MOHAVE — In withering Mohave heat the Patriots faltered every step of the way and the Hellfire took advantage, posting a 30-15 upset of "Charleswood's Finest" and taking surprise possession of first place in the East Division.

It was a frustrating day for **Peyton Manning** and his crew; forced out of their game plan early to keep pace with a scoring

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deficit that got steadily wider from the second quarter onward. A combination of Pats mental errors (18 penalties), opportunistic Hellfire defense (4 turnovers), and precision strikes from *Kurt Warner* and the Mohave offence created a perfect storm for the home team. The result was a curious contest where the Charleswood offence was able to move and control the ball while never seeming to be really in control.

The Pat's opening drive initially took shape as they intended, without any deception; *Adrian Peterson* charged four straight times at the Mohave line, gaining 27 yards and forcing the 'D' to tighten up. Then 2 passes to *Jason Witten* for a total of 23 yards put the ball inside the Mohave red zone. Back to Peterson to finish it off but *Rocky McIntosh* finished it instead by punching the ball loose, creating the first of 4 Mohave takeaways on the day. It was a sign of things to come, although Charleswood initially recovered by stopping the Mohave offence then scoring a touchdown on their next possession to make it 7-0, Pats.

After a *Rob Bironas* field goal for Mohave closed the gap to 7-3, Pat's coach **Jason Findlay** took a gamble that may have turned the momentum against his team. Facing 4<sup>th</sup> down and 1 at their own 41 yard line early in the second quarter, Findlay elected to keep his offence on the field. After 3 straight Peterson runs he changed pace by giving the ball to *Jerious Norwood*, but the Hellfire 'D' was waiting for him and safety *Quintin Mikell* broke through the line untouched to stuff Norwood for a loss. *Kurt Warner* made the Pats pay for that error three plays later, connecting with *Terrell Owens* for a 28-yard TD pass and a 10-7 lead.

On the Pats next possession Findlay went right back to Norwood, who initially provided a burst with a 14-yard gain, but coughed up the ball on the next play at his own 38 yard line when Mikell stripped it from him as he made his turn up-field. Warner took advantage of the shortened field for a second time, completing 3 consecutive passes – the last one an 8-yard TD strike to Justin Gage – to extend the Mohave lead to 17-7.

The Pats got a big break near the end of the first half when *Quentin Jammer* picked off Warner at the Mohave 36 yard line. But the Hellfire would dodge a bullet when Julian Peterson wrapped up Manning behind the line and *Marcus Spears* forced a fumble

to turn the ball over to Mohave at their own 9 yard line with seconds remaining and deny Charleswood another scoring chance.

Mohave took possession to open the second half and moved straight down the field for a score on the strength of two bug runs — *Jerome Harrison* was sprung loose by a nice block by *Travelle Wharton* on a trap play that went for 29 yards; and *Brian Westbrook* dodged and darted his way 33 yards to Pay Dirt to extend the Mohave lead to 24-7. Less than two minutes after that, safety *Quintin Mikell*, already having a great day for Mohave, all but secured the game for his team by intercepting Manning at the Charleswood 36, setting up a field goal by Bironas to make it 27-7.

Penalties and a Hellfire 'D' playing downhill would keep Charleswood frustrated in their comeback attempt. The Pats would add a late TD and 2-point convert for show points to get the score into double digits. But in the end – a convincing win for Mohave.

## KUTZTOWN BEARS DOWN IN SECOND HALF

**GAME POINTS:** Tony Romo threw 2 TD passes to Anthony Gonzalez in the second half to subdue the Violators after a closely fought first half. The 2 TD passes keyed a surge of 20 unanswered points for the Golden Bears that was assisted by 2 **Drew Brees** interceptions on back-to-back series in the third quarter. ## DRAGONS TAKE GAME FROM HAWKS

GAME POINTS: With the Hawks and Dragons tied at 7 apiece in the first quarter, Aaron Rodgers connected on a 46-yard TD pass to Jerricho Cotchery to put Florida ahead 14-7. NEW YORK – If you question the value of trademark or "branding," then pause to consider the approaching legal battle over the rights to the name, 'Tavern on the Green.' The City owns the building housing the famous restaurant in Central Park and is due to take over operations this year. The family that has run the place since 1970 owns the trademark on the name, apparently worth close to \$20 million. The City did not originally claim the name when preparing the change in management but changed its mind yesterday. I can just imagine the City lawyers huddling on that one, wracking their brains on how to deprive a bankrupt family of their legal due.

The previously uncontested trademark is suddenly a point of debate now that creditors are clamoring for cash. No doubt the fight over the name will cost a significant portion of its value and will descend into a bitter battle over complex details that serve to obfuscate a simple fact: to own words or a combination of words to serve as unique identifiers of the services or goods that you provide, you must have a trademark. The family has it and it is legal. It has served them for almost 40 years. Are we going to contest the legality of every trademark as soon as its value comes into play? It should not matter if the name was in use prior to the family claiming it as their own. They recognized the value of it to enhance their business and claimed it long ago. Why didn't the City think of it back when they gave the business over? The City should pay up and move on – right now they look like cheap bullies.

## THE KEY TO DEFEATING FLORIDA.....

....is missing. I have looked everywhere; on the "run-on-them" nightstand, in the "blitz-em" jacket pocket, on the "west-coast-offence-them-to-death" kitchen table, and even under the dreaded "pooch-punt-on-third-down" rug. The key is nowhere to be found in any of these places. I suspect **Aaron Rodgers** has the key in his pocket, but he won't tell anyone and he's not around long enough to ask.

Rodgers has taken the field with his team in both games but has done just enough to get the 'Week One' and 'Week Two' T-shirts. He has the fewest pass attempts in the league among starting quarterbacks and his coach has refrained from putting the game on his shoulders to the point where you wonder if he wouldn't be content running **DeAngelo Williams** and **Johnathan Stewart** 40 times or more a game if he could get away with it. Rodgers has responded, as coaches and analysts love to say, by dutifully "managing the game." In fairness, he has not *had* to do much. Special teams and the defense have already accounted for 4 touchdowns a mere two games into the season and 6 takeaways by the defense have shortened the field and kept pressure on the opposition. It's still very early, but Florida has not trailed in a game yet this year. Shades of 2008, but even more dominant!

I think the key for Florida's opponents is to get a lead and force **Aaron Rodgers** to open the door for his team. Getting a significant lead on Florida is easier said than done. It is beyond the reach of most teams. But for the top echelon teams the task is less daunting and it really is the top echelon teams that Florida has to be concerned about. For Florida, winning the Division is a given – how they perform in the playoffs is the key to their season. The true test of Rodgers will come then. How he performs in all the pop quizzes between now and then is mostly just showmanship.

## THE CASE FOR A LONGER PRE-SEASON (A special "NEW YORK GRIPES" Feature)

The EFL caved into the players and coaches wishes when they shortened the pre-season to 3 games from the previous old NFL standard of 4. The best case for bringing back a 4-game pre-season is the shabby display from teams across the board in Week Two of the EFL season. I am hard pressed to remember a feebler, less

exhilarating slate of performances this early in any pro football season. Flipping from channel to channel on EFL Sunday Ticket was like watching a cluster of crazy Japanese game shows, jam-packed with slapstick stunts performed by every day people. Those shows are a gas when I am drunk and looking for something whacky and humiliating for the participants (like watching Winnemucca games) but when it comes to my 'Football Sunday,' I am *serious*. While I like a little comedic relief on the gridiron to break the tension of watching my fantasy team go up in flames, I expect – in fact *demand* – drama and athletic excellence from professional football players.

The best game of the week was in Mohave, where the Hellfire upset the Patriots 30-15 in a game that would not have normally drawn such attention except for the complete lack of anything better to watch. To be sure, **Kurt Warner** and his supporting cast of **T.O.** and **Brian Westbrook** made some plays on offence while the Hellfire defense, led by safety **Quintin Mikell**, was both inspired at times and opportunistic at others. The Pats also stunk, which helped Mohave. But at least the outcome was *different*.

The narrowest margin of victory this week was 10 points; Pickering topping Markham 21-11 in a game that was not as close as that. In total there were 31 turnovers, almost two per team on average. Running backs in general, except for **Chris Johnson** and **Thomas Jones**, took the week off. Referees generally got involved more than I would have liked but I couldn't blame them – the players were flat out cheating out there on the field.

What does all this mean? Are offences becoming inept or defenses more sophisticated? Are players becoming lazy? Are coaches over-analyzing or going with their "gut" more? Does the imminent approach of 2012 have anything to do with it?

I have my own theories. I think that while players are getting bigger, stronger, and faster than ever, they are also becoming mentally lazier, less disciplined and impatient. A longer pre-season schedule, tougher drills, more exhibition playing time for starters, and a higher threat of pre-season injury will sharpen the player's mental awareness and basic skills; such as tackling and catching and avoiding tackles and stopping catches. Maybe then we won't have to wait until six weeks into the season to see good football.

## HANGING CHAD

**Chad Pennington** is the third highest paid quarterback in the EFL; signed to a five-year contract after Gwinnett flirted with him in the off-season and caused Corn Kings Management to panic and send him flowers, cars, paid trips to the Caribbean, and a cashier's cheque for \$7,221,000 for 2009. Chad is also the 13<sup>th</sup> rated quarterback in the EFL after two games and is so far looking very similar to the injury-plagued 2008 version of Chad.

After Pennington had a personal hand in turning the ball over 4 times in a critical Week Two loss against rival Durham, angry Corn Kings fans are ready to hang Chad from the church bell tower next to the Farmer's Market (Cowtown's equivalent of Wall Street) in Cowtown Central Square. Normally forgiving and sentimental about their own, Cowtown fans are surprisingly irate these days when the subject turns to Chad. It is an unusual attitude for a Community that extends the concept of "kin" to anyone with a local zip code for an address. Pennington funds a breakfast program for students in the Country Bumpkin School Network and keeps his kids out of school during the Fall harvest season in support of local farmers. He shows up at all the squash-growing competitions and hunts deer with the Mayor during the off-season. His credentials in the community are top-notch. So why are Cowtown fans ready to ship him off to Winnemucca with all of the other washed up veteran quarterbacks?

The answer is the guy behind Pennington, **Joe Flacco**. Without any practice or experience, he placed second in the annual 'Golden Straw Hay-Baling Extravanganza.' In Cowtown, that's almost like winning the 'Masters'! In addition to dating the Mayor's youngest daughter, Emma-Lou, he is tall, throws a mean horseshoe, can square dance, and goes to Church every Sunday during the off-season. He has seen precious little game action with the Corn Kings in his brief career but as far as the fans are concerned he is a "good ol' boy" and ready to lead their team. Chad better get his act together or he is gone.

## THE PILLSBURY TURNOVER AWARD

In the team category, Ringgold is leading the race for most turnovers with 10. The Crimson Hawks should be recognized and thanked for enabling, through turnovers, a Week One upset by the Garland Mustangs that generated much interest and excitement for everyone outside of Ringgold and provided fodder for a "good news" story about the triumphant return of football to Garland. This past week they gave the game away to Florida, who didn't need the help to beat them but did so much more convincingly with five turnovers helping

them along. On the other side, the Crimson Hawks have taken the ball away only twice in two games, giving them a net turnover/takeaway ratio of -8. For those who need it spelled out, that is *really bad*. Tim Molinaro is in for a long and horrendous season if this trend continues at even half the pace that it is after two games.

## PAPER BAG FANS

It is still too early to see *legitimate* paper bag fans in the seats, but beginning around Week Five they should begin appearing in significant numbers in cities where the local teams are not faring so well. To be proper and legitimate, the paper bag fan should support a team that is not just currently bad, but has been consistently bad in the past and probably will be bad for the foreseeable future – a team without hope; an embarrassment to its fans and a disgrace to the league. I am dying to weigh in with my "Paper Bag:" predictions right now, but must hold off one more week at least in order to preserve conventional fictions surrounding such teams at the start of seasons; fictions contained in lines such as "it's too early to write them off," and "if they can avoid injury they can make an impact," and "on any given Sunday this team can surprise you" – all designed to maintain the illusion that analysts don't jump to conclusions based on limited evidence and promote false interest in those teams to keep readers and watcher interested.

#### ON A POSITIVE NOTE

I have been more negative about football this week than even I am accustomed to being for reasons I have already stated. On a positive note I bought two cases of hot pepper sardines at the local 'Stop 'n Shop' for half the usual price at a time when the prices of other football snacks are rising. I'm looking forward to next week.


