NEW YORK – The Coup on Capitol Hill...where, oh where, to begin? Well, first off, let's start with the word "coup," defined by the Oxford English Dictionary as "*a sudden change of government that is illegal and often violent.*" There was no change in government on January 6th. The violence was restricted to the fringes and, while lamentable, did not amount to anything close to what would be needed to effect an actual change of government. One armed official panicked and shot and killed a 35-year old Air Force veteran. A Capitol Hill Police Officer died later after being hit in the head with a fire extinguisher during a melee with protestors. If these deaths were not so tragic and senseless on their face, they would be comedic. A fire extinguisher is not typically associated with a deadly weapon – if that's all the coup plotters had in hand to effect their change in government then they are the stupidest coup plotters in history. For that reason, it is safe to declare that this was not even an *attempted* coup. The behaviour of the protestors once inside the Capitol building betrays a complete lack of intent (i.e., a *plan*) to overturn the government and a much more compelling need to acquire souvenirs and pictorial memorabilia of their impromptu, if illegal, tour of the seat of government.

So, why were they there? Thousands upon thousands of pro-Trump supporters descended on Washington in a well-publicized event to protest what they believe to have been a stolen election. They were exercising their fundamental democratic right to do so. Whether one believes it was stolen or not, the 2020 election was unlike any other one ever witnessed, at least on television. Remember **Nancy Pelosi** referring to the vicious pro-democracy movement in Hong Kong as "*a beautiful sight to behold?*" How ironic! BLACKOUT IN LAS VEGAS

It was dubbed the "Blackout Game," but not for any common reason, such as a local TV blackout or in-game power failure. The Convicts' intra-divisional tilt against the Assassins featured, for the first time since the early days of football, both teams wearing their dark jerseys at the same time on the same field in the same game. The result was tremendous confusion, frustration and anger for just about everyone - everyone but **Carson Wentz**, that is. But before we get to the game and Wentz's rebirth as a starting QB, let us examine how this strange situation arose in the first place.

Ever since the Assassins arrived on the EFL scene, Chino's owner, GM and coach, **Rob Nazar** has gone to absurd lengths to further darken his and team's image, hastily transforming it overnight from a mere gang of unsavory felons, to a murderous band of bloodthirsty pirates. While his team fights tooth and nail for a playoff berth, Nazar fiddles with the uniforms, taunts his opponents

and uses COVID-19 as thinnest of covers for fixing the officiating in his team's favour at The Big House. But why on Earth would one of the league's founding fathers do such outrageous things?

The answer is cynically simple: money. Since the dawn of the EFL, the Convicts had always been the "Bad Boys" of the league, surviving a stiff challenge from the Death Valley Undertakers when they appeared on the scene in 2011. With their coffin logo, black and red uniforms, and their zombie fanbase, the Undertakers certainly appeared dark and sinister on the surface. But fans eventually saw them as more creepy than bad and the team never acquired a strong following outside of the Graveyard, their home field.

Since then, the Convicts had dominated the secret "gangster market" in football merchandise. The old Convicts logo and their black and silver jerseys had ranked first among gangsters of all backgrounds – whether Crip or Blood, Latin Kings or MS-13 – and among the prison populations across the country for 9 years running. Felons and degenerates of all types flocked to the Chino jersey for reasons that had little to do with football and everything to do with reinforcing that "bod boy" image. No team will acknowledge it, but there is money to be made in catering to the large "black market" in sports apparel that revolves around society's criminal element. Most teams now have that third (or fourth) black 'alternate' jersey (that the players wear in a game once a year to justify its existence) for the specific purpose of gaining the attention of gangs looking to wear something black, but different from the Chino apparel ubiquitous in many a hood. The sudden arrival of the Assassins in Las Vegas, however immediately put that market dominance at risk, triggering an alarm at the Big House.

Assassin merchandise indeed appears to have what it takes to steal a big chunk of that gangster market. First of all, their head coach, **Anthony Holguin** comes with a shadowy reputation. Reputedly a former Special Forces soldier, no official record of his service exists, apart from the Honorary Discharge papers he displays in a frame on the wall of his office at the Assassin's Den. Having no official record of service could only mean one of two things: either his discharge papers are forged; or his missions were so covert, dangerous and deadly that no government would or could acknowledge them. It is commonly-accepted wisdom inside the Assassin's organization that the nickname, 'Assassins,' chosen by Holguin himself, is one that has been earned.

In addition to the dark allure of their coach's secret and likely violent past, the image of Las Vegas as 'Sin City,' the one location in the country where organized crime openly runs the show while catering to every common and exotic vice imaginable, just enhances the wickedness of the aura emanating from franchise and the fans who support it. This hardcore villainy made its market impact almost immediately.

Halfway through the season the sales numbers came in and it was not good news for Chino. Assassins paraphernalia was making serious in-roads in the street gang market, especially among Crip-affiliates; and with the Columbian drug cartels, traditional influencers of the Ecuadorean and Panamanian gangs. Outlaw Motorcycle gang and Mafia hitmen had switched almost entirely over to Assassins "gear" as code for their status, and in the American southwest and Texas, Assassins merchandise was now favoured among renegade Hispanic gangs looking to split from overly-bloated and increasingly oppressive traditional criminal networks. Convicts gear was still dominant in Orange County and Southern California and retained a majority share in the Mexican drug cartel market, where their main competition remained Bombers' and Violators' paraphernalia. But second-quarter market reports, showing an uptick in Assassins merchandise sales to the American-based agents of the Chinese and Vietnamese Triads, had Nazar panicking at the idea of losing the lucrative Asian market even before it had become fully developed.

These alarming figures and trends were what prompted Nazar to showcase the "blackest uniforms in football" in Week Twelve versus Virden, a game he knew everybody would be watching. Add in pre-game disrespect for **Lance Barrate's** Violators and his more or less open attempts to fix the outcome through absurd COVID testing protocols and arranging for corrupt officials to referee the game, and you have "*bad in action*," as Nazar reportedly said to his concerned coaching staff before they took the field that day.

Of course, all of these antics were being monitored by **Anthony Holguin**, who was as familiar with the sales numbers as Nazar. He realized that he could not let that claim stand unchallenged, or risk losing status with the criminal communities and, therefore, market share. At a Press Conference in the week leading up to the game, he invited **Rob Nazar** to prove that his uniforms were "the blackest in football."

"Let's go then!" he spat at the mike. "My uniforms against yours – head-to-head on the field. The winner gets to claim the blackest uniforms! Let's go!"

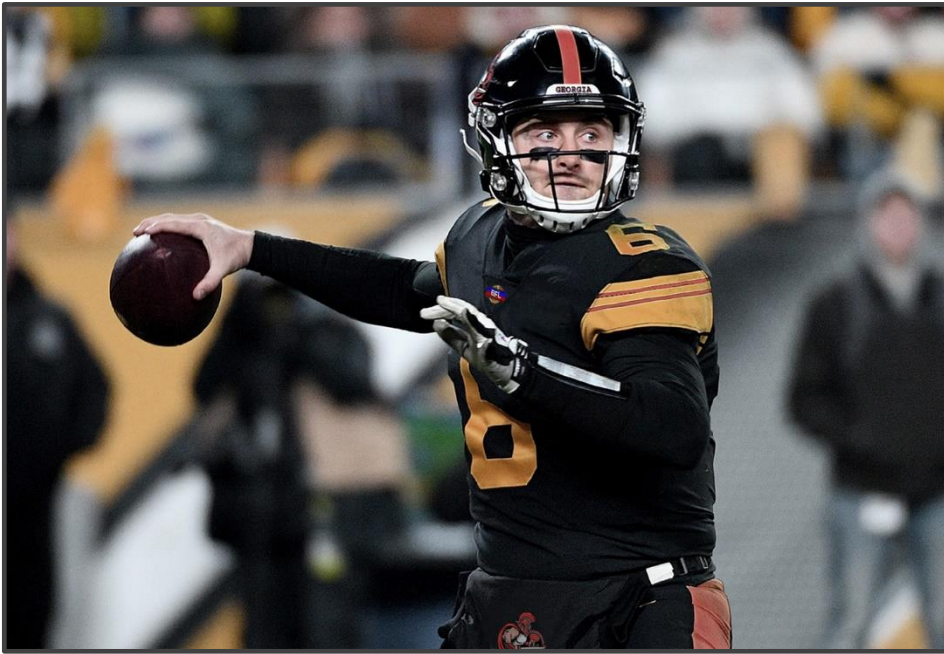
With the exhilarating flush of victory in Week Twelve still coursing through his veins – and after a casual glance at the standings which showed Vegas at 4-8 coming off a loss to the bumbling Pats – Nazar accepted the challenge and went one step further:

"Let's do it, man!" Nazar responded the next day. "And the winner not only gets to claim blackest uniforms, but the loser must acknowledge the winner as The Baddest Ass in the EFL!"

The terms were set. The league rule that required one uniform to be dark and the other light was modified to require Chino, the visiting team, to wear "*pants of a slightly lighter shade than those of the home team*" The coaches agreed that only the jerseys would be evaluated for their blackness and that any commentary or evaluation of the pants would be for purely exhibition purposes.

As outlandish as this back-and-forth challenge between the coaches was, the real shock for fans was that they went through with it. In doing so they created mayhem on the football field, disorientation amongst the viewers and inflicted uncertainty on the announcers trying to call the game, as the uniforms looked almost exactly alike.

"Wentz fades to pass...he looks and fires downfield...and...is it picked off...? No! It's complete to Pascal! He breaks a tackle...still on his feet...and he's brought down by Adams finally at the 38! Gain of 45 yards!" was the call from **Andrew Catapult** of

CBS on the Assassins' third play from scrimmage, a 45-yard pass to **Zach Pascal**.

It was not only the announcers who struggled. Players on both sides had trouble making their way around the field, particularly the running backs, **Christian McCaffrey** and **Dalvin Cook**. McCaffrey was held to just 29 yards rushing on the day.

"The give to McCaffrey...he's running right looking for a block...and he runs right into Wise who brings him down for about a 1-yard gain!" exclaimed Catapult as he described an attempted Chino power sweep.

"Yes, he looked like he was confused about where his blocker was on that play," weighed in analyst **James Lofty**. "I think he thought Wise was guard, Marcus Cannon. They both have that similar jersey number."

Chino quarterback **Dak Prescott** was not his usual decisive self. Although he did not throw an interception, his timing was off and he completed barely 50% of his pass attempts.

The only player who looked truly

comfortable, unusually comfortable in fact, was Vegas quarterback **Carson Wentz**. The quarterback on the hot seat put up his best numbers of the season, completing 23 of 30 for 325 yards, 3 TD passes and no picks in leading the Assassins to an unexpected 34-10 victory. It as if he had been reborn. His pass to **Jerry Jeudy**, that went for 66 yards and a score, was a thing of beauty. The game wasn't even close.

"I felt good out there," a beaming Wentz boasted after the game. "I saw the field well, made my reads, the guys were where I expected them to be. It was all clicking."

Indeed, it was. One other sign, in addition to his passing numbers, that Wentz was truly dialed in was that he only had to scramble once all game, and that for just one yard as he kept his eyes peeled, searching downfield until the last second. On a day when everyone else could hardly distinguish friend from foe, Wentz was picking out his receivers instantly, as if he was equipped with some kind of radar device. Contrast this with his opponent's struggles and reporters felt there had to be a story somewhere behind it.

The idea that Wentz had had some kind of technological assistance crossed the minds of suspicious Chino officials, beginning with a somewhat chastened **Rob Nazar**. The idea that a near broken Wentz could suddenly return to his 2019 form seemed far-fetched. After Nazar had regurgitated his post-game beverage while spitting out the words, "The Assassins are the baddest asses in the EFL!" he went on the attack, suggesting that Wentz had received some unfair advantage, without actually specifying what that might be:

"I am going to be asking the league to...to look into the equipment used by the Assassins in this game...to make sure it was proper," he fumbled at the mike, still pink in the cheeks from the humiliation of officially losing 'blackest uniform' status to his now truly-hated rival. "In the interests of integrity of the game...no stone should be left unturned."

While reporters guffawed at the Chino coach lecturing the league about the "integrity of the game," others were scooping up rumours coming out of the Las Vegas locker room that Wentz had found identifying his receivers by their jersey numbers much easier than picking them out by jersey colour; and that this may be due to a secret brain injury he is thought to have received in Week Five against Peg City. Wentz had been sacked or knocked down 8 times in that game and some teammates swear he had never been the same after that.

"I am telling you, he wasn't the same after that game!" insisted back-up wide receiver, **Paul Richardson Jr** during a 'What's Wrong with Wentz' Webex forum hosted by Las Vegas Media last week. When it was pointed out that Wentz had been experiencing difficulties prior to that game, including his infamous 1st quarter benching in Week Three, Richardson replied, "Oh, that was just Carson sucking. He can suck all on his own, we all know that. But after Peg City it was different – it was like he had dyslexica (*sic*) or somethin'!"

I did some checking with my sources in Vegas and uncovered reliable information that team doctors suspect Wentz is suffering from a rare form of visual dyslexia, known as 'Colorphenia,' that reacts to colours rather than numbers or letters.

"It basically sends the opposite signal to the brain at the point of action when choosing between two colours," explains my source. For example, his conscious intention may be to throw to the white jersey – in binary terms, the 'TRUE' option – but when his brain sends the signal to the arm to throw the ball to the white jersey, it overrides to 'FALSE,' causing the ball to go towards the dark jersey, or somewhere in-between, off-target. It can be controlled with conscious effort during routine practice, but under stress it cannot always be controlled. This is what is causing Carson's hesitation and inaccuracy and that's why coach is pulling him all the time – he sees that he

can't control his *colorphenia* that particular day and gets him the hell out of there. Take colour out of the picture, though, and he is the good old Carson we saw against Chino!"

If true, this adds another twist to what will likely be a difficult off-season for Coach Holguin. With the 2020 season done, but for spoiling, his quarterback suffering from a rare brain disorder and rookie **Justin Herbert** waiting on the bench, he has some hard decisions to make: try to save Wentz, go with the unproven rookie, or roll the dice and go for a quarterback not named **Trevor Lawrence** in the first round. One thing is certain – solving the quarterback problem is critical, as the defence is good enough to win now.

DUCK AND COVER

At Georgia Stadium, (not a place that has given birth to any legends recently), **Devlin Hodges** made his starting debut against the playoff-starved Erieau Cadillac and made Glads fans forget about **Tua** and **Big Ben** for a day as he led the Glads to a 20-13 come-from-behind victory. While not exactly the stuff of legends, the 75-yard, 4th-quarter drive for what would turn out to be the winning touchdown pass to **Jarvis Landry** with 2:06 remaining, is what has Georgia fans talking excitedly about this virtual unknown off the bench, whose nickname, '*Duck*,' is strangely better known than he is.

The pivotal TD drive stood out even more in contrast with the rest of the game, which up until then had been the type of dawdling affair we have come to expect from most games involving Erieau on one end of the competition. After Hodges announced his presence on Georgia's opening possession with an impressive touchdown pass to H-back, **Jordan Akins** – an arcing 26-yarder over the head of linebacker **Neville Hewitt** – the Georgia offence settled down to a stagnating-pond-scum pace trying to find its way around the gummy Erieau defence. As the game entered its final stages, it looked as if **Austin Seibert**'s 44-yard field goal mid-way through the 4th, to give Erieau a 13-10 lead, would be enough to snatch a win for the visitors.

But Hodges, channeling **Big Ben** (who was up in the press box watching), was not going to let Erieau get away with a cheapy. He oversaw a flawless final push to the end zone, going 4 of 4 for 50 yards down the stretch and finishing with a bullet to Landry on a medium slant for the go-ahead major.

Victory was no certainty at that point and the fake pumped-in crowd noise knew it, dying down quickly after **Tyler Bass** kicked the extra point to make it 17-13. With 2:06 left, **Kyler Murray** had plenty of time to get that score back. The stage was set. One might have had, like I did, that nagging feeling that this was all a set-up to put Murray in the limelight heading into playoff race crunch time. Last possession touchdown, on the road, to win a must-win game would have looked good on the resume heading into hype season. With TV ratings sagging overall, the EFL needed a new budding hero to add to its list. But the Caddies' hopeful franchise quarterback went off-script, looking flustered and confused in his legend-building moment. He forced balls into coverage that were easily deflected and allowed himself to be blindsided by parking bullard, **Taven Bryan** for a sack to go four-and-out and all but concede the game to Georgia.

So 'hero' status was forced to revert back to the quarterback who had scored last. The league got its hero, but he was the wrong one. He was a player few people had ever heard of, whose nickname had been the most noteworthy thing about him, who played behind the legendary **Big Ben** and future franchise quarterback, **Tua Tagovailoa** on a basement-dwelling team. What kind of future heroics does that promise?

This game yielded the wrong outcome for just about everybody. Hodges is up on a temporary pedestal that will be knocked out from under him the moment he shows the league why he is a back-up. The Cadillac fall critically behind in the wildcard race, a disaster not only for them but for a league looking for compelling playoff races in the league's final weeks. Murray's reputation takes a hit as fans absorb the unpleasant fact that he did not gain even a single first down with the game on the line against one of the worst defences in football. And, of course, Georgia's shot at **Trevor Lawrence** becomes a long one indeed.

Oddly enough, that last bit is fine by Georgia coach and owner, **Dave Birdsall**. He scoffed at the suggestion that he and his team have any interest in acquiring another "franchise quarterback."

"The Glads have never had the number one pick in the draft and we aren't about to start now!" he said derisively to the reporter from the *Lake Oconee News* who had asked him whether the drop in draft position brought about by the win would make it harder to trade up if the team coveted the Clemson phenom. "We are happy with what we have at quarterback position right now, especially after Duck's performance today. We have three quarterbacks who can get the job done. Why would we need another?"

For Erieau, the loss puts them at 6-7 and in a less than impressive three-way tie for the runner-up position to the two wildcard berths, currently held by Cowtown and Brooklin. This was a game they had to win and should have won. There is still a chance for them to make the post-season for the first time in franchise history, but they will have to overcome a tough remaining schedule that includes Cobb County and Aurora.

COMEBACK FOR COACH!

Speaking of heroics, he did it again! The **Amazing Russell Wilson**[™] dug deep for his team and his coach, leading a stellar comeback against the Pilots to steal a 38-28 win from what, for one half at least, looked like the steely locked jaws of defeat.

The Cubs entered this game as one of the hottest teams in football, having won 5 of their previous 6 after falling 36-9 to Bruxelles in Week Six; a game that signified the low point of their difficult start to the season in 2020. That embarrassing loss had provoked intervention from none other than the 106-year-old **G. Rodney Alberhasky**, CEO and father of the family pharmaceutical business that owned the Cubs. His appearance and subsequent 'vote of confidence' in GM/Coach **Deron Redding** had sent shockwaves through the coaching staff and the roster; as all were well aware what the terrible 'vote of confidence' actually signified: coach was on

his way out unless a quasi-miracle occurred to change the team's fortunes dramatically.

Enter that quasi-miracle; beginning in Week Seven and, but for one hiccup along the way against Cobb County (no shame in losing a close one to the best team in the league), carrying on up to their Week 13 re-match against Seattle. The players had impressively rallied around their coach and, with the battle cry, "For Coach!" were giving it all they had on the field, winning five games and giving the Coyotes a run for their money.

The Pilots, however, had always managed to keep the score close against the Cubs, despite their perpetually inferior roster of talent. This was thought to be due to a personal rivalry between Seattle coach **Mitch Gangwish** and Coach Redding that had its origins in an innocent exchange at mid-field after a closer-than-expected season opener between Seattle and Iowa City in 2017, the Pilots' first season in Seattle. The Cubs prevailed in that game, 26-21. While they had dominated the time of possession and the stat board, they had still found themselves trailing by one point in the 4th quarter and were forced to pull the game out of the fire on a last-minute TD pass from the none other than **Russell Wilson** to **Marqise Lee**.

After a desperation bomb from **Eli Manning** to **Phillip Dorsett** fell short of its mark to end the game, the coaches met at mid-field to shake hands. Always eager to make friends, even of his gridiron opponents, Redding reportedly attempted to bolster Coach Gangwish's spirits by telling him, "I really like that defence of yours, Mitch!"

Still smarting after the tough loss and with the memory of **James Conner** and **Jerick McKinnon** ploughing through his team's defensive line for a combined 190 yards still fresh in his mind, Gangwish believed Redding was mocking him. He was not aware that Redding said these kinds of things earnestly, with the best of intentions and tended to look on the bright side of everything. He did not consider the likely truth that Redding was genuinely impressed with the talent there, if not the actual performance.

“I’m sure you do, jerk-off!” Gangwish reputedly replied with a smirk. “Don’t think for a second that if there weren’t TV cameras all over this place, I wouldn’t knock that stupid grin off your face. Keep jawing like that and you won’t have a jaw!”

At first, Redding reacted with disbelief. “Ah...I didn’t know you were such a kidder, Mitch! I’m serious though.”

They went straight at the Pilots off the opening drive with a five-wide set, stretching thin the banged-up secondary and exposing its weakest links. They moved up field in a flash, finishing off the nine-play drive with a 5-yard toss from Wilson to Kirk that looked just too easy. 28-14. The next drive was much quicker: one play, 94 yards for a TD on a long fly to *AJ Brown*, made possible by another bite on the run fake by Jenkins. 28-21. On the next drive, the Cubs switched gears, pounding the ground for a few plays before flipping back to a five-wide set and finishing off the nine-play, 76-yard excursion with a 3-yard fling to a wide-open *Cole Beasley* in the end zone. 28-28!

Having secured the tie, the Cubs’ offence took a rest, going three-and-out on their next series, while their defence continued to stiff-arm the Pilots attack, forcing a fourth consecutive punt. The Cubs slowly got back into forward-gear, moving steadily, in no hurry from their 20-yard line to the Pilots’ 18, where they faced a decision on 4th & 1. Of course, with *Justin Tucker* as their kicker, the decision was a no-brainer. The All Pro came on and booted a 36-yard field goal to give them the lead with 2:18 left. 31-28!

Sam Darnold took the field at his team’s own 25-yard line after the touchback. He had not been able to manufacture any points in the second half, but his struggles would be forgiven and forgotten if he could rekindle some of what the Pilots had in the blowout first half. But the Cubs would have their say as well and it was a loud, ‘NO!’ A sea of six Cubs’ defensive backs mesmerized the young quarterback. He hesitated, mis-fired and on 4th & 10 he was sacked at the 24 by *Dee Ford*. Three plays later, the Cubs were again in the end zone on Kirk’s third touchdown catch of the day to crank the score up to 38-28. There was still 1:30 left, but the Pilots would need a miracle to make up the two scores. They didn’t get it – all the miracles on the field at Kingdome that day had been snatched up by the *Amazing Russell Wilson*TM.

The Cubs’ players congratulated themselves on the sideline for a moment before walking to mid-field to mingle with the Pilots. “FOR COACH!” they barked, with modest restraint, as they broke the impromptu huddle. As had become their custom since that first acrimonious encounter, **Mitch Gangwish** and **Deron Redding** avoided each other when the teams congregated on the field after the game. The countenances of both coaches could not have been more opposite. Gangwish was dour, tense and hoarse from yelling; Redding looked like a kid with an ice cream cone. AROUND THE EFL – ERUDITE OBSERVATIONS AND LEARNING POINTS

Although the games were not all that engaging this week, we did learn a lot about some of the teams that will be battling it out for post-season position.

~ At New Era Field in Buffalo, **Lamar Jackson** capped a drawn-out, 16-play, 84-yard drive with a 7-yard TD pass to **Robert Woods** with 0:54 left to give the Derailers a come-from-behind 24-20 victory over the Crusaders. Buffalo's aggressive 4th down posture paid off early, with two 4th down conversions in Peg City territory turning possible field goal drives into touchdown drives and giving them a 14-0 lead mid-way through the 2nd quarter. But the Crusaders would stabilize their position late in the 1st half with a quick 10-point flurry, made possible by a few clutch throws by **Kirk Cousins**. I still don't know what to make of Cousins as a leader. He certainly did his part to keep this game from getting out of hand in the 2nd and 3rd quarters, which set the stage for his go-ahead TD pass to **Duke Johnson** mid-way through the 4th to make it 20-17 for the Pegs. But after quickly covering 46 yards to the Buffalo 24-yard line on his team's final possession, he suddenly went stiff – stood like a statue in the pocket and took back-to-back sacks to set up a hopeless 4th & 23 on his last snap. The Derailers are now in the driver's seat for the final wildcard spot, although Lamar's legs may be tiring as bit, as he ran for just 45 yards on 15 carries. That was still more than any of his running backs though.

~ The North Stars took revenge on the Corn Kings for last year's playoff loss with a dominating 26-3 victory at Ferenc-Liszt International Airport Stadium in Budapest. This game was about more than scoreboard supremacy. It was about dominance and control. It featured an amped up Budapest offensive line that gave **Aaron Rodgers** plenty of time to throw and which drove through the Corn Kings' defensive line like a snow plough, making a path for their seven (count' em, 7!) different running backs while injuring three defenders along the way. It also featured an attacking defence that knocked out **Todd Gurley** and even took aim at Cowtown's lowly fullback, **Danny Vitale**, piling on after he attempted to lay a block for **Mike Boone** and sending him to the locker room with a knee injury. While there seemed to be some bad blood between these teams on the football field, there was no evidence of that being the case between the coaches. **Darrin Jones** and **Jim Coghlin** were cordial with each other after the game, with the visiting coach even attempting a few words in pidgin Hungarian, to much amusement. Both coaches knew the score – literally and figuratively. Although games in Budapest cannot be flexed into a North American prime time slot, the network had gone to great efforts hyping this game up in the 10:00 ET time slot. There was a lot to work with: both teams were leading their division; it was a re-match of last year's Quarter Finals and was also being billed as a possible “preview” of this year's Conference Final. Therefore, the lopsided outcome was a great disappointment to the networks and a surprise to many viewers. I cannot say I am that surprised. The Corn Kings had been overperforming up until this week and, as I said last week, were about to hit a wall. Well, they hit it...and it's called the Great Wall of Budapest, which promises to grow that much more impregnable as the post-season approaches.

~ At **TERRORDOME** in Virden the Violators, powered by **Pat Mahomes'** 5 TD passes, spanked the Wrecking Balls, 38-14. Mahomes had a free-wheeling day, going to the air 49 times, passing for 402 yards, but also throwing 3 picks, one for a TD going the other way. But the inert New Jersey offence, led by a returning **Matt Stafford**, could not take advantage of these rare Virden turnovers, managing only 11 first downs, 13 rushing yards and 199 total yards overall in the game. The Violators' win, coupled with the Crusaders' loss to Buffalo, clinches the Central Division for Virden. For New Jersey, the loss puts them one step closer to the no.1 overall pick and **Trevor Lawrence**. If the Wrecking Balls were trying to win before, they certainly aren't trying to win anymore. This was made plain on the final offensive play from scrimmage in the first half, a play that should earn a spot in the ever-growing post-season lowlight reel currently being put together by creative minds in the Wrecking Balls Fan Club under the working title, *‘What Happened?’* The Violators had possession at the New Jersey 31 with 0:14 left. With Virden already in field goal range, a defensive coach just *has* to know that Mahomes is going to take a deep shot in that situation. Presumably knowing this (and if they didn't, shame on them) the Balls opted to play a four-man front and blitz safety **Jamal Adams**, leaving a gaping hole over the top for **Amari Cooper** to haul in the homerun ball on the dead run for Virden's 4th TD of the first half. Leveraging the *pass rush* skills of your All-Pro *safety* instead of his *coverage* skills, when you know the ball is going deep, just doesn't make much sense – even less sense against an elusive quarterback like Mahomes who eats the blitz alive. Adams is a great pass rusher – for a safety; he happens to be a better safety. And the Wrecking Balls brain trust can't figure out why their defence all year has been defending about as well as the Capitol Hill Police.

~ The Bombers escaped Wilhalla Stadium in Minneapolis unscathed in the standings, prevailing unconvincingly in overtime over the Triumph 13-7. When the first scoring play of a game does not come until there is little more than 6 minutes left in regulation, and terrible weather is NOT involved, the play-by-play requires the kind of scrutiny that only a football scholar could have the stomach for. Looking back at the first half, the Triumph must feel like they let this game get away. Their defence played lights out – and it was not only due to **Jared Goff's** incompetence. The offence rode the legs of **Clyde Edwards-Helaire** and **Mitch Trubisky**, moving the ball relentlessly forward and chewing up lots of time off the clock to keep the defenders well-rested. But the Triumph came away with nothing for their efforts. A red zone pick of Trubisky by former Triumph corner **Darius Slay** and a blooper-reel finish to a 90-second drill at the end of the first half – that saw Trubisky commit the sin of attempting to scramble for a TD with no timeouts left and seconds remaining on the clock – meant all of that effort went for naught. Hey, I know field goals are out of fashion, but 3 points there would have looked good in retrospect. On the other side, **Jared Goff** was tearing down whatever reputation he may have had as a blossoming franchise quarterback by missing throw after throw attempting to stretch the field. The bombs kept veering off target, but a glassy-eyed Goff, egged on by an irritated **Ken Main**, remained trapped in their play loop until they were shocked to their senses by the Triumph

finally breaking the scoring drought with a beautifully-executed 20-yard TD pass to **Kenny Gollday** in double-coverage. If Trubisky could get it done, then there was no excuse for Goff *not* to get it done. He responded. With a helping hand from **Chris Thompson's** 46-yard scamper on a check down, Goff made two other key throws to finish off an 84-yard drive with a 22-yard scoring strike to **Chris Godwin** to send the game into overtime. Inspired by his own greatness on the last TD drive, Goff made short work of the Triumph in the extra frame, taking the game out of Trubisky's hands by leading his team to a touchdown on the first possession. In the end, the better team won, but did not look like they truly deserved it. The "Goff experiment," as some Bruxelles fans are calling it, is making many fans nervous as they wonder what frustrations may lie ahead for them in the playoffs, if they make it that far.

~ At Coyote Field in Marietta Georgia, Coyote back-up QB, **Teddy Bridgewater** passed for 271 yards a touchdown and no interceptions in taking care of the Patriots 27-9. Although his numbers were modest in comparison with the usual line posted by starter **Ryan Tannehill**, Bridgewater still oversaw a statistically dominant performance by his team, amassing 30 first downs and 445 yards of total offence while controlling the ball for over 36 minutes. Nevertheless, with the East Division not yet locked up, and the Pats coming off an impressive win over Las Vegas, the last minute switch to Bridgewater came as a surprise to many, given that Tannehill was active for the game.

"Although Ryan tested negative for COVID-19 on Saturday, he came to the park this morning with pretty bad sniffles. We decided, out of an abundance of caution, to reduce his contact with other players by putting Teddy in there," explained Coach **Eron Osman** after the game. "I have always had every confidence in Teddy and I think he proved today that he can be a starter in this league."

Local sources suspect that there was nothing wrong Tannehill and that Osman had been waiting for an opportunity to showcase Bridgewater with the goal of trading him in the off-season. The Pats, with their dilapidated defence and inconsistent offence, represented the first of two easy marks in the remaining Cobb County schedule to showcase Bridgewater's talents.

~ At Thermopylae Stadium in Pickering, **Josh Allen** threw a touchdown pass and ran for another to lead the Thunder Lizards past the Spartans, 30-13. The win, coupled with Cowtown's loss, puts Durham in sole possession of the North Division for the first time all season. The atmosphere in Thermopylae Stadium did not have any of the hot-blooded, zealous boisterousness usually seen in the stands from supporters of the opposing Greek factions backing each team. **Smota Platypusopoulos** of the pro-Durham *Royal Greek Society* and **Vasilis Vasilinistusakas** of the pro-Pickering *Hellenic Cultural Centre*, special guests of the Spartans, were the only representatives of their respective factions permitted in the pandemic-sealed stadium. They shared the same press box and appeared to be enjoying themselves, tossing back shots of *ouzo* while snacking on *koulouri thessalonikis* and *keftedakia* and not once engaging in fisticuffs, or even heated verbal exchanges. The lack of fans, the vast disparity between the teams in the standings and the general malaise of the pandemic sucked away any desire for one-upmanship. They decided, instead, to celebrate their mutual Greekness during this difficult time. Who would have thought COVID-19 would have united the GTA Greeks? Don't worry – it's only temporary.

~ At Magna Park in Aurora, a very close game through 30 minutes between the Mustangs and the Irish turned ugly for the visitors in the 2nd half as **Matt Ryan** turned it on and **Baker Mayfield** turned it off in a 34-17 Mustangs victory. The Irish, fighting in vain for their playoff lives, admirably gave it everything they had, especially on defence, in battling Aurora to a 10-10 first half tie. But they could not hold back the Mustangs' attack forever. The damn broke on Aurora's first possession of the 2nd half, when Ryan started firing BBs, covering 76 yards in just four plays to take the lead on a 6-yard pass to favourite red zone target **Julian Edelman**. The sense that the game was about to get away from them caused the Irish to try a 4th & 4 at the Aurora 32, passing on the field goal try in an attempt to keep pace. The decision to go for it in that situation is supportable to some degree, but the decision to run an off-tackle with Latavius Murray is not. **Tyler Davison** gobbled him up after a 2-yard gain was stopped after a two-yard gain and the Mustangs never looked back.

~ At the Wolverine's Den, temporary home of the Blue Eagles, a pair of costly 2nd half interceptions of **Joe Burrow**, one of them going back the other way, sealed a 33-17 victory for the Hawks over the Blue Eagles. This battle of the birds was closer than the score indicates, but always had that uphill feel to it from the Scarborough point of view. This was the result of **Trevor Davis** fumbling away the opening kickoff to set up an early Booklin touchdown – nothing like giving away the ball to your opponent before your first possession of the game to ruin the mood. As middle of the pack teams looking to secure a ticket for the post-season, both squads needed this victory. Coming off a tough loss to East Elmhurst the week before, this constituted a nice bounce-back game for **Derek Carr's** Hawks. For Scarborough, this game may be the one to dispel illusions that their rookie quarterback, as promising as he has looked for the most part, can lead them to the playoffs. He has thrown 5 interceptions in the past 3 games, all of which were losses. Growing pains!

~ And finally, at the Fish Tank in Sebastian, **Dwayne Haskins Jr** demonstrated conclusively (as if there remained any lingering doubt) that he is not ready for the EFL. The Excaliburs feasted on Haskins' five turnovers – four interceptions and a fumble – to blow the Fish out of the tank by the score of 44-7. Give **Tom Brady** that many chances with short to medium fields, and it doesn't matter what kind of day he is having – he'll take advantage. The veteran threw a couple of touchdown passes and oversaw a balanced attack that faced little challenge from the demoralized Sebastian defence. The fans, coaches, and players cannot wait for **Drew Brees** to return.

PLAYOFF PROGNOSIS

Virden has clinched the Central and Cobb County has clinched a wildcard berth. Those are the only two certainties heading into Week 14. But the short list for wildcard berths in the Atlantic is looking very short indeed, where Brooklin and Cowtown enjoy a two-game edge over the stumbling trio of York, Scarborough and Eriean, all tied beneath 500 at 6-7. Cowtown, I think, will be lucky to win one more game, so there is a chance for one of the dark horses to get back in it, while Durham coasts to the North Division title. In the Pacific, Bruxelles, Buffalo, Chino and Peg City are all in the running for a wild card and Chino still has a good shot at the West Division. They will need to take care of business versus York next week and lay it all out in the likely pivotal Week 15 match-up against the Cubs.

Jimmy's WEEK FOURTEEN PICKS

GAMES TO WATCH

BUFFALO @ AURORA (line – MUSTANGS by 6)

INJURIES: Buffalo – Tevin Coleman (PROBABLE), Demaryius Thomas (OUT), Riley Ridley (OUT), Jonathan Abram (IR). Aurora – Timmy Jernigan (OUT).

The Mustangs can clinch the South Division with a win, but that is not what makes this game one to watch. The Derailers won a crucial match against Peg City last week and currently hold the second wildcard spot, but that spot remains under threat, with Chino leading the charge to displace them. Going into Aurora in a close to must-win situation, the Derailers need their A-game in both phases, not just the Lamar Jackson Show. The Buffalo pass rush has been vastly under-performing this year, beginning with All-Pro Aaron Donald and ending with the line-backing corps that collectively has no sacks despite an abundance of edge-rush talent. The back-eleven have also shown little grit defending their red zone, where they allow opponents to score 94% of the time, second worst in the league. That unit will need to find its swagger to contain the Mustangs' offence, which has not been as dominant as in the past, but remains unafraid of challenging opposing defences at any spot on the field in any situation. Aurora comes into this game mostly healthy, as they always seem to be near the end of the year when other teams are hurting, so they will have all of their options available, which they are likely to

use in this, their last real challenge. They want the division now and two weeks of rest before the post-season. **PICK: AURORA**

PEG CITY @ COWTOWN (line – CRUSADERS by 3)

INJURIES: Peg City – Jeff Okudah (QUESTIONABLE), Saquon Barkley (OUT), Mike Hughes (OUT); **Cowtown** – Adam Humphries (PROBABLE), Alex Cappa (QUESTIONABLE), Roquan Smith (QUESTIONABLE), Danny Vitale (QUESTIONABLE), Yetur Gross-Matos (DOUBTFUL), Todd Gurley (DOUBTFUL), Damon Harrison Sr (DOUBTFUL), Mike Evans (OUT).

Both teams are coming off damaging losses, but the Corn Kings got the worst of Week 13 – not just losing the game but losing six starters along the way. The injury report for Cowtown has a lot of question marks, but one that is confirmed ‘out’ is Mike Evans, the key to the Cowtown offence and Jimmy Garoppolo’s success. Cowtown did not fare well against the league’s no.1 defence last week, as was expected, but can be expected to perform better here against a talented, but curiously inconsistent Peg City defensive unit. Rookie corner, Jeff Okudah is ‘questionable’ for this game; if he can play, it will severely limit Cowtown’s offensive options; if not, there will be a weak spot to target. Of course, whether the wounded Cowtown offence can keep up with the Pegs will depend on Kirk Cousins’ ability to exploit the wounded Cowtown defence. The Crusaders’ offence has plenty of weapons, even with Saquon Barkley ‘out,’ but they have suffered inexplicable fits at times. If they can avoid a fit, expect Peg City to pull away decisively. **PICK: PEG CITY**

CHINO @ YORK (line – EXCALIBURS by 3)

INJURIES: Chino – Marcus Cannon (PROBABLE), Kawann Short (DOUBTFUL), Gareon Conley (OUT), Michael Gallup (OUT); **York** – Rock Ya-Sin (PROBABLE), Jabari Zuniga (PROBABLE), Adrian Clayborn (QUESTIONABLE), Derrick Henry (QUESTIONABLE), CJ Henderson (OUT), Josh Kline (OUT), Mike McGlinchey (OUT), Brandon Scherff (OUT).

The Convicts are in a cage match with the Cubs for the West Division and lurk on the fringe of a wildcard spot. The Excaliburs cannot win the Coastal Division but still have a shot at a wildcard berth if they can put together a neat little win streak to end the season. It looks like the recency effect is influencing the line here as the Swords are coming off a battering of Brees-less Sebastian and the Convicts are licking their wounds after taking a beating in Vegas. But as the saying goes, what happens in Vegas, stays in Vegas. The Convicts are the better team on paper and, if both teams are what their records say they are, the better team on the field as well. The York defence has been the equalizer and the tipping point in tightly contested games this year, leading the league in takeaways; they are also second in run-defence efficiency, an important factor in gauging the potential impact of league yards-from-scrimmage leader, Christian McCaffery. But ultimately York’s fate will likely depend on whether Derrick Henry can play. Without the big man in the backfield, there will be no play action for Tom Brady to hide behind. Expect the Convicts to law down the law. **PICK: CHINO**

GAMES OF NOTE

COBB COUNTY @ ERIEAU (line – COYOTES by 7)

INJURIES: Cobb County – Greedy Williams (QUESTIONABLE); **Erieau** – LeSean McCoy (PROBABLE), Jabrill Peppers (QUESTIONABLE), Josh Gordon (DOUBTFUL), Rhett Ellison (OUT).

A game that could easily be in the leftovers pile, due to the disparity between these teams in the power rankings, is instead a game to note because an Erieau loss will eliminate them from Division title contention and could cause them to lose important ground in the wildcard race. The Coyotes, currently in possession of the no.1 seed in the Conference with their division locked up, are not expected to coast in this game, but probably view the Cadillac as a soft target. This could work against them if the Caddies come ready to play hard on both sides of the ball. Kyler Murray is an x-factor in the Erieau attack, while the studs on their defensive line could wreak havoc in the backfield if inspired to let loose. The Coyotes’ offence needs no introduction.
