



EAME SUMMARY: With the Corn Kings leading by 10, Gladiators' linebacker *James Laurinaitis* stripped the ball from Maurice Jones-Drew as the Corn Kings' running back stretched to make a first down, giving Gwinnett the ball at the Cowtown 37 yard line with under two minutes remaining in the first half. Ahmad Bradshaw allowed the Glads to take advantage of the game's only turnover by gaining 30 yards on 3 carries over a 4-play drive that ended with Bradshaw breaking into the end zone from 2 yards out to narrow the Cowtown lead to 3 points at half time, 17-14. The turnover and subsequent score appeared to be the turning point of the game, as the Cowtown offence under starter Joe Flacco struggled with penalties and a sputtering passing attack through most of the 3rd quarter. Meanwhile, Gladiators quarterback **Ben Roethlisberger** went a perfect 3-for-3 for 48 yards, including a 17-yard touchdown strike to Reggie Wayne that turned out to be the game-winning score, during a mid-quarter drive that put Gwinnett in front by a score of 21-17. Back-up quarterback Matt Moore came into the game late in the 3rd quarter to try and revive the Corn Kings' attack but his first effort came up empty when kicker John Kasay shanked a 32-yard field goal attempt. The Glads threatened to break the game wide open with a drive to the Cowtown 10 yard line, but Everson Griffen sacked Roethlisberger and forced a fumble that Big Ben managed to recover for an 11-yard loss. A 32-yard field goal by Josh Brown gave Gwinnett a converted-touchdown lead with 2:46 remaining in the game. The Corn Kings took over at their 20 for one last push to try and tie the game. Moore and Jones-Drew led their team methodically up the field, reaching the Gwinnett 11 yard line with 34 seconds left but without timeouts. A pair of incomplete passes brought up 3rd and 10 and a desperate situation for the Kings. On the next play, with the Glads playing tight, Larry Fitzgerald cut across the back of the end zone and gained separation from the defender; but before Moore could pull the trigger defensive end Robert Mathis broke through the line and brought him down for an 8-yard loss. A last gasp pass attempt to the end zone as time expired fell incomplete, keeping the Glads' playoff hopes alive for another week.







A lost fumble at the Knights' 30 yard line led to a go-ahead 14-yard TD pass from *Michael Vick* to *Sidney Rice* to give the Pats a rare 14-7 lead in the 1st quarter. But Vick gave that back with a lost fumble at the Pats' 45 yard line, leading to the Knights tying the score on a 2-yard TD pass from *Alex Smith* to *Tony Gonzalez*. Knights' kicker *Dan Carpenter* added a pair of FGs to give LA a 20-14 lead at half time. The Knights dominated the 2nd half, holding the Pats' offence to just 4 first downs and 65 yards while Smith tossed TD passes of 13 and 46 yards to *Roddy White* to cap off an easy victory.




In front of Mohave's first sellout crowd of the year, *Andrew Luck* led the Hellfire to 3 TDs in their first 3 possessions, completing TD passes of 7 and 25 yards to *Hakeem Nicks*, and 9 yards to *Mike Tolbert* to grab an early 21-0 lead by the 2nd quarter. An interception by **Rob Ninkovich** and a **Tim Tebow** fumble set up the only scoring of the 1st half – two FGs for the North Stars. **Jonathan Stewart** capped off the opening possession of the 2nd half with a 25-yard TD run to increase the Markham lead to 13-0. Then, over a 5-minute span, Tebow fumbled twice more – once on a designed running play and the next on a sack by **Fred Robbins** – to set up two more North Stars' TDs on turnovers to make the score 27-0. The Triumph offence continued to be ineffective as Markham went conservative in the final quarter to kill the clock.



Scarborough receiver *Greg Little* made a leaping catch in the end zone on a pass from *Aaron Rodgers* for a 29-yard scoring play then snared a short pass and turned it into a 42-yard gain to set up the first of 2 rushing TDs by *Ray Rice* as the Blue Eagles jumped out to a 14-0 1st quarter lead. They added another TD before half time then finished off the Mustangs with an outstanding defensive performance, highlighted by a 72-yard interception return for a TD by *Darrelle Revis*. Matt Ryan was pulled in favour of *Kevin Kolb* early in the 3rd quarter after completing just 3 of 10 for 33 yards.



With the score tied at 28 and 5:33 remaining in the 4th quarter, Sebastian line-backer *Jamar Chaney* picked off *Tony Romo* deep in Regulator territory and returned it to the 3 yard line. That set up a 3-yard TD pass on a check down from *Andy Dalton* to *Brandon Myers* to give the Swordfish a 35-28 lead. The Regs charged back with an 89-yard drive topped off by a 22-yard TD pass to *Brandon Pettigrew* to tie it. Return man *Marcus Sherels* gave Sebastian good field position and *Javier Arenas* was flagged for pass interference to set up *Adam Vinatieri* for the game-winning 42-yard FG.

REAL FANS DON'T EAT BURRITOS

Sparked by the roar of 66,666 *real* Hellfire fans at the Fiery Depths, *Andrew Luck* threw 3 touchdown passes in the first 17 minutes of the game and the Mohave defence forced two turnovers to highlight an emotional 21-10 win over Commonwealth. For the first time this season, the fans in the stands for a Mohave home game really cared about the outcome, and their genuine enthusiasm seemed to energize the players. For just over one quarter the Colonials' defence looked gob-smacked by Luck's precision passing; the shiftiness of *Mike Tolbert* catching balls out of the back field; the push of the Mohave offensive line (when was the last time that happened?); and the determined running of *Daniel Thomas*, who finished with over 100 yards rushing for the first time in his career. The Hellfire scored three touchdowns in their first three possessions before slowing down to a more familiar pace. Fortunately for the home team, the Mohave defence forced a couple of turnovers to hold Commonwealth off the board in the 1st half. After giving up 10 points in the 3rd quarter, they shut down *Jake Locker* and the Commonwealth offence in the 4th to preserve the win and earn some well-earned and rare praise from their cranky coach.

"They stepped up their game – it was good to see that," a terse, but obviously relieved, **Bobby Elder** said afterwards of his defence – one that has been an unmitigated disaster this season. Elder was in the awkward position of needing a win for the sake of his team, and possibly his own future, but not wanting it to appear too obvious that season ticket-holders returning from their 12-week fan strike had much to do with it. But Locker's frequent difficulties being heard over the din of fans screaming at the top of their lungs appeared to throw the Commonwealth offence off its rhythm and earn an assist for members of FLAME (the Fans Liberation Association of Greater Mohave and Everywhere).

Gone from the Mohave stadium was the smell of burritos and the sound of the mariachi bands (but nachos were still available of course) and back was the smell of hot dogs, fries and Budweiser. As Hellfire correspondent, **Randy the Desert Rat** so eloquently put it: "I felt like I was at a football game today instead of a Mexican wedding."

"Mr. GRIZZLY"

The low point in the history of the Iowa City Cubs franchise was reached on Sunday when the Mission Viejo Monarchs walked onto the hallowed Astroturf of Joe Ferguson Stadium and whipped the Cubbies 28-23 to move ahead of them a full game in the standings and sweep their two-game season series. *Russell Wilson*, the Cubs' over-awed rookie quarterback, was picked off three times in the first half by *Lardarius Webb* and two other players nobody outside of Mission Viejo had ever heard of until this game. *Brice McCain*, a cornerback apparently, stole a long ball intended for *Mike Wallace* and returned it 57 yards for the Monarchs' third touchdown, giving them a 21-3 lead at the time. By the time the Cubs got their offensive act together, it was too late. The 28-23 score makes the game appear much closer than it actually was.

While **Chris Ferraro** celebrated his team's second victory by uncorking a bottle of *Porto* and praising his team's new trainer, the First Lady, **Michelle Obama**; his counterpart **Deron Redding** ducked out of his post-game presser on the pre-text that he could not unzip his grizzly costume. The limited vocabulary of the State of Iowa generally, has caused their Press to run out of ways to say how much they loathe the Cubs' coach for bringing their team to this state of affairs. This loathing had reached a near homicidal level by late in the 4th quarter when another Monarchs' player unknown to the play-by-play announcer, a safety or light line-backer named *George Iloka*, broke through a gap in the immobile Cubs' line and sacked Wilson for a 7-yard loss at a critical moment in the Cubs' last ditch comeback attempt. The frenzied anger of the fans was in no way tempered by the sight of Redding stomping on the sideline dressed in a grizzly bear costume – in fact, it exacerbated it.

The recent arrival of **Dr. Rodney Alberhasky Jr** to bail out Captain Redding's sinking ship is not producing the short term repairs to the team's reputation or performance that the senior Alberhasky had hoped for. His use of untested child psychotherapy methods to galvanize the EFL's youngest team has, so far, not changed the Cubs' performance on the field. Under the theory that all children need a "father figure" in their lives to develop "sound emotional responses to external stimuli," Alberhasky proposed to develop Redding as that father figure by turning him into a stern disciplinarian – a departure from his previously affirmative and positive evangelical motivational style. He created 'Mr. Grizzly' as a "symbol of retribution" for misbehaviour.

"The team has never felt Father's disapproval," Dr. Alberhasky explained in his dissertation to the coaching staff on the reasons why the team was under-performing this year, according to a source inside the club. "Father is seen as weak for not enforcing the rules. Father blames himself, thus absolving the children of responsibility. It is time for Father to grow some teeth."

Dr. Alberhasky created two "nurturing figures" for the team – 'Mr. Grizzly' and 'Mother Bear.' If the players didn't do what they were supposed to do on the field, Mr. Grizzly would appear and roar as loudly as possible, possibly raising his arms in a menacing fashion or knocking over a Gatorade cooler. If the players did something good, Mother Bear would appear and feed them each a "treat" – usually a candy or a brightly coloured drink. Dr. Alberhasky took to the field on Sunday dressed as Mother Bear while Redding, of course, stood in the tunnel dressed as Mr. Grizzly, waiting to pounce at the first sign of trouble.

This Sesame Street-like tag team initially produced laughter from the crowd that thought it was a light-hearted promotional stunt. But as the Cubs slipped farther and farther behind the EFL's worst team (according to statistical analysis) the fun part quickly wore off and the fans started to get annoyed. Not only that, but the players were distracted. The catcalls began early in the 2nd quarter after Monarchs' running back *Rashard Mendenhall* ran for a 4-yard touchdown to make the score 14-3. Scattered but steady boos could be heard across the stadium at half time. After the final drive ended with the Cubs coming up empty-handed, a torrent of derisive hooting and cursing rained down on the field along with the occasional plastic beer cup or smuggled bottle, as Redding and Alberhasky retreated to the safety of the tunnel.

This season is an ironic turn of events for a team that had, from the beginning, attempted to re-shape its image by moving away from the clean and innocent red, white and blue, to a serious charcoal grey and tan with a nasty looking and predatory "older

cub" logo on the side of their helmets. At 1-12, the new-look Cubs have never looked as young and helpless as they do now.

THE SORCEROR'S APPRENTICE With all eyes on the wizardry of *Drew Brees* and his ascension to the ranks of the EFL Immortals it is understandable that many might overlook the accomplishments of the mere mortals at the position. One such player is Virden's *Matt Stafford*, who last week led his team to perhaps its most important victory in its history without throwing a single touchdown pass. Even though he didn't find the end zone through the air, Stafford set up all his team's scores, including five field goals by Lawrence Tynes, by completing 79% of his passes for 283 yards against one of the best overall defences in football as the Violators cut up York by a score of 29-17. The victory raised Virden to first place in the East Division, an unprecedented accomplishment

for "the Markham of the PAC" – a team that had never, until this year, registered a winning season. Stafford is the reason for this success. Second in the league in passing with a 120.7 rating and second in touchdown passes with 34, he is close to breaking the old TD pass record of *Tom Brady*, his opponent in his team's seminal victory in Week 13. If Sorcerer Brees was not breaking the sound barrier of TD pass-speed this year, Stafford would be the main topic of discussion as he approaches Brady's old record. But since Brees has already broken, sorry, *shattered*, that record with 63 TD passes and counting, Stafford's mere mortal accomplishment will garner one sentence in USA Today and slightly more than one paragraph in my column.

AROUND THE EFL

Speaking of the Devil's Butler, the unstoppable *Drew Brees* is like a hurricane blowing through the EFL, knocking out defences from coast to coast. This week he blew down the stoic Chino defence with hardly a scar to show for it. After a 1st-quarter "pick six" by Convict corner *Aqib Talib*, Brees got his act together and threw 5 touchdown passes to lead his team to an impressive 42-27 win at the Big House. The victory clinched the West Division title for Death Valley, but not the overall first seed.

Swordfish QB, *Andy Dalton* came into South Carolina and helped to show why the Regulators are the most confounding EFL team to take the field in 2012. Coming off a shocking upset of Garland in Week 11 after being shockingly upset by Twin Cites the week before, the Regulators were shockingly upset 38-35 again in Week 13 by Dalton and his supporting cast of *Michael Jenkins* and *Roy Helu Jr* at the Carolina Slammer. With 4 TD passes bringing his season total to 10, the 'Red Rifle' is getting more press than he deserves because when he has a good game with such a horrendous team, everyone notices.

The still winless Pats scored offensive touchdowns on consecutive first quarter possessions and actually led 14-7 at one point; but a *Syndey Rice* fumble in Pats' territory turned the tide against them, leading to a quick equalizing score for the Knights and eventually, the usual blowout result with Charleswood finishing on the short end of a 41-14 score. *Adrian Peterson* continued to look like *Leon McQuay* in the backfield with 35 yards on 18 carries. Who is *Leon McQuay*, you ask? Exactly!

Gwinnett won a 24-17 nail-biter at the Coliseum to hold on to their playoff aspirations for at least another week. The Corn Kings' quarterback carousel continued with *Joe Flacco* starting and showing a hot hand early, only to cool down to sub-zero temperatures in the second half and bringing *Matt Moore* to the mound in relief. This time the switch didn't work as the Glads' defence withstood a late rally with the help of a timely sack by *Robert Mathis* to put Cowtown back on the 18 yard line with no timeouts and just seconds remaining. The balanced Glads' attack did not turn the ball over and got key contributions from *Ahmad Bradhsaw* (2 TDs), *Reggie Wayne* (6 catches for 104 yards and a TD) and *Big Ben* (110 QB rating).

The Thunder Lizards spotted the Spartans a 10-point lead, losing two fumbles to start the game. But the celebration in the stands at Thermopylae Stadium did not last past the first quarter. A pair of rushing touchdowns by *Reggie Bush*, the second one set up by a pick by *Richard Sherman* put the Dinos in front to stay. *Robert Griffin* threw his 19th interception of the season in the second half to seal a 38-21 loss –Pickering's 9th – and guarantee a sub-500 finish. Leaving a trail of destruction in his wake, a furious **Gus Konstantakos** stormed to the parking lot and drove his Maserati repeatedly into a team bus as police tried to stop him.

In other, less interesting action, Markham plastered Twin Cities 27-0 as the Triumph ruined a fine outing from their defence by turning ball over 5 times; and Scarborough skunked limping Garland 35-7 to clinch the South Division. The Mustangs have come up lame in recent performances, dropping 3 straight and looking more and more like last year's team.

NICKNAME POWER RANKINGS

Choosing a nickname for a professional sports franchise is a serious matter. The nickname, in theory, helps to define the attitude and image of the team and the community that supports it. If not for nicknames, the promotion of the sport would be pretty boring. Imagine seeing the EFL logo flash on the screen, the song 'Pompeii' by E.S. Posthumus pulsing in the background, and the words 'DURHAM' and 'MARKHAM' spiraling onto the screen with the voiceover intoning deeply, "this Sunday, the Durham football team plays the Markham football team at the stadium in Markham!" I don't know about you, but that doesn't get my blood boiling as much as: "this Sunday, it's the **Thunder Lizards** taking on the **North Stars** at the Dawg Pound!" I think we absolutely need nicknames for professional sports teams. Unfortunately, a strange or weak nickname can actually work against a team's psyche. There aren't too many examples of weak names in pro sports, since money is at stake in every aspect of a professional franchise. But there are a few, and, unfortunately a couple in our beloved EFL that, in the **Name Power Rankings**, just don't measure up.

If a team could perform *exactly* like its name, bearing in mind that football is a violent as well as a tactical and strategic sport, how would the 20 EFL teams rank? After much research and deliberation, I have arrived at my own rankings. There is a subjective element to my selections, of course – they might differ from yours – but I stand by them as being pretty close, if not an absolutely accurate, ranking of how the *names* would fare against each other if they met on the gridiron.

- 1. **Thunder Lizards** This is a nickname for dinosaurs in general but is often associated with a Tyrannossaurus Rex the largest land carnivore of all time. Imagine 11 of them. For sheer, untamed ferocity it's hard to top a dinosaur that eats other dinosaurs.
 - 2. **Hellfire** Supernatural, inextinguishable, hot and nasty. The sort of stuff that makes the most evil soul scream for

forgiveness. It might even make the T-Rex with its banana-sized brain think twice.

- 3. **Knights** Noble, strong, skilled and fearless, the Knight embodies the chivalric ideal and, according to legend, is capable of slaying a dragon (or a Thunder Lizard) on any given Sunday.
- 4. **Spartans** 300 of them held off 1,000,000 Persians for three days back in the day. The numbers have likely been embellished by history; nobody is certain exactly how many Persians were there or are quick to remember that there were actually 7,000 Greeks in total guarding the pass at Thermopylae. But we get the point Spartans are tough. Specializing in goal line stands, they are vulnerable to end-arounds and the deep pass.
- 5. **Gladiators** Professional fighters, entertainers, rock stars of the Roman Empire these guys would be analagous to UFC combatants or WWF wrestlers today. Fit, tough as nails, but lacking in teamwork skills, they are not quite as dangerous as a phalanx of Greek spearmen.
- 6. **Regulators** This one might appear surprising to some, but research these guys and you quickly get the picture that they were organized, principled, sometimes courageous, and often outright nasty. Picture an army of 18th century vigilantes who make the Ku Klux Klan look like a scout troop.
- 7. **Triumph** This is a Mission Statement and the ultimate goal a franchise. The name leaves it to the imagination to decide who, or what, is carrying out the mission; but it's a great start.
- 8. **Patriots** This name brings to mind American Revolutionary Minutemen, rebellious French Canadians, missiles, and amateur musicians. Irregular soldiers imbued with zeal armed with muskets and surface-to-air missiles, marching to the fife and drum seem pretty dangerous and impressive to me.
- 9. **Convicts** Hard core vicious low-lifes, slick con men, sleazy fraudsters, sexual deviants, brutal hit men, angry dimwits, and the occasional wrongly convicted innocent. If all of these selfish backstabbers could work together they'd be more dangerous than a company of Knights like the Mafia.
- 10. **Colonials** Whether its chopping wood, building a cabin, tilling the soil, shooting wild turkeys or spinning yarn, these are hardy and singe-minded people who don't give up easily. They lost a few early games to Indians armed with bows and arrows, due to the home field advantage, but made adjustments.
- 11. **Blue Eagles** I don't think there is such a thing as a blue eagle, but if there were blue eagles it would certainly cause one to pause, gaze skyward and admire its rare plumage as it dives to pluck one's eyes out.
- 12. **Mustangs** Wild horses are impressive to look at, fast and strong. But what do they actually do in their spare time? Running around in circles at the first sign of trouble isn't very awe-inspiring. It seems to me that they were put on the Earth to be ridden by people. Good coaching a requirement to be effective.
- 13. **Monarchs** Being in charge of everyone from birth usually means you can't actually do much yourself, unless you're the kind of Monarch who killed another Monarch for the throne. Like the King in chess, it is the most important piece but one of the weakest. A team of Kings might never see the field after wiping each other out to see who gets to play quarterback.
- 14. **Violators** This one is open to interpretation and none of it very flattering. "What are they actually violating?" I ask myself. Whether the local traffic by-laws or your next door neighbour's daughter or son, being a violator generally means you don't play by the rules and nobody really likes people like that.
- 15. **Undertakers** Scary only to the degree that their job is creepy and people feel uneasy around them. A Thunder Lizard, however, wouldn't think twice about eating or swatting one with its tail.
- 16. **Excaliburs** The most fabulous legendary weapon of ancient times could conceivably carve up a Thunder Lizard with ease if it could just remove itself from the stone and go solo.
- 17. **North Stars** Okay, I'm not sure what to do with this one. Inspiring from a distance it can guide the lost traveller except that there is apparently more than one of them in Markham, which would be very confusing.
- 18. **Swordfish** If these were the Water Polo Name Power Rankings, the Swordfish would be right up there; but unfortunately they are an aquatic species in a dry land game. Like Aquaman in the Justice League of America, people think, but are too polite to say, that their powers are useless here.
- 19. **Corn Kings** Oooohhh, I'm frightened! Being a King of the Corn might suggest great farming skills, but for a football team I would rather have the Children of the Corn.
- 20. **Cubs** Cute and cuddly, they only pose a threat when their mothers are around then watch out! No team with this name wins anything because no professional athlete, let alone a muscle-bound workout warrior playing a violent sport like football, wants to be associated with the living equivalent of a Teddy Bear.
- **BEST AND WORST OF THE OLD** Before Virden was the Violators they were the **Anchorage Buccaneers.** There is always room for a nasty cut-throat band of pirates in any sports league; too bad they played like pantywaists. And long before Death Valley was the Undertakers and Ringgold was the Crimson Hawks, they were the **Meadowlands Swamp Dogs**. Not exactly an inspiring name to begin the history of any franchise, the Swamp Dogs nevertheless lived up to their name getting bogged down in the muck of a 1-15 record in its only season in New Jersey.



JIMMY'S WEEK FOURTEEN PICKS

SEBASTIAN @ SCARBOROUGH (line – BLUE EAGLES by 15)

The last time these teams played Pierre Thomas averted a shutout for Sebastian by busting a 31-yard touchdown run, accounting on that single play for all of his team's points and 23% of its total yards in a 34-6 loss. I provide those details only to illustrate how overwhelmed the Swordfish offence will be when facing Darelle Revis and Terrell Suggs at Bluff's Stadium. Andy Dalton has logged good performances against quality defences this season, notably versus Gwinnett and Chino, but the Scarborough defence will punish Sebastian more than most for their lack of depth in skill players. The Scarborough offence has been like a Lamborghini driving the speed limit all season - it looks impressive but hasn't pulled away from the pack yet. Regardless, when your opponent can't even get out of the garage, a leisurely Sunday drive will win the race any day. PICK: SCARBOROUGH

SOUTH CAROLINA @ GWINNETT (line – GLADIATORS by 5)

The Glads' playoff condition has been upgraded from Critical to Serious after they staved off elimination with a nail-biting win over Cowtown last week. They can improve their playoff health further with a win against the Regulators coupled with Garland and Cowtown losses. The part they can control is no 'gimme' – especially since the Regulators' first of five wins this year came against Gwinnett back in Week Two. Which Regulator team shows up – the one that upset Gwinnett, or the one that got stomped on by Twin Cities – will dictate how difficult it will be for Big Ben and Troy Polamalu to keep the Glads in the race for another week. Gwinnett is still missing run-stuffer Casey Hampton, while questions about the ability of Greg Jennings and Felix Jones to dress for the game loom like a fog over the South Carolina offensive game plan. While national attention focuses on the playoff fate of last year's Can-Am Champions, it is easy to forget that the Regs are still gunning for a wild card berth as well. A win and a Cowtown loss will keep Hal Corson's band playing music for another week – a little out of tune, but still playing. **PICK: GWINNETT**

DURHAM @ GARLAND (line – THUNDER LIZARDS by 2)

The Thunder Lizards' winning streak is at 11 games with no sign of ending soon. The recent emergence of Matt Schaub has raised this team to the next level and is causing many prognosticators to opine that Durham is the favourite to represent the Can-Am Conference in this year's title game. However, having been around a long time in this business, and with the fate of your pocket books in my hands, I tend not to jump on bandwagons as quickly as the guy writing for ratings or readership does. But certainly, with the Mustangs coming off three straight losses, I will also not be quick to jump *back* on their bandwagon after having jumped off of it following their Week 12 debacle against South Carolina. The Dinos have the winning chemistry in their favour but the Mustangs are approaching the desperation stage. Will survival instinct kick in and motivate Doug Shirley's squad to get up off the mat and fight with fury? Garland has the home field advantage and a stable of talent that can get the job done if they believe in themselves. With Arian Foster and Matt Forte in the backfield, it boggles the mind that Garland's team yards-per-carry average is a paltry 3.2. With post-season hopes fading, look for Arian Foster to finally make a statement this week. **PICK: GARLAND**

PICKERING @ TWIN CITIES (line – TRIUMPH by 2)

It's "Tebow Time" in Minneapolis – with Jay Cutler and Jason Campbell out with injury, there is no avoiding it. What this means for the Triumph's offence is anybody's guess. Tebow is a true wild card because he is unconventional in the pocket, mobile, and determined to win. His performance against Scarborough in Week 12 shocked everyone, most of all Scarborough. But is he really that good? If his coach thought he was Jason Campbell wouldn't have started last week. He faces a counterpart in Pickering who is causing the same questions to be asked. The mobile Robert Griffin III has been a tremendous disappointment for the Spartans, who banked on the rookie to carry an otherwise competitive team. In a battle of bad QBs, I like the Triumph. **PICK: TWIN CITIES**

MARKHAM @ COWTOWN (line – CORN KINGS by 1)

With a tie on the books already, this is the rubber match in the season series between these teams and a playoff berth for Markham if they win. While much attention has focused on Eli Manning, the quiet strength of the North Stars has been the performance of their twin running threats, DeAngelo Williams and Jonathan Stewart, who have combined for 1,325 yards and 15 touchdowns on the ground. The Corn Kings' D has been able to contain the run overall this season but faltered last week against back-up Ahmad Bradshaw – a worrying sign for them as they go up against one of the top offensive lines in the league. The Markham defence leads the EFL in takeaways with 33, which may be a good reason for Cowtown to start the veteran Joe Flacco over journeyman Matt Moore. The QB controversy in Cowtown is putting pressure on both pivots to perform or get the hook, which could be leading to dissension. Uncertain chemistry for the Corn Kings does not match up well against Markham's win streak. **PICK: MARKHAM**

MISSION VIEJO @ DEATH VALLEY (line – UNDERTAKERS by 17)

Amnesty International is sending a delegation of observers to this game and will be reporting to the UN on playing irregularities and abuses expected from Drew Brees and his coach as they continue to test the limits of sportsmanship and good taste in their quest to pile up unprecedented *offensive* numbers. The Monarchs are condemned; last week's upset to sweep the season series over the Cubs was their last meal prior to execution. The last time these teams met was in Week Two in Mission Viejo, when the Undertakers got off to a slow start before picking up the pace with 5 touchdowns in the second half. Since then Death Valley has run the score up against all comers; so don't expect them to let up simply because they have clinched the West Division and are playing a team incapable of providing big league resistance. **PICK: DEATH VALLEY**

IOWA CITY @ LOS ANGELES (line – KNIGHTS by 10)

Historically these two teams have always battled each other tough regardless of where they sit in the standings; but that was then. Now the Cubs are 1-12 and looking like that one victory was an accident. Statistically the Cubs are rated 10th in both offensive and defensive efficiency, which is respectable and continues to influence analysts who claim they are better than their record; but on game day strange things have a way of happening to the woeful Cubs. Whether it is under-performance, inexperience, lack of focus, bad luck, careless coaching, or a combination of all of the above, poor showings have become the norm for the Cubbies. With the Knights surfing the wave of a 5-game win streak, don't expect ancient history to repeat itself this week at Round Table Stadium. **PICK: LOS ANGELES**

YORK @ CHINO (line – EXCALIBURS by 1)

Last week's loss to the Violators probably doomed the Swords to second place in the East. Virden has an easy final stretch while York has this game at Chino to deal with in order to keep pace. The Convicts fell out of the last wildcard spot with their loss to Death Valley and the Knights' dispatching of Charleswood in Week 13. They are in a more desperate situation than York and hope to rally after their much-feared defence was shredded by a more fearsome force in the form of Drew Brees. Not that Tom Brady is much of a downgrade, but the Excaliburs' leader threw away the game with 3 costly interceptions in last week's loss to Virden – the international choking sign for quarterbacks everywhere. But even if the Lockdown Crew can recover from last week's embarrassment, the Convicts will still need to score against the league's top-rated pass rush and 3rd ranked run defence. If anyone can find a way, it is Super Newton; but if the plan involves too much help from his receivers it probably won't work as intended. I see a shaky Brady pulling out a difficult and ugly win for the Yorkies. **PICK: YORK**

VIRDEN @ COMMONWEALTH (line – VIOLATORS by 5)

As already mentioned, the Violators' remaining schedule favours an unexpected but well-earned East Division crown. Of the three straw men lined up to be knocked down by Virden over the final three weeks of the season, the Colonials are the most likely one to put up a fight because they too, are in the hunt for a playoff berth....sort of. They are also on their home turf and they have a defensive unit that doesn't prompt a loud chortle at the irony of the word being applied to them. The offence, on the other hand, has been steadily deteriorating with Josh Freeman's lack of consistency and 19 interceptions leading to recent game-day experiments with Jake Locker and Nick Foles. On the other side, Matt Stafford's touchdown-pass streak ended at 12 games last week with Beanie Wells and Lawrence Tynes grabbing all of the scoring honours; but he still ranks second in the league by far with 34. It's difficult to imagine a logical scenario in which Commonwealth can prevail, but the beauty of the game of football is, like the bounce of the ball it's played with, its unpredictability. **PICK: VIRDEN**

MOHAVE @ CHARLESWOOD (line – Pick'Em)

Well, this is it – the last decent opportunity to erase the oval under the 'W' column in the standings for the once-storied Patriots franchise. It is one thing to be a bad team, but it is the depth of ignominy to go winless. Not even the famously bad Meadowlands Swamp Dogs – a failed experiment in drug-induced drafting – went winless. Not that the Pats are completely out of chances if they fail to extinguish the Hellfire this week; but being at home, facing a team that has looked worse than the putrid Pats on their bad days and never unbeatable on their good ones, it is not a stretch to imagine Michael Vick and Jason Witten rising to the occasion and winning one for old time's sake. It may be too much to ask Adrian Peterson to do the same, but if he decides to take the field instead of that other guy who has been wearing his jersey all year, I would venture to say a Pats' win is even likely. The last time these teams faced each other Mohave rookie Andrew Luck looked like a Hall-of-Famer with 288 yards passing and 4 TD passes, but that was against a Pats team missing Vick, Sydney Rice, and Shaun Phillips and sporting Brandon Weeden at quarterback. Don't expect such gaudy numbers this week, but expect Luck to be competitive in a humorously frantic lightweight battle to avoid embarrassment on both sides. **PICK: CHARLESWOOD**
