# "GAMBLING" CUBS GIVE CORN KINGS "FITZ!"

GAMBLE RETURNS FUMBLE FOR TD / FITZGERALD SNAGS 9 BALLS IN WEEK SEVEN UPSET



COWTOWN – The last time the Iowa City Cubs traveled to Cowtown for a game was in Week Two of the EFL's inaugural season in 2007. On that occasion they feasted off 7 Corn Kings turnovers in handing Cowtown their first loss, 37-17. It was considered at the time to be a major upset. This week they came into Cowtown as the underdogs once more, getting little respect from Vegas or media analysts after a rocky start to the season. But the situation was not as grim for the Cubbies as it first appeared. The Corn Kings sported a 3-3 record, but many felt they had let two of those losses get away, showing in the process a disconcerting lack of offensive finish in the clutch and occasional wholesale breakdowns on defense. The smart money saw the 8 points on the board for Iowa City, snatched it and ran. As it turned out, the smart money was right.

From the start there were small signs that Cowtown would struggle. A promising opening drive out of the gate suddenly stalled when the normally reliable tackle, *David Diehl* was called for a hold on *Richard Seymour*, pushing the Kings back to midfield. On the next play, the normally great *Jordan Gross* missed a blocking assignment and *Vince Wilfork* walked in untouched to bury *Chad Pennington*. The fired up Cubs defense forced the punt and the Cubs offense took over.

Looking like the cool and smart QB that Bill Walsh had said he was, *Trent Edwards* looked in perfect control as he led his team up the field against a Corn King defense that seemed content to sit back and watch the show. Taking advantage of a shift in the defense's attention to the running game as the Cubs entered the red zone, Edwards threw a ball underneath to *Lee Evans*, who ran it through the Corn King 'D' and into the end zone from 17 yards out for the opening score.

The Corn Kings answered that major score with a minor, moving the ball 72 yards but being forced to settle for a 25-yard **Jason Hanson** field goal after a dropped pass by **Zach Miller** on third down. However, their offence would soon get another chance as the Cubs surprised everyone by going for it on 4<sup>th</sup> down and 1 at their own 44 yard line on their next possession. **Brandon Jacobs** was held to no gain and the Corn Kings took over in great field position. That set up the play of the game, but not by the Corn Kings. **Marion Barber**, carrying the ball across the Cubs' 30, was stripped by **Marcus Washington** and the bouncing pigskin was neatly snatched up by cornerback, **Chris Gamble**, who sprinted 71 yards for the touchdown and a 14-3 Cubs lead.

Back-to-back bookend TD drives to end the first half and begin the second half brought Cowtown back from the edge and put

them momentarily in control 17-14. But the Cubs wrestled back the momentum and the lead with a brilliant 80-yard TD drive that finished in fine style with a 21-yard play action pass from Edwards to *Larry Fitzgerald* as the Corn Kings bit on the run. Sensing panic in the Cowtown camp, the Cubs' star pass rusher *Mario Williams* let loose against the Cowtown line, disrupting Pennington as he tried to steady his team and sacking him twice on third down to force punts on consecutive drives.

Despite surrendering a field goal to make it 24-17 for Iowa City, the Corn Kings were not completely out of it. With 3 minutes remaining, they took the field facing an 86 yard challenge after *Glenn Holt's* 16-yard kickoff return from inside the end zone. They moved the ball across midfield and into Cubs' territory with 44 seconds and 2 timeouts remaining. But Diehl was flagged for another holding penalty that seemed to suck the life out of the offence. When Pennington completed a 6-yard pass to *Greg Camarillo* on 4<sup>th</sup> down and 20 it was all over at Tillman Field and the Cubs danced on the sidelines.

## DOG FIGHT IN SKY OVER WINNEMUCCA

**GAME POINTS:** On a day when air power ruled, the Spartans' **Chester Taylor** rushed for 3 touchdowns, including the game winner on a 10-yard draw in the third quarter, to put Pickering over the top in a dog fight with Winnemucca. Both teams combined for over 900 yards of offence against injuryriddled secondaries. After Pickering posted a 13-7 halftime lead, **Percy Harvin** returned the opening kickoff of the second half 92 yards for a touchdown. Pickering regained the lead on **John Kasay's** 45-yard field goal, but the Outlaws survived a fumble by **Julius Jones** to come back on the next play with a 49-yard TD pass from **David Garrard** to **Laveranues Coles** to take it back, 21-16. **Eli Manning** responded with 4 straight completions for 71 yards to set up Taylor's winning TD run. The Outlaws folded like a tent after that, Pickering blowing it open with two early fourth quarter touchdowns to put the game out of reach.

NEW YORK – The sale of 80% of the New Jersey Nets to Russian billionaire, Mikhail Prokhorov got me thinking about the EFL's prospects of expansion and the eventual arrival of an EFL team to the Big Apple. The absence of professional football from New York is scandalous but not as scandalous as the situation that caused the loss of the Giants and Jets and the collapse of the old NFL.

The Congressional Committee investigating the intricate web of deceit, corruption and criminality connecting professional football, politics, the Media, Wall Street, and organized crime is uncovering more than it can handle apparently. The Committee of Inquiry into the Management of the National Football League, known on the Hill as 'The Personal Foul Committee,' keeps announcing delays in the release of its report and recommendations, citing enigmatic administrative difficulties and jurisdictional obstacles. That is *politicese* for "holy shit, have we ever got our hands full with this mess!"

The Internet is swirling with rumours that connect virtually every individual and institution of power and influence in the United States to a massive conspiracy to fleece money from the masses through the manipulation of betting trends and the "fixing" of games. The beneficiaries of some of the fraudulent practices already uncovered are not who they appear to be at first glance. Some speculate that, in fact, corruption in football contributed to the recent market turmoil and collapse of real estate due to the hidden linkage of mortgage-backed securities to the outcome of the 2007 Super Bowl game between Indianapolis and Chicago. Those who thought they saw a dud in Rex Grossman turned out to be correct, but they were in the minority. Grossman was hyped and pumped up all year through a multi-layered conspiracy to be the "Straw Man" for Peyton Manning (known at the time as a perennial big game loser), to knock down on the big stage. You think maybe some money went down on Chicago that would not have gone there if the reality of Grossman's incompetence had been revealed *before* the big game? And where did that money go?

Anyway, I digress. To return to my original thought, it looks like the key to EFL expansion and a team in New York may end up being found overseas. With so many homegrown individuals and institutions under the microscope, implicated or suspected of participation in a massive fraud, Russian Organized Crime looks surprisingly appealing.

#### FLORIDA – A TEAM YOU CAN TRUST

The head-scratching inconsistency of the bulk of competitive teams in the EFL is being balanced precariously by the consistency of the Florida Dragons. Jim Heaton's unbeaten team has been winning handily and doing it the same way each week. No miraculous last minute turnovers to salvage poor offensive performances for them! Yes, they are getting turnovers – a league-leading 19 with +11 turnover ratio so far this year – but they are getting them consistently and exploiting them expertly. It's part of their game. With so many leads to hold on to they are running the ball with unparalleled effectiveness, averaging 165 yards a game and failing to gain at least 100 yards as a team only once in 7 games. *Aaron Rodgers* has yet to post a 300-yard passing game, but he is delivering consistently when called upon and provides enough of a threat in the passing game to keep opposing defenses from keying on *DeAngelo Williams* all day. Going into the season I thought Florida would suffer from the loss of *Tom Brady* and a couple of new arrivals on the offensive line. So far it looks to be business as usual for the EFL juggernaut.

#### **RECOGNITION FOR THE GOOD AND THE BAD**

It is always the great defenses that get recognized for standout play with catchy nicknames. Great defenses

win Championships and when they do, it is as much the defense as it is the team as a whole that gets the credit. Football pundits around the league are racing to be the first to name the best defenses in the EFL. Florida's "Firewall" is well-established as the unofficial name for the Dragons' defense, having been first coined by William Wyrmwright of the South Florida Tribune as he tried to shift attention away from *Tom Brady* and onto the defense as the prime cause of Florida's success last year. But that was the only defense deserving of a name last year. This year, as this column has pointed out, there are other candidates for the "Top Stop" team.

In Los Angeles, the "Blue Shield" emerged as the best that West Coast journalism had to offer after columnist Gabrielle Laurent-Vainluven's attempt to put her stamp on the team with the moniker, "*Chevaliers Glorieux*" fell flat because nobody could pronounce it. In Chino, the defense named itself the "Lockdown Crew" before the start of the season and members of the group make a point of reminding the Media of that fact. When asked recently about the key to the success of their "*defense*," *James Harrison* responded to the baffled reporter, "Sorry, did you mean to ask about the *Lockdown Crew*? I don't know about no *defense*." Charlie Wood of the 'Manitoba Moose and Standard' created the tag "National Guard" for the Patriots' highly rated and effective pass defense and it has stuck despite a mild protest from south of the border that it is disrespectful to the real National Guard.

Well, all this praise for excellence is well and good, but what about recognition for extraordinary lack of achievement on defense? Does it not also affect the outcome of games? Does it not also win championships....for others? I can think of a few candidates at the Week Seven mark of the regular season for the most dreadful 'D' and I feel strongly that they should be recognized for it; if for no other reason than to do so brings balance and perspective to some of the offensive achievements in a year when most offences are struggling to score points.

If points-against is the ultimate measure of the success or failure of a defense, then Pickering's "Spark'ems" and Winnemucca's "Jailbreakers" are in a dead heat for the worst defense in the league. If totalyards surrendered is the best gauge of a poor defense, then Garland's "Thoroughdeads" and Mohave's "Fire Starters" have to join Pickering for notable ineptness. If yards-per-play is the standard, then the "Fire Starters" win the prize. Some defenses are good at one thing and terrible at something else. Should *part* of a defense be recognized in such a way? If so, then Markham's "No-Star Secondary" deserves honours for worst overall pass defense while Garland's "Thin Blue Line" grabs the award for worst run defense.

#### WINNEMUCCA HAS A NEW OWNER....FOR NOW

The League finally found a buyer for the Winnemucca Outlaws. He is David Neely, a retired scorpion farmer who bought a metal detector to pass the days after scorpions and ended up discovering the world's only known source of a rare earth metal used in nuclear technology, called "Neelium" after its founder. Proceeds from the find have financed his various hobbies and indulgences, one of which is now the Winnemucca Outlaws. But the deal struck by Neely and the League is more of a lease-to-buy than an outright purchase of the team. There are conditions attached to the agreement that may cause the Outlaws revert back to the League at the end of the season. These conditions were not made public by either party but it doesn't take a rocket scientist to figure out what might be causing Neely to balk at a large investment in Winnemucca. 'Hole in the Wall,' where the Outlaws play, is arguably more inhospitable as a venue than Mohave's Fiery Depths and Durham's Jurassic Park. It would take a truly dedicated fan to make the trip to the stadium each week even if the Outlaws were a playoff contender. With the Outlaws in an all-out battle for last place overall for the second consecutive year, only a few insane fans show up religiously. As a result, Winnemucca leads the league in local television blackouts and is last in gate revenue. According to market surveys, sales of jerseys and other Outlaws paraphernalia are stagnant after a spike immediately following the acquisition of *Tom Brady*. With Brady out for the year, and the future of the team in question, few other than memorabilia collectors are buying anything 'Winnemucca.' Neely reportedly wants to move the team somewhere on the West Coast, but will face opposition from Chino and Los Angeles if he tries to bring the team south of Monterey.

When Cubs' corner *Chris Gamble* recovered *Marion Barber's* fumble and returned it 71 yards for a touchdown, Josh went to work with his coloured pencils and by the end of the game had produced an artistic masterpiece (reproduced on the following page). He showed it to me and I commented with a smirk, more for the adults in the room than for Josh, "Ah, Trent Edwards scrambling with the ball after not being able to find Larry Fitzgerald again?" #### WINNEMUCCA @ MARKHAM (LINE - NORTH STARS BY 5)
