. Instead, he had to settle for quantity over quality, acquiring 8 new defensive backs through trades, free agency and the draft. The best of the lot is former Gladiator, Assante Samuel, who is wily and nifty but may have lost a step from the days of his prime. *Von Miller* looks ready to bust out as a mortal danger to opposing quarterbacks while coaches are excited to see what former CFL star Jason Babin can do rushing from the edge. The middle of the defensive line is solid with Geno Atkins and Cullen Jenkins capable of both stuffing the run and applying pressure on the quarterback.

Smoking a cigarette and praying to his pal Satan for an 'I' and a 'G' is the grim **Chris Worthley**, Head Embalmer of the Undertakers. By Worthley's standards it was a quiet off-season; but he still made 17 deals involving role players, prospects, and innumerable draft picks that analysts are still examining to determine if he came out ahead. Apparently banking on, in ESPN's **Russ Flont's** words, "the best quarterback of all time" in *Drew Brees* to carry most of the load, Death Valley did not make any significant moves to improve their immediate prospects in 2012 except for an early-season deal for wide receiver *Marques Colston* and an 11th hour trade for corner *Sheldon Brown* in a bid to garner a little respectability in the secondary.

Worthley believes in rebuilding and competing at the same time.

"Why not?" He asked in response to a skeptical reporter's question during a recent Press scrum at the Crypt – the media room at the Graveyard. "I can chew gum and punch you in the nose at the same time, why couldn't I beat the Knights with a few rookies on my roster?"

The Undertakers' plan for 2012 appears to revolve around Brees' ability to scare opposing defences into allowing *Ryan Matthews* and *Willis McGahee* to run roughshod over them. When Brees needs to go vertical, his main targets will be the twin tight end threats, *Rob Gronkowski* and *Aaron Hernandez*, and Colston. On defence, the hope is that they will sack their way out of trouble with *DeMarcus Ware* and *Charles Johnson* while banking on a remarkably easy schedule to keep the yardage count down from last year.

Finally, dragging an oxygen tank while sucking on a Marlboro through a surgically carved hole in his throat, is **Lance Barrate**, Chief Torturer of the Virden Violators. Lance needs an 'N' and an 'O' which, coincidentally, spells Virden's chance of winning the Championship this year. But in a weak Division within an even weaker conference, and considering the real possibility that Brady will stink again in spite of positive changes in York, it is remotely possible that the impossible could happen. The Violators under Barrate have always been a tough out, no matter how bad they appear on paper, and this season they are no longer bad on paper.

Outriders analyst, **Arpin Plunderflunder** made his case for a Virden North Division title in his weekly blog, Fantasy Freakz:

"Matthew Stafford is healthy and looking sharp. The receiving corps is young and very deep, capable of fielding strong four or five wide-receiver sets that will pose problems for defences. This will take a lot of coaches by surprise. Beanie Wells and Ben Tate make a good combo at running back, but the offensive line continues to be the weak link – not bad, just not good. The defence has some pass rush power but won't be able to stop the run. I personally think Barrate is one of the better game-day coaches in the EFL and I expect him to make the most of obscure guys like tight end Fred Davis or linebacker Melvin Ingram. Aldon Smith is nasty and Tramon Williams is

probably the best corner they've ever had. I like their chances in a pushover Division and I think Stafford will be a top fantasy performer this year. It's time to re-think your draft boards, Freakz!"

Outriders' reputation for offbeat analyses aside, many mainstream commentators share Plunderflunder's view that the Violators will at least make the playoffs in a weak conference – as much due to a lack of competition as to Stafford's gun-slinging potential. While some western commentators, notably 'Left Coast' Larry Lummux of JAIL-870 radio in Chino, are weakly arguing that the Convicts will make a comeback, the really hot debate in sports talk circles centers around who might score an upset and break into the projected top four in the stronger Can-Am Conference.

Last year's North Division champs, the Corn Kings, are alive and well after being pushed into keeping up with the Joneses. A bold move that sent 3 top draft picks to the Cubs' for star wide-out *Larry Fitzgerald* was the centerpiece of a series of trades that puts Cowtown once more in the discussion for a post-season berth. Stealing protected free agent *Justin Smith* from the crumbling Patriots' roster; then targeting disgruntled Virden tackle *Ryan Clady* and acquiring star corner *Brandon Flowers* in the process all but secured a ranking in the top five for Cowtown's defence. *Maurice Jones-Drew* will keep the chains moving on the ground but the big question in Cowtown remains the same as it always has throughout the team's history: will the quarterback play hold up? Last year's MVP, *Joe Flacco*, yows that it will.

"I think I'm the best quarterback in the league and I don't need Russ Flont to tell anybody that," Flacco said on 590 MOO Radio in Cowtown after the final pre-season game. The comment caused immediate controversy and placed a big weight on Flacco's shoulders for the coming season. If his boast proves true, expect Cowtown to surprise and possibly knock Garland or Markham out of the playoff race.

In Pickering, the Spartans are just a quarterback away from serious contention. In one of the first moves to be made following the expansion draft, **Gus Konstantakos** acquired the second overall pick in the rookie draft from Mission Viejo's **Chris Ferraro** in exchange for 3 late first round picks, a steak dinner, and a bottle of scotch. With that pick, the ancient warriors pinned their hopes on rookie QB, **Robert Griffin III**. The star from Baylor will get every chance to succeed on a team custom built to compete in the harsh North Division. With the versatile and dangerous **Percy Harvin** spear-heading the offence, and **Johnathan Joseph** and **Joe Haden** locking down both sides of the secondary, the Spartans should compete at a high level and knock off a top team or two. But can they hold their ground to the end with a rookie at the helm? Most think no; but Konstantakos thinks yes.

"Never surrender!" the Spartans owner bellowed when asked by a reporter if he thought he could compete with Markham's off-season run. He gave the same answer a minute later when asked if he would keep the playbook simple for Griffin when facing the Thunder Lizards; and then the same answer after that to whether or not he would bring in a veteran to mentor his young protégé. In fact, "never surrender" is usually *the* answer to any question at Pickering Press Conferences. That, and "Spats must die!"

Incumbent CAC Champion, Gwinnett is, sadly, a shadow of the team that made it to the final game last year. The offence still features most of its top weapons, with *Big Ben* back as #1 at QB; *LeSean McCoy* darting out of the backfield; and *Reggie Wayne* leading the Gwinnett Air Corps. Unfortunately the defence that stood so strong in 2011 is showing signs of age in 2012, especially on the line. *Casey Hampton* is still big, but needs a little more rest between plays, while MVP candidate *Robert Mathis* looks less stout defending the run. The secondary is a big question mark, even with *Troy Polamalu* in its ranks. Despite a noticeable drop-off in the talent level of the Glads' D, the fiery **Dave Birdsall** has a way of inspiring his team on game-day and there is nothing like a win over a rival like Scarborough to make a veteran feel 5 years younger. Don't count on the Glads, but don't count them out either.

WHAT ABOUT THOSE NEW GUYS?

EFL 2012 promises to be a "dawg fight" at the top and the bottom of the pile. Proving that some people will bet on anything, Vegas is offering a custom package of pre-season wagers featuring the four expansion teams, including a special program of odds pitting the four expansion teams against the 'Bottom Four' established teams This yet-to-be-determined group is shaping up in most projections to be Charleswood, Mohave, Iowa City and South Carolina. Creative bookies are offering competitive odds on virtually everything that could be compared between these opposing foursomes; but the odds of all four expansion franchises finishing last in their divisions

moved to an unfavourable 1-3 bet recently because of the disintegration of Charleswood, the indifference of Mohave, the immaturity of Iowa City, and the lethargy of South Carolina.

Of the newcomers, the overwhelming favourite to finish out of the basement is **Will Blandford's** Commonwealth Colonials. Not only do they have, according to **Russ Flont**, "a true champion, one of the best quarterbacks in the game today" in LA free agent *Josh Freeman*, they are fortunate enough to play in the same division as the Pats and the Hellfire. Despite Mohave's acquisition of #1 rookie *Andrew Luck* who, according to **Russ Flont**, has the "potential to be the best quarterback of all time," the prospects for **Bobby Elder's** fire-eaters are burning slightly less brightly than the ass of a drunken firefly; while in Charleswood, *Peyton Manning's* surgery is spreading to the rest of the team as **Jason Findlay** carves up the body of the once healthy Patriots.

If the Colonials miss their chance to rise above their humble origins and lead the way for their expansion brethren, there is an outfit in Mission Viejo that just might be capable of knocking Iowa City into the basement. The Cubs are changing their image this year; but the switch to a darker blue jersey and a ferocious, very mature-looking "cub" on the helmet comes at a time when the roster is younger and more "cub-like" than ever. **Deron Redding** has assembled the youngest and most inexperienced team in EFL history, with no player on the roster over the age of 27; although **Chris Ferraro's** Monarchs won't reign at the top of the West this year, they just could avoid being the peasants in their division.

In the north the best of the expansion franchises, Twin Cities, is in tough sharing a division with four playoff contenders. They are hoping for 3 wins, including two against their expansion partners. In the sunny south, the Regulators stand a couple of notches above Sebastian because of proven stars on their roster such as *Tony Romo*, *Frank Gore*, *Richard Seymour* and *Tamba Hali*. As uninspiring as **Hal Corson's** team may be again this year, the Swordfish have the only passing attack that might actually be stopped by the South Carolina secondary. **Russ Lemmon** is talking a good game, but he'll be fortunate to win two of them this year.

One thing all the pundits agree on is that 2012 will be one of the most competitive seasons yet in the EFL. A select panel of 20 ESPN personalities picked seven different teams to win it all this year with Scarborough and Durham tied at the top and Garland sneaking on the list with one vote.
