

EAME SUMMARY: Corn Kings' cornerback **Corey Webster** picked off **Eli Manning** to set up a 43-yard TD pass from Joe Flacco to Malcolm Floyd that gave Cowtown a 31-23 lead, and the apparent momentum, late in the 3rd quarter of a hard-fought contest at Tillman Field. But on the North Stars' next possession, Manning kept the drive alive in Markham territory on 3rd and 7 with a 10-yard scramble away from blitz pressure that set the stage for 5 consecutive runs by DeAngelo Williams for 39 yards to reach the Cowtown 4 yard line. There, it appeared as if the Kings had stopped the scoring drive in its tracks with an apparent sack and fumble by Manning that was recovered by the Corns Kings. But the play was over-turned on a challenge and Manning got two more chances, converting the second one on a 4th down dump-off to Jordy Nelson for a 4-yard TD pass. The 2-point convert attempt failed, leaving Cowtown clinging to a 31-29 lead. Cowtown got the ball back, but after a 32-yard completion to Floyd put the ball near mid-field, the Markham defence stood its ground, shutting down Maurice Jones-Drew for 0 yards on consecutive carries and forcing a difficult throw from Flacco that sailed just beyond reach of Santana Moss. Starting at their own 10, the Stars went to work with a quick first down but then faced another 3rd and 7 two plays later. Against seemingly blanket coverage, Steve Breaston shook off his man to snare a hitch pass and race for a 44-yard gain to the Cowtown 30. It was a huge play to get into field goal range but it was not the end of the Markham drive – they would make it to the Cowtown 1 yard line on a 3rd down, 14yard check down to Jared Cook. With their backs to the wall, the Corn Kings stood their ground, stopping Williams and Jonathan Stewart on three straight carries to set up a go-ahead 20-yard field goal by David Akers. Trailing 32-31, at their 10 yard line with one timeout left and 1:50 remaining, Cowtown was still very much in the game. But a personal foul penalty against guard Andy LeVitre got the drive off to a bad start and four plays later a 4th down dump-off to MJD went through his hands, sealing the victory for Markham. With the win, the North Stars clinched a playoff berth while the Corn Kings lead by ½ a game in a 3-way fight for the last wild card spot.







Pats' QB, *Michael Vick* connected with *Santonio Holmes* for a 17-yard TD pass 4 minutes into the overtime period to lift Charleswood to their first victory of the 2012 season. *Adrian Peterson* rushed for 90 yards and counted his 2nd and 3rd TD runs of the season to help his team bounce back from an early 14-0 deficit. Mohave QB *Andrew Luck* hooked up with *Hakeem Nicks* on TD passes of 26, 10 and 6 yards to help build up a 24-17 lead for Mohave after 3 quarters. The Pats sent the game to OT by tying it up with 2:12 to go after Peterson broke through left tackle for a 4-yard TD run.




Top-rated QB *Drew Brees* fired a 4-yard slant to *Alshon Jeffery* in the end zone, his first of 3 TD passes on the day, to take a 10-0 lead in the 1st quarter. Brees would add 2 more TD passes, both to *Mario Manningham*, and *Willis McGahee* would find the end zone on a 19-yard run off tackle to account for all of the major scoring for the Undertakers. The Monarchs were able to slow down, but not stop the powerful Death Valley offence, falling behind 27-3 after 3 quarters before scoring 2 TDs in the 4th quarter. *TJ Yates* threw for big yardage but was sacked 5 times.




Virden scored on their first 3 possessions, getting two TD passes from *Matt Stafford* – the second on a completion to *Justin Blackmon* who tossed it to *LaDainian Tomlinson* to carry it the final yard into the end zone – and a FG to lead it 17-0. Three Colonials QBs saw action and all 3 felt the presence of Virden linebacker *DeMarcus Ware* who had 4 sacks, dumping *Jake Locker* twice. Stafford connected with *Dez Bryant* for his 37th TD pass of the year, a 48-yarder to give Virden a 24-0 lead in the 3rd quarter. Commonwealth added 10 points in the 4th, but were too late to make a difference.





Alex Smith connected with **Steve Smith** for a 17-yard TD pass to break a 3-3 tie in the 3rd quarter and put the Knights in front of the Cubs for good. Two Cubs' possessions later, LA linebacker **Brian Orakpo** tore through a hole in the Cubs' offensive line and brought down **Russell Wilson** in his own end zone for a 6-yard loss and a safety to increase their lead to 12-3. **Darren Sproles** sprung a 27-yard return on the free kick to set up a 36-yard **Rian Lindell** FG and give the Knights a 15-3 lead. That would be the final score as **LeMichael James** could not get the Cubs back in the game running the ball.




Michael Crabtree got behind coverage and hauled in an easy 26-yard TD pass from *Tom Brady* to open the scoring then turned a short slant into a 43-yard gain to set up a *Brandon Jacobs* dive across the goal line for their 2nd TD to help build a 17-3 lead for the Excaliburs. The Convicts finally got their offence rolling early in the 4th quarter, sustaining a 14-play drive ending on a 2-yard *Cam Newton* scramble for a TD. Chino added a FG shortly afterwards following an onside-kick recovery but could not complete the comeback after missing a pass on 4th and inches, leading to a final York FG.




After a scoreless 1st quarter the Spartans drew first blood early in the 2nd quarter with a 38-yard medium slant to *Vincent Jackson* from *Robert Griffin III*. *Josh Scobee* added a 36-yard FG just before the half to take a 10-0 lead. The Triumph came back with a TD at the 9:12 mark of the 3rd quarter when a scrambling *Tim Tebow* checked down to *Dwayne Allen* who barreled 24 yards to the end zone. Scobee kicked a 52-yard FG before the end of the 3rd quarter then the Spartans put the game away in the 4th with Jackson's 2nd TD catch of the day, a 39-yard long slant from Griffin.





Scarborough's *Ray Rice* rushed for 2 TDs and *Aaron Rodgers* rushed for a third to give the Blue Eagles a 21-0 lead at half time. After a pair of FGs, receiver *Brandon Marshall* shook off a tackle and took a short pass 20 yards for a TD to cap the scoring for Scarborough. The Eagles controlled both sides of the line of scrimmage all game except for a momentary lapse in the 3rd when *Andy Dalton* defeated the Scarborough blitz with a 55-yard screen pass to *Roy Helu* for a TD and almost half of their total yards. The Swordfish made only 3 first downs and possessed the ball for just 20 minutes.



Reggie Bush rushed for 2 TDs in the 2nd quarter, the second coming after **Kam Chancellor** picked off **Matt Ryan** and returned it to the Garland 33 yard line, to build a 19-0 lead at half time. On the T-Lizards first possession of the 3rd quarter **Matt Schaub** hooked up with **Calvin Johnson** for a 40-yard completion to the 1-yard line setting up a TD run by **Michael Bush** on the next play to make it 26-0. The Mustangs were unable to muster any threat on offence, making 7 1st downs and entering the red zone just once resulting in an end zone interception by **Dominique Rodgers-Cromartie**.



Gladiators' receiver *Jeremy Maclin* caught a 37-yard bullet from *Ben Roethlisberger* then kept his feet in-bounds as he snared a 9-yard out pass for a TD to give Gwinnett a 7-0 lead in the 1st. The Regulators tied it on a 3-yard scramble by *Tony Romo* following a 93-yard drive that lasted over 10 minutes. After a 28-yard FG by *Josh Brown* gave the Glads back the lead, *Thomas DeCoud* picked off Romo on South Carolina's next possession to set up an 8-yard TD run by *LeSean McCoy*. Gwinnett's defence took control in the 2nd half while Maclin made his 2nd TD catch to round off the scoring.

NEW YORK – Yes, I am in New York and I don't care who knows it – not even the evil Red Pimple. Pseudo King Ferraro can hide behind his secret society of pustule-faced, equally delusional lackeys; but I will stand tall, in the sun, head bare and bellow for all to hear that I will *not take this anymore, I will no longer hide*! Come and get me if you dare despicable agent of tyranny. I know you will *not* dare, because your debauchery runs so deep in your black-blooded veins that you cannot bear to enter the City of the Free, the harbour of which is guarded by Freedom's Lady Liberty. You who would enslave others would soon find yourself slave to freedom's flow – stuck in traffic, unable to park or hail a cab, lost on the subway with nobody willing to stop and give you directions, dollar-by-dollar your savings vanishing into the open palms of aggressive panhandlers. Lost in Gotham, it would not take long before you met your match in the form of a cunning thief, cold-blooded mugger, or worse: one of New York's Finest. Yes, come, my carbuncle-nosed foe; come to New York. I *love* New York....does New York love you?

SLOW-MO RODEO

Imagine going to the rodeo to watch bronco-busting riders get violently tossed in the saddle, hurled to the ground and trampled by wild horses; but when the event starts instead find the rider almost immediately in total control of the horse and riding at a cantor with equestrian-like precision around the corral. As unlikely as that would be, it would be no more surprising than what transpired at 'The Corral' in Garland this week as the Durham Thunder Lizards trampled the Mustangs 32-0. In front of a sellout crowd too stunned and humiliated to even boo, the Lizards navigated a steady and rare Texas rain to dominate the Horses so totally that the word "game" would not apply to the 60 minutes the teams co-occupied the field. Perhaps Durham took comfort in the wet weather conditions, perhaps the Mustangs were bothered by them, but weather alone does not explain how the Mustangs have repeatedly come up lame for the past four weeks of a four-game losing streak.

Billed as a possible playoff preview, this game garnered much interest in the days leading up to it, with many analysts predicting Garland would come up big on their home field with their playoff prospects at risk; but that was far from the case. This show was a dud in so many ways that even the victorious Dinosaurs could not muster more than a casual celebration after shutting out a highly-regarded opponent.

"We want the home field advantage throughout the playoffs so this was an important win for our team," explained a subdued Durham coach **George Kaldis** after the game. "I thought we executed the game plan, but I don't think the team we played today showed us what they are capable of by a long shot, so we cannot let this win go to our heads. It is my job to keep our players focused on the next game."

In Garland, where the 'Grandmaster of Garland,' local hero **Doug Shirley** still controls the press and the local police department, the four-game losing streak set against the backdrop of pre-season expectations is finally starting to cause some grumbling in the Garland media. Already a source of open derision in the wider Texas media, blame for the plight of the Mustangs seems to be landing equally on the shoulders of their head coach and quarterback *Matt Ryan*; whose 5 of 14, 1 interception performance against Durham earned him the hook at half time.

When things fall apart, everyone has an opinion and sometimes they are humorously at odds. **Granny Gee** of the Garland Gazette, a staunch Shirley supporter, put the blame squarely on Ryan and voiced rare criticism of Shirley for waiting an entire half to yank him from the game; while **Gerald Jones** of the Dallas Star criticized Shirley for taking Ryan out of the game, not just this week, but in previous weeks. "If y'all are wonderin' why Matt looks like a racehorse that hasn't had a piss yet it's 'cause his coach is feedin' him with one hand and whippin' 'm with the otha." Don't let the tendency of certain Texas sports columnists to write like they talk distract you from Jones' key point: Ryan is undergoing a crisis of confidence now that the coach who brought him to Garland seems to be wavering in his commitment to him.

As for Shirley, he was, as usual, unwaveringly optimistic as he responded patiently to all questions posed to him, even the provocative one from 'Deathspun' columnist, **Tarkin Smith-Abdullah**, who asked what medications Shirley might be taking to keep his temper in check on the field. "No medication young man, other than a good night's sleep, a balanced breakfast, and strict abstinence from tabloid-style internet journalism," Shirley responded with a hint of a wry smile on his face. Having interviewed Shirley last year, I must admit having a large measure of admiration for the man. However, his Saintly stoicism in the face of

steady mediocrity may have actually filtered down to his defence. They are no longer furiously demonstrative on the field when things go against them. The sight of *JJ Watt* shaking *Reggie Bush's* hand and congratulating him on a good run after the Durham running back broke through the Garland line for a 2-yard TD run to take a 19-0 lead was a worrisome sign that there may be too much sportsmanship on the Mustangs' sideline and not enough nastiness.

MARKHAM LOOKING LIKE STARS

After experiencing early growing pains while the Markham coaching staff learned, for the first time, how to manage an offence capable of execution, it appears that the North Stars are finally getting into a groove. Since dropping a 25-24 heartbreaker at Virden in Week 8, the North Stars are winners of six straight after coming from behind to win a 32-31 photo finish over Cowtown, in Week 14. In two games between Markham and Cowtown this year the North Stars have the slimmest of advantages, 52-51, but the separation is cavernous in its effect on their respective playoff fortunes – Markham is in while Cowtown is hanging by a thread to the final wild card berth.

Advancing to the playoffs for the first time in the team's history was an emotional experience for coach and owner **Darrin Jones** and his team's long-suffering fans. A florid-faced Jones fought back tears of joy as he addressed the media after the game:

"This is for all the fans who stuck by us through thick and thin. Your loyalty has been rewarded. This is for

all North Stars' players of the past, who fought hard during the lean years and never got the recognition they deserved – once a North Star always a North Star. This is for all of our players in the locker room, who have worked hard for this achievement. This is for all the team's employees, who have been like a family to me and the teams over the years. This if for..." and on and on it went, for 23 minutes, until Jones caught himself about to dedicate the game to the Cowtown players and suddenly came to his senses. "I could go on, and if I've missed anybody I'm sorry, I'm just a little overwhelmed at the moment. Any questions?"

The North Stars have emerged from the muck of EFL irrelevance this year like a Creature from the Brown Lagoon. Despite publicity surrounding bold off-season acquisitions that included paying a steep price to bring *Eli Manning* over from Virden, the reputation of the franchise was so entrenched in the minds of commentators and fans alike that it did not seem possible that the team would rise above their traditional losing pedigree. Early season difficulties reinforced the pessimistic view. But people are starting to believe and everyone who loves an "underdawg" is jumping on the North Stars' bandwagon. Toronto born *electro-house* music artist **DJ Deadmouse**, in a recent performance at the Rogers Centre, came on stage wearing an orange blazer and sporting a North Stars button. He got a bit of a roar from the crowd when he dedicated the song "Professional Griefers" to the North Stars. "They aren't Mickey Mouse any more, they're Deadmouse!" he cried.

ONE FOR THE GIPPER

The sudden death of competitive football in Charleswood shocked and saddened a fan base that had become accustomed to clinching a playoff berth around this time every season. The nightmare had continued through 13 torturous weeks of horrible losses, the closest one a 10-point deficit in a Week 4 loss to expansion Commonwealth. The Pats weren't simply losing, they were losing big. With *Peyton Manning* out for the season the team had lost direction. *Michael Vick* was a liability; the body-double wearing *Adrian Peterson's* jersey looked, but did not perform like him; and *Jason Witten* was proving that great tight ends cannot do it alone. The prospect of a winless season hung like a poisonous cloud over the once-proud franchise and their loyal fans. No team had ever been so bad that they could not accomplish even *one* win. Even the pathetic Winnemucca Outlaws had managed a win in each of two sad seasons before packing up and moving to York. Mission Viejo, a team probably worse on paper than those Winnemucca teams, already had *two* wins. Charleswood football would never outlive the shame of a winless season. With the Patriots' football legacy on the line, the team was forced to look to their former leader for inspiration and he delivered; but at a grave cost.

In a shocking development that could leave more of a stain on Charleswood football than a winless campaign, it appears that individuals connected to the team may have perpetrated a hoax on the players that, if true, would offend the moral sensibilities

of virtually everyone connected with the sport; even **Chris Worthley**. Reports out of Charleswood claim that the Patriots' players were exceedingly emotional emerging from the tunnel onto the field before their Week 14 game against Mohave. Linebacker *Shaun Phillips*, teary-eyed, sported "18" in eye-black under his eyes. *Adrian Peterson* (or somebody who looked remarkably like him) had written "18" in marker on his shoes. In fact, everyone on the team, from the quarterback to the punter to the equipment manager, had "18" in some form displayed on their person.

The Pats fell behind the Hellfire 14-0 in the 1st quarter, which wasn't overly surprising, except that it was the Hellfire doing the damage. The really surprising part was the attitude on the Pats' sideline to the early deficit. Instead of folding their tent (the usual response this year), the Pats got angry. Rookie safety *Mark Barron*, one of the few good news stories on the Pats this year, made a big play by picking off *Andrew Luck* in the red zone to put an end to another Mohave scoring threat. Mid-way through the 2nd quarter Charleswood got on the board with a rare touchdown run by Peterson (just his second of the season), who barreled 10 yards around the left end – like the real Peterson might have done – for the score. They fought back, but while the Pats showed tenacity in their feisty attitude, it looked as if their performance would fall short for the 14th time this season after Mohave's *Billy Cundiff* put the Hellfire ahead by 7 points, 24-17, with a 32-yard field goal at the 6:38 mark of the 4th quarter.

With diehard Pats fans at Patriot Place going through the motions of cheering what was shaping up to be another failed comeback attempt, *Sidney Rice* gave them something to actually cheer about when he snatched a short pass from Vick on 3rd and 10 and darted 32 yards to the Mohave 19 yard line. With faint hope brimming, Vick kept the drive alive with a 10-yard scramble then Peterson tied the game with his second touchdown run. The game went into overtime, with the Pats winning the toss and promptly marching 65 yards up the field to finish off their first win of the 2012 season with a 17-yard touchdown pass from Vick to *Santonio Holmes*. The crowd, about two-thirds of its original strength, jumped to its feet and gave the Pats a standing ovation while the players celebrated like they had won the Championship. A number of players pointed to the "18s" written on their uniforms or tattooed on their bodies. A circle of Pats players gathered at the 50-yard line and knelt to say a prayer and then exited the field pointing to the sky and waving to the fans. But many of them looked angry as well and several pointed angrily to the scoreboard and the press box as they trudged off the field.

The strange behaviour continued with a loud uproar in the Patriots' locker room when *Peyton Manning* appeared to congratulate his teammates. It was, by the sound of it, the kind of outburst frantic parents might make when their missing child is found safe and sound, but in some kind of trouble. The ESPN audio catches a voice from inside the Patriots' locker room clearly exclaim, "*I THOUGHT YOU WERE DEAD*," before the door is hastily shut and locked by a trainer and the sound from inside becomes muffled and unintelligible.

Team officials are not officially talking about any of this and **Jason Findlay** skipped his post-game scrum, leaving assistant coach **Mike Mularkey** to fend off the tough questions. But the team did release a written statement that said little but because of that will likely provide plenty of fodder for "tabloid-style internet journalists" to ponder this week: "There was a miscommunication before the game that led some players to believe that Peyton's life was in serious danger, but this information soon was known to be false. Unfortunately, not all of the players were aware that the information was incorrect until after the game. The Patriots wish to thank their fans for their continued support and remind them that the last week of the season is Football Giveaway Day for the first 30,000 fans to arrive at Patriot Place."

My sources inside the team say that assistant trainer, **Bogan Findlay-Czumak**, a cousin of Patriots' owner Jason Findlay, told the players and coaches a story just before the game of how Peyton, in a neck brace, had shifted a vertebra in his neck while chewing on a piece of pork and was paralyzed from the nose down with no chance of survival. Further, that this had just happened and nobody officially knew about it, but that Archie had been called by somebody "high up" in the team to fly up to Winnipeg. It may be a while before we know the source of Bogan's misinformation, because he has since disappeared. But we do know that Peyton missed seeing almost the entire game because he was, according to his own account, locked for nearly three hours inside a private washroom on the executive level of the team's offices next to the stadium.

AROUND THE EFL

Following Virden's systematic 24-10 neutralization of Commonwealth, Coach **Will Blandford** took the podium after the game and graciously acknowledged that "Virden honestly had the better team" before launching into a bitter diatribe about how everything from fate to the referees had conspired to prevent his team from prevailing. Details, schmetails, Will! They are but individual trees in a big, dark and scary forest. You had the game pegged totally right with your first sentence.

The Excaliburs won ugly in Chino, 20-13, which was to be expected. *Cam and the Convicts* were no match for the league's top pass rush and formidable front seven. With no reliable offence, apart from an escape artist like Newton, the Chino defence was forced to do double-duty against *Tom Brady*. The slightly aged but crafty Brady was just good enough to stay comfortably in front of a team that moved the ball just as far, but turned it over twice.

The psychological impact of playing the Cubs took its toll on the Knights as their offence turned ultra-conservative in eking out a 15-3 victory. The defence pitched in with a rare safety from *Brian Orakpo*, who sacked *Russell Wilson* in the end zone after punter *Steve Weatherford* had pinned the Cubbies back inside their 10 yard line. If anyone unfamiliar with the Cubs was wondering why their jersey sales are high but fans are calling for their coach's head, just pause and think about the final offensive play call for

the Cubs that resulted in rookie running back *LeMichael James* running a 4-yard draw into a 4-3 front on 4th and 14.

Drew Brees threw 3 TD passes to bring his league-leading season total to 66 as the Undertakers buried the Monarchs 34-17 at the Graveyard. The sneaky Undertakers pretended to run out the clock, calling 7 consecutive running plays as time ticked away; but, with just seconds remaining, they suddenly hustled to the line and Brees threw a pass as time expired. Coach Worthley had tried to be "a good boy" but couldn't help himself from reaching in to steal a pie as the window closed.

Tim Tebow was the best rusher on the Triumph, carrying the ball 17 times for 91 yards, but his passing left much to be desired in a 20-7 loss to the Spartans at the Metrodome. Neither of these teams blitzed all game and as a result *Robert Griffin III* completed two nice-looking long touchdown passes to *Vincent Jackson*.

The Gladiators pummelled the weak-kneed Regulators 27-7, but not before *Tony Romo* had led an epic 18-play touchdown drive that covered 93 yards and burned up 10:40 off the clock to tie the game at 7 in the 2nd quarter. The Glads' defence recovered, thanks to an offence that had no trouble holding onto the ball long enough to give them a rest, and held South Carolina scoreless the rest of the way.

Finally, the sorry Swordfish made just 3 first downs in a 34-7 loss to the Blue eagles at Bluff's Stadium. Sebastian's sole score came on a big play, a 55-yard screen pass to *Roy Helu* that caught the defence napping. No wonder they were napping – the Swordfish offence could put anyone to sleep.



JIMMY'S WEEK FIFTEEN PICKS

YORK @ MOHAVE (line – EXCALIBURS by 7)

Tom Brady's ability to find the end zone is what separates him statistically from Mohave's Andrew Luck. Otherwise the rookie is looking a lot like a very young Brady, but without the supporting cast or the experience. If these teams were more evenly matched in other areas this game would be an interesting match-up between a current and a future legend; but they aren't close to being evenly matched. The first time they met the Excaliburs pulverised Mohave 42-0 at Camelot in Week One. With the Hellfire enjoying a legitimate home field advantage for just the second time this year and with thirteen more weeks of experience for Luck, this contest should be a lot closer than the season opener but don't expect a nail-biter. Corner Chris Houston is out for Mohave which will make an easy job that much easier for Brady while the Mohave offensive line is still not competent to protect the future of their franchise from the predatory York pass rush. **PICK: YORK**

CHARLESWOOD @ COMMONWEALTH (line – COLONIALS by 7)

Last week's emotional overtime win over Mohave removes the gorilla of a winless season off the back of the Patriots; but at 1-13, with nothing else to play for, the relaxation in the locker room is more likely to make them flat-footed than inspired on the road against a team gunning to become the first expansion team in EFL history to finish with a .500 record. The Colonials can run the ball against almost anybody, let alone the cardboard Pats' line, but mistakes in the passing game have cost them dearly. Fortunately for the home team, both of Charleswood's starting corners are out of action, leaving rookies Jayron Hosley and Leonard Johnson to cover Lance Moore and Doug Baldwin – not exactly a titanic match-up in absolute terms but heavily in favour of the Colonials in relative terms. Nobody outside of Commonwealth, and seedy bettors, cares about the outcome of this dog. With only one team truly motivated, there is only one way to go. **PICK: COMMONWEALTH**

LOS ANGELES @ DEATH VALLEY (line – UNDERTAKER by 5)

The Undertakers embarrassed the Knights on opening day with a record-setting 669 yards of total offence and an unprecedented 49 points against the legendary 'Blue Shield.' There is no explanation for such total dominance other than a phenomenal performance by Drew Brees that will never be equalled. Given that it will never be equalled, it is pertinent to note that the Knights racked up 575 yards and 41 points against the much less legendary Death Valley defence. The Undertakers have improved since that game while the Knights have stabilized after a rocky start, so don't expect the same degree of fireworks. But in games where Brees is involved so far this season there is a 93% chance that his team will score more than 30 points, so don't expect any less even against the no longer legendary, but still stout, LA defence. The Undertakers can clinch the first seed in the playoffs with a win while the Knights can clinch a wild card berth with a win. With so much on the line, bet on a great game. **PICK: LOS ANGELES**

IOWA CITY @ VIRDEN (line – VIOLATORS by 11)

The Cubs have taught me, more than any other team, how talent means nothing all by itself. With lots of talent and a lot of highlight reel plays this season, the Cubs are still in a tie for the worst record in the EFL with Charleswood. Many think that as long as Deron Redding remains the coach this team will continue to wallow, and there is a lot of evidence to support the hypothesis, so much so that it has finally affected the betting line. The Violators are in control of their own destiny and that means they can guarantee an East Division title with back-to-back victories against 1-13 teams. There is no doubt they will win the first of these two freebies, the only question is whether they will keep the foot on the gas long enough to beat the spread, or will they hand the ball off 40 times to Beanie Wells. It's a valid concern. **PICK: IOWA CITY**

MISSION VIEJO @ CHINO (line – CONVICTS by 11)

The Monarchs have picked up their game offensively in recent weeks but that is not saying very much for the second worst point-producing offence in the league. Still, with an 11-point spread in favour of a one-man offence that has padded its stats with two blowout wins over the weakest the East Division has to offer, the ability of Mission Viejo to mark up the scoreboard is important to the pocket book of anybody looking to place a friendly wager on this game. The over-matched Monarchs' offensive line will make it difficult for whoever starts at quarterback to sustain an attack, but with Devery Henderson and DeMarco Murray in the arsenal a long strike is always in play. The leading receiver on the Convicts is Steven Jackson, which should tell you all you need to know about the quick strike capacity of the Chino offence. Cam is it. If he is on his game, he can carry a team. If not, it's in the hands of the brutal and nasty 'Lockdown Crew.' Either way, the Convicts will win, but be careful of the spread. **PICK: CHINO**

COWTOWN @ TWIN CITIES (line – CORN KINGS by 2)

Last week the Triumph saw the kind of wrinkle that Tim Tebow brings to the offence and it is one that can be ironed out with a standard basic defence, as the Spartans demonstrated. The trick is not to get too focused on Tebow's "intangibles" and just cover your man or stay in your gap. Of course, Tebow will only play if Jason Campbell cannot and the real quarterback is listed as "probable" to play. The Corn Kings are coming off a disappointing loss to Markham and are riding a three-game losing streak, but seemed to have settled on Joe Flacco as their starter the rest of the way. The last time these teams met the Corn Kings jumped out of the gate with an offensive blitz, scoring 31 points in the first half, but settled down after that and finished with 34, the highest point total against the Triumph this season. Unlike last time, this will be a low-scoring game, even in dome conditions, as the Corn Kings struggle to pull away but the Triumph struggle to keep pace. **PICK: COWTOWN**

DURHAM @ MARKHAM (line – NORTH STARS by 2)

When these teams met to start the season Philip Rivers came off the bench to finish off a game that Matt Schaub couldn't due to injury and they still won by 5 points. With the Lizards in high gear and Schaub in the driver's seat, it is hard to imagine what caused the Vegas bookmakers to spot them 2 points on this line, other than as a tip-of-the-hat to home field advantage. The North Stars squeaked by Cowtown on the road last week and earned a playoff berth in the process; but they cannot catch the Dinosaurs and cannot be caught by the final wild card contender, meaning their playoff seed is set. Division-winning Durham, on the other hand, has their sights set on the #1 seed and needs a win to ensure their playoff standing. The Lizards have the best pass defence in football and Eli, for all his scrappy 'chutzpah,' has an unnerving pick problem. The North Stars can't afford those mistakes against a top tier team and will need to run first and effectively if they hope to win this week. This becomes a lot more difficult if they plan to rest their money guy, DeAngelo Williams, for the post-season run. **PICK: DURHAM**

SOUTH CAROLINA @ PICKERING (line – SPARTANS by 5)

Both of these 5-9 teams are mercifully out of the playoff race and looking to play the spoiler the rest of the way. Unfortunately for both, the only possible spoiling either can accomplish this week will be of their own respective draft positions if they win. Not that any team wants to lose, but when the present is bleak but the future hopeful, coaches and GMs tend to look to the future by testing their back-ups. But assuming both these combatants want to win (and it is a good assumption since both of them hate to lose), the Spartans have to like their chances against a team missing its top defensive lineman and two of its top three safeties. The Regulators have shown flashes of toughness against good opponents, but those have been infrequent and always at home. The Spartans have been a quarterback away from contention all year, and that quarterback is finally starting to look like the real deal when facing feeble opposition. **PICK: PICKERING**

SEBASTIAN @ GARLAND (line – MUSTANGS by 9)

The thoroughness of the beating administered against them by Durham last week has me re-thinking everything I thought I knew about the Mustangs. It is strongly tempting to pick an upset here because Garland is in free fall and the Swordfish are, as always, due for a good performance. But my common sense reins me in and tells me that the Thunder Lizards are probably the top team in football at the moment and if anyone was going to humiliate Matt Ryan, Coach Shirley, and everyone else on the team except punter Sam Koch, it would be the Dinosaurs. Quinn Johnson, Garland's long forgotten fullback, is listed as "probable" for this game, meaning a possible return of a serious running game to their depleted offensive arsenal a little less pressure on their drowning quarterback. For the Swordfish, as usual they will need the schizophrenic Andy Dalton to be on his meds if they hope to stay in the game offensively against a still dangerous defence. **PICK: GARLAND**

GWINNETT @ SCARBOROUGH (line – BLLUE EAGLES by 9)

After a loss to Durham and a narrow escape from Twin Cities the 13-1 Blue Eagles appear to be flying high again after easily dispatching Garland and Sebastian the past two weeks. With the Division locked up and the only mountain left for Scarborough to climb being the top seed in the Can-Am Conference, they find themselves staring up at the back end of a brontosaurus and it just farted. Durham is also 13-1 but controls their destiny with the tie-breaker in hand. Scarborough cannot control their own destiny but if they hope to regain the top seed they must win at least one of their remaining two games. The Gladiators are experiencing a bit of a resurrection, with a three-game winning streak putting them back in the playoff race, but their next two games are as brutal as they are critical to their fate. With no notable injuries to report on either side, this will be a straightforward, unencumbered battle for survival with the more talented team prevailing, but not by so many as 9 points. **PICK: GWINNETT**
