**O**n a team with many legendary names on defence the arrival of Jo-Lonn Dunbar to the 'Lockdown Crew' was hardly noticed when he was signed as a free agent last year. The former Phoenix Roadrunner of the SFL was no star. He had shown some pass rush ability on a team stuck in the bottom half of a second-tier league. But coach and GM Rob Nazar obviously saw something on film that he liked enough to give him a shot in the big league.

After seeing limited action in his first

EFL season, Dunbar seemed to put it all together in the off-season, winning a training camp battle for the "Will" outside linebacker position over veteran Daryl Smith. But nobody expected him to actually play like Smith did in his prime.

All Dunbar has done is lead the Convicts in tackles with 75, twice as many as the guy behind him, Cortland Finnegan. He also leads the team in tackles for loss with 8, forced fumbles with 3, and is tied with Julius Peppers for the lead in sacks with 5. He doesn't have an interception yet, but his 3 deflections lead all non-secondary players. Those look a lot like Daryl Smith numbers to me.

The sudden emergence of Dunbar has some suspecting the use of PEDs, an allegation Dunbar strongly denies: "I strongly deny that," Dunbar said to reporters recently. "The only drug I use is marihuana."

Dunbar is not only a force on the field; he is a force off of it. He is the Convict's top partier and he is on the Guest Lists of the best nightclubs in Chino and cities around the league. "The team that parties hardy ain't tardy for the Big Party!" Dunbar likes to say when asked if the weekly outings he organizes for the team's most popular players might be distracting from the team's goals on the field. We know we have less control over our lives and we are losing more control every day. So what happens when society's diseases creep into the professional sports environment? Read on....

### COACH CLUB

The sudden resignation of Garland coach **Doug Shirley** caught the media by surprise, and that is something we in the media don't like. We love to catch the pubic by surprise, but when it comes to us, we like to know at least an *itsby-bitsy* bit in advance what surprise is coming so we can think about it in advance and sound smarter than you when reacting to it. But Shirley throwing in the towel suddenly, like he did, caused everyone to react at the same time, meaning that, like you, we had nothing overly intelligent to say about it apart from sharing our various impressions of how Shirley had lost his marbles.

It is now a week later and I have some information that nobody else in the mainstream media has. If it falls short of shedding much light on Shirley's frame of mind when he pulled the plug, but it shines a floodlight on the issues coaches face in general. part of their club.

"Doug took it too personally," Coghlin was heard to comment in the latest video. "He might not have thought he was so f^&\$king unique to the experience of getting f\*&^#d by his players if he had had a few drinks with us. Burning an effigy of Matt Ryan would have done him good, I think."

"We let him in because he obviously felt apart when he ran up the score on us," **Hal Corson** said softly. "Remember, he's still a coach like the rest of us. Oh yeah...f%^k!"

With Garland owner **Haus Beauregard** reportedly in secret negotiations to find a new coach for his team, rumours from inside the Mustangs' organization are that he is intent on "shaking things up." So, when **Ryan Rich**, the richest boy in the world, showed up for a coaches meeting the day before the Mustangs' Week Seven game against Mohave, the media were quick to report that Beauregard had done exactly that by hiring the youngest coach in professional football history. But Beauregard was equally quick to dispel the rumour that he was bringing an 11-year old boy in to coach his team permanently.

"Ryan will be our game day coach tomorrow against the Hellfire but I want to make it perfectly clear that he is not our new Head Coach," Beauregard said in a rare public address to the media. "I sincerely appreciate my good friend, **Richard Rich**, signing the permission-to-participate form, allowing Ryan to coach the Mustangs for this game while we continue the hunt for a permanent head coach. The other 4 Schaub interceptions took care of the rest. It was pure larceny by Carthage, but the Spartans certainly left their victory wallet sticking out of their back pants pocket by carrying just 2 half backs on the roster. In the age of *Megaroid*, positional depth at the hamstring-heavy positions is critical, while the lack thereof potentially fatal.

In Death Valley, the Undertakers possessed the ball for over 40 minutes but still trailed the Regulators by scores of 17-14 and 24-21 in the 4th quarter. Ball control in the running game, mixed with a lack of ball control in the form of 3 turnovers in the passing game, led to slow scores for Death Valley and quick ones for the Regulators – all in all, not the type of **Chris Worthley** performance we have come to expect. But, in the end, Death Valley did what they do best to salvage a win; it was bombs away from **RGIII** to **Andre 'Optimus Prime' Johnson** for a 50-yard, game-winning TD pass. The game then returned to unfamiliar territory for fans at the Graveyard, with the Undertaker defence creating two turnovers to snuff out South Carolina's comeback attempt in a 31-24 victory that keeps them within striking distance of Iowa City atop in the West Division.

Two coaches who will need to meet and curse it out at Coach Club after Week Seven are **George Kaldis** and **Rob Nazar**. Both had to endure the sight of their star quarterbacks throwing too many spirals to the wrong team as the Chino Convicts squeezed out a 24-21 victory over Durham at the Big House. First it was Nazar who needed medication to prevent his temples from bursting after *Cam Newton* and *Kirk Cousins* combined for 3 picks in their first 3 possessions of the game, leading to a quick 14-0 Durham lead. Then, without warning, back-to-back picks of *Drew Brees* by *Alterraun Verner* wiped the lack of a frown off the face of Kaldis (the Durham coach is incapable of smiling) and sent him temporarily to the locker with training staff for emergency aromatherapy and 10 minutes of whale sounds. Refreshed, Kaldis was thrown back into apoplexy in the 3<sup>rd</sup> quarter when *Antoine Bethea* picked off Brees to set up a temporary go-ahead TD for Chino. Despite the erratic play of his quarterback, the 'Stubborn Greek' (as he is sometimes called by friends and foes alike) insisted on passing with a 21-17 lead late in the game, instead of running time off the clock. The Convicts preserved their timeouts and used them wisely in marching 69 yards in two minutes for the winning touchdown.

The strangeness and unpredictability of the 2013 season was in evidence in Manitoba this week, where two favourites were toppled by cross-conference protagonists from the North Division. In spite of a patchwork offensive line (or perhaps because of it) the Twin Cities Triumph piled up over 400 yards of offence on their way to a 38-35 overtime win at Patriot Place. An uncharacteristically cranky **Jason Findlay** stopped short of blaming the referees, while blaming them at the same time, when he commented afterwards, "It sometimes gets to the point where you wonder who you are playing out there." Meanwhile, 280 km west along the Trans-Canada the Violators were getting....well...you know....*harmed intimately* by the on-again, off-again Corn Kings, 24-0. The sometimes bad Cowtown defence looked untouchable on this day in shutting down one of the more powerful offences in the league; but to hear **Lance Barrate** tell it, the blame lies more on the other end: "Stafford's a bum!" he was overheard saying to one of his assistants. I guess that remark takes away all of the suspense around who Barrate intends to burn in effigy this week at Coach Club.

**Jeff Dohrn's** Knights continue to defy the conventional wisdom that they are the worst team in professional football. That infamy may have just passed to the Swordfish after they were clumsily dispatched 17-9 in their own house by a spirited group of borderline incompetents wearing LA Knights jerseys. Who cares if there were just 12,000 fans in the stands at the Fish Tank? It's *your* house Swordfish, *defend it*!

At Camelot, York kicker, *Blair Walsh* welcomed Gwinnett to the 3-4 Club with a boot between the uprights in overtime for a 23-20 win as the Excaliburs continued to make progress climbing out of the 1-4 hole they dug for themselves.

Hope turned back to despair in Scarborough where the Blue Eagles failed to build on the momentum of their dramatic come-from-behind win over Markham last week. The Cubs rag-dolled the Eagles in the second half, out-scoring them 27-0 in the last two periods to win handily, 37-13 and remain alone at the top of the West Division.

Finally, at the Dawg Pound, ugliness was nowhere to be found on the field in the North Stars' 35-14 thumping of the Monarchs – unless you are a Monarchs' fan, of course. But ugliness was in clear evidence in Row 54, where the Fat Lady bared her breasts for Breast Cancer, causing Monarchs' owner **Chris Ferraro** to projectile vomit and leave the stadium.

FROM THE EFL ARCHIVES – 2007 – Top billing in Week 6 went to Tony Romo of the Kutztown Golden Bears. He led his 2-4 Bears to a 49-31 upset of the 2-4 Anchorage Buccaneers. Yes, the pundits were still stubbornly referring to Bucs' losses as "upsets," going against the plainly visible evidence that the Bucs were more of a contender for an early draft pick in 2008 than a playoff berth in 2007. The "upset" was a mere footnote to the truly remarkable feat of Romo throwing 6 TD passes in a game for the second time in 6 weeks. He now led all QBs with 17 scoring strikes, a fact that caused people to overlook the 8 interceptions and 4 fumbles he had compiled as well.

In other notable outcomes, mainstream media continued to be agog at the struggling Patriots, who dropped a 33-17 decision to Durham.
